SELLWOOD Y. M. C. A. TO REOPEN.—It
is considered by the board of directors
that the Sellwood Y. M. C. A. on East
Fifteenth street and Spokane avenue,
will be reopened on December 1. A
committee is at work raising \$350
toward current expenses of the local
association and \$300 has been obtained.

The local committee will meet
tonight to confer further about opening
the building. A meeting of the board
will be held at 7:30 o'clock. The
building will be under the charge of
the building when it is opened. Sellwood
citizens agree to provide current ex-
penses and keep the association out of
debt. There will be athletic classes
for boys, and girls, men and women
conducted in the building, besides other
meetings of a social and religious
character. It is proposed.

MONDAY NIGHT FIRES MANY.—Small
fires in scattered sections of the city,
kept the fire department busy Monday
night and yesterday morning. Though
the aggregate loss was small. Electric
defects caused a small blaze in the old
Lincoln High School, which was ex-
tinguished with small loss. A newly-
built house at Sixteenth and Hall
streets, not yet occupied, was destroyed
at daylight, at a loss of \$300. It was
owned by P. Moore, 508 Davis street.

Fire in a woodpile at 294 Eleventh
street endangered the building, but
was quickly extinguished. An auto-
mobile owned by the Douglas Grocery
Company was destroyed in a garage at
757 East Davis street. A milk wagon,
drawn by a runaway horse, crashed
into a red barn at Alberta and
Kirby streets, igniting the wagon and
causing a call to the fire department.

HEAD ENGINEER NAMED.—Dissonance
between the city engineer and the com-
missioners led to the appointment of
William H. Peterson as head engineer
yesterday by the County Court of William
Hatchel, now head of the city engineer
and machinery and rock crushers, as
head of the Courthouse engineering staff.

Mr. Hatchel has been given full power
to hire and discharge. He enjoys
similar powers with respect to em-
ployees working on road machinery and
at the rock crushers. His salary was
advanced from \$100 to \$125 a month.
The Courthouse engineers are: W. H.
Peterson, Charles Powers and George
Nelson. The principal trouble has
been between Peterson and Powers, the
latter an old and proved employee of
the county who was displaced by Peterson,
a union man, as head engineer
about a year ago.

HOME OPEN FOR FRIENDS.—The Port-
land industrial home of the Women's
Home Missionary Society, on First and
Caruthers, will be open to visiting
friends, on Friday evening. The ex-
ecutive committee suggests that this
time be made the occasion of a
"show" of needed articles in the
home, as rugs, carpet-sweeper, bed-
spreads, bed linen, table linen, cooking
utensils and dishes. Entrance to gym-

FARMER HELD NOT GUILTY.—A verdict
of guilty as charged was returned
yesterday by a jury of six, sitting at the
trial of H. M. Thompson, jointly
indicted on a charge of conducting the
Alma Hotel, Twelfth and Burnside
streets, a disorderly house, was
found by a jury in Judge Kavanaugh's
court yesterday. The testimony showed
that Thompson purchased the business
from the interest in the hotel and turned
over to Mabel Thomas to run, being
rarely there himself. The purchase was
made early in August and the raid by
the hotel squad took place about the
end of the same month. Policemen
testified that the place had borne a
bad reputation for months prior to this
time. Thompson was formerly a farmer
residing near White Salmon, Wash.

J. Traill, traveling passenger agent for
the O. & N. Co. and the South-
ern Pacific Company at Cincinnati and
A. D. Hart, city passenger agent at the
same place, accompanied by Mrs. Traill
and Mrs. Hart arrived in Portland yester-
day for a brief visit. They are on
a tour of the West, this being their
first visit to this territory. All four
of them would like to stay permanently.
Mr. Traill and John M. Scott, gen-
eral passenger agent for the Southern
Pacific, were employed in the same
office in Omaha 20 years ago and the
two had a pleasant reunion yesterday.

LOYD CASE TRANSFERRED.—An order
of removal to the Western Washing-
ton district at Spokane was granted
yesterday by United States District
Judge Bean in the case of C. L. Lloyd,
the partially blind street musician, who
is charged with white slavery. The
16-year-old girl whom he had in his
possession has been taken to her home
at Walla Walla and will appear as a
witness against him before the United
States District Court at Spokane. Lloyd
pleaded guilty and waived examination
before United States Commissioner
Cannon, which avoided any trouble in
granting the warrant of removal.

CHERRYVILLE RETAINS POSTOFFICE.—
Through the efforts of the Cherryville
Commercial Club the Postoffice, which
had been discontinued at that place,
will be retained. Farnell Averill
has been appointed postmaster, and it
is announced that he will erect a build-
ing for the office. It had been planned
to take the office away and supply
mail in the neighborhood through rural
delivery from another station.

STATE PRESS TO JOURNALISM.—The dis-
trict meeting of the State Press Asso-
ciation will be held in Eugene Friday

the University of Oregon will be host to
