Incomplete returns from the different Senatorial and Representative dis-tricts throughout the state indicate that the 17th biennial session of the Oregon the 27th blennial asssion of the Oregon Legislature will be overwhelmingly Re-publican, according to the figures ob-tainable at 2 o'clock this morning. The Republicans have apparently elected 12 of the 15 State Senators and 54 of the 60 Representatives. With two Democratic holdover Senators out of 15, the Democratic will have four seats and the Democrats will have four seats and the Republicans 16 at the next session of the State Senate and out of a total

Kiddle (Rep.); and in the Twenty-second Discounties of State—Kennedy 11, Ol-Secretary of St (Rep.); and in the Twenty-second District (Grant, Harney and Maiheur Counties), where James F. CONCRETE HOT-BEDS.

Means for Growing Winter Vegetables and Spring Plants.
