

ROOSEVELT PLURALITY NOW REACHES 983

Though Governor Hay Gains Steadily in Day Late Returns Hurt Him.

OFFICIAL COUNT PROBABLE

Roosevelt Progressives Elect All Their Candidates for Legislature in Pierce and Number in King and Other Counties.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 8.—With 75 small precincts outstanding, Lister, Democrat, for Governor, has 94,815 votes; Hay, Republican, 93,632. Lister's plurality, 983.

Governor Hay gained steadily in the returns received today and wiped out nearly 1600 of the plurality with which Lister began the day.

However, the small counties from which Hay expected pluralities are pretty well cleared up and the precincts outstanding are in many counties.

It is possible that tomorrow's returns may take away Lister's plurality and the official count will be necessary to determine the winner.

The Roosevelt Progressives elected all their candidates for the Legislature in Pierce County and number in King and other counties. Some of the members-elect were prominent in the Roosevelt Progressive movement until the partying of the party and then decided to stay with the Republican party because they were sure of nomination and had no other prospects.

Hay Still Has Hope. Governor Hay, at Olympia, said over the telephone to the Associated Press this afternoon that he believed he would win in the race for Governor when the official returns arrive.

The Governor said that this morning he had conceded defeat, but later returns led him to withdraw the concession.

"I shall not give up until the last vote is in and the official count announced," said Governor Hay. "I believe I will win."

It is estimated that the Socialists polled 46,900 votes for Debs in Washington. Miss Anna Mancy, Socialist candidate for Governor, did not run nearly so well.

There was a grim determination to stick to one side and to make it wet on the other. The first ward in town is dry by 27. The other three town units opened with fair margin for the whole town went wet by 88.

There is some afterthought noise going around that the wet vote in the election Tuesday Ward will be thrown out, but at most, that would take but a short time to accomplish.

LANE'S ELECTION IS NOW MORE CERTAIN

Lead Over Selling Is 1499 and Returns Are More Than Four-Fifths In.

BOURNE IS 11,871 BEHIND

Republican Nominee Beats Incumbent by 10,372 Votes—Wilson Has Advance of 9196, With Taft Third in Contest.

REPUBLICANS SWEEP LEWIS Centralia Election Officials Exhausted by 66 Hours' Work.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Nov. 8.—(Special.)—The Republicans won every office in Lewis County with the exception of Commissioner from the Second District, T. G. Long, Democrat, holding out Mel Lowry by a scant margin.

Lane's lead over Bourne is 11,871, while Selling has beaten Bourne in the state by 10,372 on the figures now available. This latter fact is of particular interest among the betting fraternity, as much money was wagered that Selling would have a lead of 10,000 over Bourne. Those who took the Selling side now seem to have won big money.

Complete unofficial returns show that Multnomah County has gone to Lane by a margin of 1744 votes over Selling. Selling's lead over Lane in the state outside of Multnomah County is 245 votes. While no figures yet available from Curry County advise from there are to the effect that Lane has a strong lead over both Bourne and Selling.

Taft Finishes Put Wilson's vote in the state at large at 42,355, and Roosevelt's at 33,185, while President Taft has 21,842. The three candidates likely will maintain these relative positions and former forecasts as to the plurality for Wilson of 10,000 votes probably will be affirmed by the final result.

Debs vote in the state at large probably will reach 12,000, which is the highest the Socialist candidate for President ever received in Oregon.

Woman Suffrage in Oregon now is assured. The favorable vote on the measure was increased yesterday by further returns from the outside counties. The measure in Multnomah County, which at first threatened to go against it, has enlisted in its favor.

The tax amendment for the classification of property has safely carried. The vote in favor of the measure was 11,474 against it.

Income Tax in Doubt. Multnomah gave the income tax measure a close vote, and the result is still in doubt. The measure in favor of the tax was 265, added to which the state vote gives it an unfavorable majority of 560. With several counties having yet to report, the bill seems certain rejection.

Added returns yesterday increased the majority against the boycott bill. The railroad rate bill gained favorable returns from several counties.

Efforts were made yesterday to obtain complete returns from several of the outlying counties, but full returns probably will not be available until the official count is made. In some places this will not be completed next week.

The votes on those measures previously reported carried or rejected have not been changed by later returns.

HOOD RIVER BEATS WEST BILL Capital Punishment Abolished and Single Tax Lose.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Nov. 8.—(Special.)—Complete returns are in from Hood River County's nine precincts. The vote increased 725 in total vote Tuesday was 1915.
