NEW YORK, Nov. 11 .- (Special.)-When the custom house appraisers opened the trunks of Gaby Deslys this ifternoon they were shocked to find that the jewels of the French dancer appeared to be worth only \$5000 instead of a half million. On her arrival as a passenger on the Caronia yesterday Gaby admitted that the clothes alone in her six trunks were easily worth \$50,000.

"If that's so," said the customs men, "then we'll have to appraise the things at the warehouse."

The customs men did not "hold up" the French dancer's things. They simply took her baggage to the appraiser's office as a matter of routine. She can get everything back as soon as she puts up a bond.

"I don't think anybody should drag us into a press agent's joke like this," sald one of the customs men. He added that the only pearls they had found were probably imitation and worth perhaps \$2500.

Figures received from Colusa, Tehama. Butte and Plumas counties showed a net increase for Wilson of 523 votes over the unofficial count, while Eldorado County reported 842 plurality, or 20 less than the first

Wilson's net increase in these five counties, as given out at Democratic headquarters, is 502, reducing Roosevelt's plurality to 415.
