

REPUBLICANS HOLD STATE LEGISLATURE

New Body Will Have Majority of Members Pledged to Statement No. 1.

FEW DEMOCRATS TO ENTER

Power to Enact Tax Laws Restored to House Is Indication—Voters Do Not Sanction Misuse of Initiative, Is Belief.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 7.—(Special).—While returns from throughout the state on the election of members to the next Legislature are still meager and uncertain, it is certain that both the House and the Senate by an overwhelming majority will be made up of members who have subscribed to Statement No. 1, and there will be but a handful of members in either House who did not take the statement.

So far it is difficult to determine what will be the political complexion of the two houses. However, both of them will have a heavy Republican majority and it is doubtful if there will be more than the corpora's guard of Democrats which occupied scattering seats in the Assembly during the last session.

Tax Repeal Important. One important feature as far as the Legislature is concerned apparently has been decided by this election. According to returns here, the county tax amendment of 1910, which was passed by the aid of a joker, has been repealed, and by this repeal the Legislature is again given power to enact tax laws.

Under the new amendment, however, the Legislative Assembly cannot declare an emergency in relation to any tax bill, and thus the people are empowered, if they so desire, to investigate the referendum on every tax measure which is passed by the Legislature.

It is believed that many of the rational tax reform measures were defeated because the people assumed the attitude that placing such measures on the ballot was a distinct misuse of the initiative. As a result, some of these will come before the Legislature.

HURD LEADS FOR LEGISLATURE Lane County Likely to Restore Republican to Sheriff's Office.

EUGENE, Or., Nov. 7.—(Special).—The race for Sheriff in Lane County is developing much interest, with the latest returns showing a very slight lead for Bryson (Rep.) over Parker (Dem.), who until today had maintained a lead of approximately 300 votes. Reports from the coast precincts cut Parker's lead. For more than a decade Lane County, otherwise Republican, has had Democratic Sheriffs, and the race was watched with the more interest because of this fact.

The contest for third place on the legislative ticket is between Hurd (Rep.) and Schmidt (Dem.), with Hurd pointing ahead and with his home precincts to report. Other representatives are Allen Eaton and M. V. Parsons (Reps.).

Other officers elected are: Clerk, Stacey M. Russell, incumbent; Commissioner, George M. Hawley, Treasurer, S. W. Taylor, incumbent; Assessor, Benjamin F. Keeney, incumbent; School Superintendent, H. C. Baughman, incumbent; Surveyor, C. H. Collier, incumbent; Coroner, W. T. Gordon, incumbent.

LEAGUE CANDIDATES DEFEATED Marion County Voters Refuse to Indorse Selected Ticket.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 7.—(Special).—The entire Republican legislative ticket in Marion County is elected without any difficulty according to returns which have been received. It is also true of the county ticket. The attempt on the part of the Taxpayers' League to throw a selected ticket in the field failed without one of its candidates coming close to being elected.

W. M. Bushey has been re-elected County Judge. William Each has been elected Sheriff. Max Gehlar, County Clerk, B. F. West, County Assessor, J. G. Moore, County Treasurer, W. M. Smith, School Superintendent, A. M. Clough, Coroner, E. A. Aufranco, Recorder, and B. B. Herrick, Jr., County Surveyor.

The five members from Marion County in the House will be James G. Helzel, George W. Johnson, George W. Weeks, D. C. Thomas and S. A. Hughes. The move to establish a county high school fund has undoubtedly been defeated by a heavy vote.

REDMOND, Or., Nov. 7.—(Special).—The election went off very quietly in this district and a full vote was polled. Owing to the length of the ballot the

counting was not completed until 3 o'clock this morning. Wilson carried Redmond precinct by a 2-to-1 vote. McFarlane, the local candidate for County Judge, was defeated by Springer, the Democratic candidate, and Van Allen, the local candidate for County Assessor, was elected by narrow margin over Foster, the Democrat.

Coe, of Bend, an eleventh-hour candidate for County Judge, split the Republican vote, allowing Springer to win.

Stemmer for State Senator in Coos and Curry.

S. P. Pearce and W. H. Meredith, for Joint Representative, are so far even. The contest is so close that the official vote may be required to determine. J. S. Barton is elected Representative from the Fifth District, and W. W. Gage Sheriff for Coos County. Accurate figures from nine precincts of Coos County on equal suffrage shows: For 255, against 123. 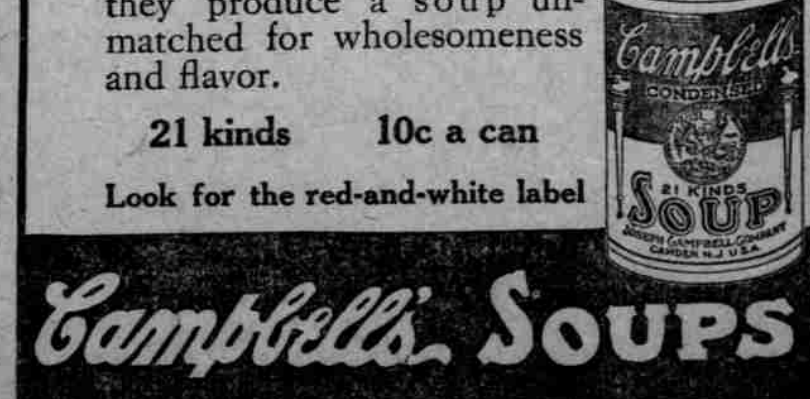
