

COLOR OF SEATE NOT YET CERTAIN

Wilson Landslide May Have Failed to Carry State Legislatures With It.

WEST VIRGINIA IS UPSET

Surprises Furnished by Transfer From Democratic to Republican Side—Several States Remain in Doubt.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—(Special.)—Despite the Wilson landslide it was doubtful at a late hour tonight whether the Democrats have succeeded in securing control of the United States Senate.

As the returns filtered in from dozens of states it became evident that while Wilson carried the states he did not succeed in pulling with him to victory a sufficient number of Democratic members of the Legislatures to insure the election of Democratic Senators. The Democrats are claiming victory in several states from which incomplete returns have only been received. In some instances the Progressives and Socialists control the situation.

In Illinois the latest indications were that unless Governor Deneen called a special session of the present Legislature to elect a successor to William Lorimer, the Roosevelt Progressives would hold the balance of power in the new Legislature.

West Virginia Is Surprised.
In Colorado it was contended by the Democrats that two Democratic candidates for the Senate from that state would be swept into power with the Wilson vote, but this is not conceded.

The biggest upset the Democrats received in the Senatorial situation was the report from West Virginia that the state would probably be transferred from the Democratic to the Republican column. The Democrats had counted confidently on electing a Democratic Senator from that state.

Returns indicate, however, that the Republicans have secured control of it. This means that Senator Watson will be retiring.

The Democrats triumphed in New Jersey. Governor Wilson's home state, and will elect a Democratic colleague for Senator Martin. Senator Briggs, the incumbent, is one of President Taft's closest advisers. It is believed that Senator Briggs will be succeeded by William Hughes, who has represented the Sixth District of New Jersey in the lower house of Congress since 1904.

It is probable that two Republican Senators have been elected from Idaho. One of these is Senator Borah. The other Senator will take the place made vacant by the death of W. R. Heyburn.

Stubbins Ahead in Kansas.
In Kansas Governor Stubbins, Roosevelt Progressive and Republican, is said to be leading in the race, while reports from Montana show that Thomas J. Walsh is leading Senator Dixon, Colonel Roosevelt's campaign manager, by a wide margin. The Democrats concede that the Legislature of Massachusetts is Republican and that a Republican successor will be elected to Senator Crane, retired.

Rhode Island returns show the election of a Republican to the Legislature, which will elect a Republican Senator to succeed George F. Wetmore, who is not standing for re-election.

Tennessee is still in the doubtful column, so far as the complexion of the Legislature goes. Returns from half of the 96 counties, however, indicate that it may be Republican.

In Michigan it was practically certain tonight that the Republicans will be in a position to return William Allen Smith to the Senate.

With only three counties missing, late returns from Wyoming show that Francis E. Warren, the present Republican incumbent, is leading Senator-elect, while his Democratic opponent has 24 pledged to him. Three counties are still to be heard from.

Complete returns from Minnesota show that Senator Nelson has been re-elected.

Senator Massey, incumbent of the seat formerly held by the late George S. Nixon, is leading in Nevada, and returns show that he is probably elected.

Definite results of the fight of United States Senator Knyon to retain his seat in Indiana will not be known for several days.

RECALL WINS IN NEVADA

Wilson Has Substantial Plurality.

Pittman Leads for Senator.

RENO, Nev., Nov. 6.—With 124 out of 251 precincts in Nevada heard from, Key Pittman, Dem., leads in the preferential vote for United States Senator.

The vote stands: Pittman 3963; Massey, Rep., 3485; Summerfield, Prog., 525; Steele, Soc., 1430.

The vote for: Roosevelt 3085; Debs 2097; Taft 1852. Wilson's plurality over Roosevelt 1371. This will probably be increased about 1800 by the vote in the precincts yet to be heard from.

McCarren, Dem., leads Bartlett, Ind., for justice of the Supreme Court by a substantial plurality and is undoubtedly elected.

McCarren returns early tonight on Constitutional amendments extending the scope of the initiative and referendum and providing for the recall of every public officer in the state, indicate both have carried.

"WETS" WIN IN COLORADO

State-Wide Prohibition Defeated.

Democrats Make Clean Sweep.

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 6.—A Democratic Presidential plurality of 47,000 in Colorado is predicted tonight, based upon returns thus far received. Complete returns from 445 out of 1412 precincts, including 104 from Denver, give Wilson 12,558, Taft 14,555, Roosevelt 13,950.

For Governor, the figures from 308 precincts, including 57 from Denver, give Ammons, Dem., 24,634; Costigan, Prog., 18,688; Parks, Rep., 12,512.

George J. Kindel, Dem., in the First District, and H. H. Seldomridge, Dem., in the Second District, are elected to Congress. The Democrats will control the next Legislature, which will elect two United States Senators.

Governor John F. Shafroth and Charles S. Thomas won in the preferential vote for the Senate seats.

State-wide prohibition, voted upon as an initiative amendment to the constitution, was defeated by a majority estimated at from 30,000 to 40,000.

Amendments Adopted in Michigan.

DETROIT, Nov. 6.—Scattering returns today indicated that the constitutional amendment granting votes to women was adopted by Michigan voters yesterday.

VIEW IS CHEERFUL

Wilson's Election Strikes British Favorably.

CREDIT IS GIVEN TO T. R.

It Is Sign of Health, Says One of Editors, That Contest Should Be Between Two Men of So High Type.

WILSON STATEMENT HAS REASSURING EFFECT.

Feeling That Tariff Revision Cannot Come Up Immediately Advances Market.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—(Special.)—The Financial American, a Wall Street paper, says: "Probably the most important influence on the market today was the statement by Wilson of his purposes and policy while the Administration will be under his control."

The Mail and Express attributes the active buying and advances to the result of election and says: "Governor Wilson's election was regarded as probable and satisfactory to foreign investors."

The Globe says: "The dominant sentiment behind the advance in the market today was, first, that the election was over and that a long-standing cause of uncertainty was removed; second, that there was nothing to fear from the tariff for another eight months to come; third, business men having so far manifested no uneasiness, there was no good reason for Wall Street to be afraid."

The Evening Sun, in its financial article, says: "Increasing activity at advancing prices in the response which was made in stocks today to the Democratic landslide in yesterday's Presidential election. Judging from indications, the disposition is to consider the election a relief from the burden of the tariff for another eight months to come; third, business men having so far manifested no uneasiness, there was no good reason for Wall Street to be afraid."

The Evening Standard says: "Woodrow Wilson will command confidence in his own country and in the world outside. He is a public man of a much higher type than some of those who have occupied the White House."

Two Symbols Noted.
The Fall Mall Gazette says: "The promotion of Woodrow Wilson to the Democratic leadership and the evolution of Theodore Roosevelt as the head of a new party are in reality two symbols of the same force—the intense wish of the better elements in America for the blessings of honorable government. It is a sign of health in the Nation that the real contest could be between two men who are much superior in character and outlook to the common political level."

GERMANY IS MUCH PLEASED
People Warned, However, Against Expecting Too Much.

BERLIN, Nov. 6.—The election of Woodrow Wilson is regarded generally by the German press as a most fortunate occurrence for Germany.

The newspapers say that it gives promise of a reduction of the tariff which has crippled the German export trade.

All the journals, however, warn the German commercial world against expecting too much from the Democrats in this respect, saying the latter would be quite as responsible to the protection of American interests as the Republican party.

counties as expected and dropped to third in the race. It was thought Hawley might meet Haines' Mormon majority in the southeast, but this tonight is conceded impossible.

Hawley Sure He's Defeated.

Governor Hawley issued the following statement:

"I am satisfied from the record of the votes counted in the southeastern part of the state that I, as well as the other candidates of the Democratic ticket, are defeated. Some of my friends are loath to admit this, but I quit chasing rainbows, even political rainbows, many years ago, and can see no reasonable grounds for believing that either myself or any other candidates on our ticket have received a plurality of the votes."

"So far as I am concerned personally I have no particular disappointment, except the fact that defeat always leaves a certain sting, but our glorious National victory cures all the pain from that source. I regret more the defeat of others associated with me on the state ticket than I do my own."

Chief Justiceship in Doubt.

The election of Chief Justice Stewart remains in doubt. His opponent,

Bowen, Democrat, is pressing him closely.

Burton L. French and Addison E. Smith are elected Representatives by pluralities over 5000. The entire Republican state ticket is safe. The Republicans made their cleanest sweep in the Legislature.

Every county except Custer, Owyhee and Lemhi, entitled to six members combined, three Senators and three Representatives, was carried by the Republican legislative tickets. On the joint ballot the Republicans will have 79 out of 85. They will have 58 to 3 members in the House and 21 to 3 Democratic Senators. This result was due to the fact the re-election of Senator Borah was made a paramount issue.

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PROPHETS ARE BUSY

Cabinet-Makers Point to Possibilities of Future.

BRYAN BELIEVED SLATED

Clark and Underwood, Say Wise Ones, Would Prefer to Stay in House—Less Prominent Party Leaders Available, Too.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Cabinet-makers are busy conjecturing with names of those who will share with Wilson in shaping the policy of the next Administration. Necessarily this is purely gossip, but the Cabinet-builders are none the less active in pointing out the persons and the elements available as Cabinet material.

One of the available elements emphasizes those who were conspicuous party figures at the Baltimore convention, including Speaker Clark, Chairman Underwood, of the ways and means committee, William Jennings Bryan, Governor Foss, of Massachusetts; Governor Harmon, of Ohio, and others.

Bryan Believed Slated.
It is generally assumed, however, that Speaker Clark and Chairman Underwood would prefer to continue their work in Congress, especially now that the legislative programme on the tariff and other questions is likely to meet with fewer obstacles.

At Mr. Bryan, one of the Democratic Senators was quoted during the Democratic convention as definitely assigning Mr. Bryan to a Cabinet place in case of Wilson's election, though Mr. Wilson said that no consideration had been given to the personnel of the Cabinet. None the less, speculation is active as to whether the Nebraskan will have a portfolio.

Other Elements Considered.
Another element from which Cabinet material is being suggested embraces those who have been prominently identified with the Wilson campaign, notably Chairman McComb, of the Democratic National Committee; Representative Burleson and Henry, of Texas; Representative Palmer, of Pennsylvania; Assistant Chairman McAdoo and several others who bore the brunt of the conflict at Baltimore and during the campaign.

Still another available element is made up of prominent party figures in the various states who were conspicuously identified with the recent National convention, while another includes some of the veterans of the last Democratic Administration.

Outside of these usual elements from which Cabinets can be constructed, many foresee the entry of a considerable new element in public affairs, made up of men like Mr. Wilson, who have been identified with collegiate, educational and economic questions.

ZAPATISTAS ARE BEATEN

Severest Defeat in Many Months Administered Near Cuernavaca.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 6.—What appears to have been the severest defeat in many months was administered to the Zapatistas within six miles of Cuernavaca today by Generals Blanquet and Angeles.

The losses are not given in the official messages, but General Blanquet in his report to the President assures him that the insurgents abandoned their positions and fled after a fight of three hours.

WOMEN COUNT ON FOUR NEW STATES

Arizona, Kansas, Michigan and Oregon Thought Added to Suffrage Ranks.

WISCONSIN VOTE ADVERSE

Men Are Apathetic in Kansas, Few Marking Ballots—Larger Towns in Arizona Turn Defeat Into Victory.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—(Special.)—Woman suffrage also had its victories Tuesday, the cause winning in probably four of the five states where it was an issue and the women exerting a powerful influence upon issues in states and cities where they already have the full ballot or limited voting privileges.

Kansas and Arizona have joined the procession of Western states which accord women equal suffrage with men. In Oregon suffrage is leading, and it seems to have won in Michigan. In Wisconsin the women were defeated. They expected reversal in Wisconsin because of the intense hostility of the Socialists and the brewing interests. Word was passed out to the heavy German farmer vote to work actively against suffrage and defeat was forecast several days ago.

Hope Felt for Michigan.
In Michigan the women had greater hopes and leaders at headquarters in this city were intensely interested in every scrap of news bearing upon the issue in that state. They believe the returns will show that Michigan has joined the sisterhood.

The states previously committed to woman suffrage were California, Colorado, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming and Washington.

Interest in the suffrage amendment was not great in Kansas, only about one-third of the voters taking the trouble to mark their ballots. Those who did mark them, however, were strongly in favor of equal suffrage. The estimated majority, based upon returns available, is in excess of 50,000.

Interest Great in Arizona.
Greater interest was shown in Arizona, where in every one of the large towns of the state a substantial majority was returned.

In Chicago women have limited voting privileges, but they brought tremendous influence to bear upon the male voters. This is shown in the defeat of Pete Bartzan, president of the county board, who has been denounced by every woman's club and society in the city and county. The women made him an issue and while his ticket marched to victory by approximately 125,000, he was placed in the discard by a plurality of 12,000.

WOMEN WILL EDIT EDITION
New York Evening Sun to Devote Section to Suffrage Cause.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—(Special.)—The Evening Sun of Saturday, November 9, will include a special section devoted to the woman suffrage movement.

This section, which will consist of six fully illustrated pages, has been arranged for publication on the occasion of the great torchlight parade to be held by local suffragists on next Saturday night.

The special section will be written, edited and managed entirely by women of the various suffrage organizations. The Evening Sun merely donating facilities of its machinery and circulation.

Mrs. Oliver H. P. Belmont will be editor-in-chief of the section; Miss Harriet May Miles is to be managing editor; the city editor will be Miss Jean Milholland and the business management will be assumed by Miss Caroline I. Kelly. There will be a number of contributing editors representing several local suffrage groups.

CAUSE SAVED BY TOWN VOTE

Arizona Women Awake to Find Majority Turned in Their Favor.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 6.—Women leaders who believed up to the moment the polls closed last night that their hopes of gaining the ballot were in vain were jubilant today when returns from all the large towns of the state showed substantial majorities in favor of the cause.
