NOLTA PROPOSES CANAL

CHANNEL BETWEEN RIVERS IS NEW PROJECT.

Among Other Advantages Pointed Out by Northside Is Cut-Off Toward Vancouver.

A ship canal connecting the Columbia and the Willamette Rivers through the upper portion of the Peninsula, using perhaps Sullivan's Gulch, is a project proposed by J. H. Nolta, president of the North Portland Commercial Club and father of the Interstate bridge and the matter will be presented next Thursday night at a joint meeting of the North Portland Commercial Club and the Women's Auxiliary, in the Fire Hall on Albina Avenue. Mr. Nolta has had the canal project in mind for some time and has given it some consideration. At this meeting the matter of reimbursing a pack bond issue to the people will be considered also and the construction of a boulevard eastward from Columbia boulevard into Eastern Oregon.

"This canal proposition," said Mr. Nolta yesterday, "is no wildcat impracticable scheme. Other cities have built canals under much greater difficulties. It is 18 miles to Vancouver around by the mouth of the Willamette River. A canal could be cut in such a way as to use Sullivan's Gulch, which evidently was once a channel or part of the Columbia River, to shorten the distance and give close connection with the Columbia River. It is now time to consider this matter."

"In the matter of another pack bond issue question," continued Mr. Nolta, "I think the people will vote \$1,000,000 if it is submitted in the right way, and then it used as the people desire, there will be no trouble to get another \$1,000,000, or whatever is wanted for parks. But it is no use to submit a pack bond issue to the people and keep them in the dark as to what is to be done with the money. The \$2,000,000 bond

issue proposed at the November election might have carried, but the Park Board did not take the people into its confidence. Speakers were asked on nearly every occasion what the \$2,000,000 was for and where it was to be used, but no satisfactory answer was given. The people of Vernon held a meeting to get a park for that neighborhood, and Mr. Mische, one of the speakers, was asked if Vernon would get a park, but he did not give them a direct answer. I don't think the Rose Island proposition will ever carry, and that it will be waste of time to bring it up again. It helped carry down the park bonds and the other bond issues.

"I have been asked to attend a meeting Monday noon at the Commercial Club to consider another pack bond issue and I expect to go, but my present opinion is the people will vote \$1,000,000 for parks if they know what is to be done with the money, but not otherwise."

FATHER AND SUITOR FIGHT

O. B. Hlog Objects to G. H. Weise's Calls on Daughter.

Father and suitor almost came to blows in Municipal Court yesterday when O. B. Hlog, after prosecuting a case of trespass against G. H. Weise, started to lead his daughter, the cause of contention, from the courtroom, and Weise essayed the same service on the other side. The father, although much the smaller and older man, sprang at Weise, and the two men were separated by Bailiff Johnson. Hlog testified that he had given frequent orders to Weise to stay away from the premises at 829 Overton street. The daughter followed on the stand, but denied that her sweetheart ever had been ordered away. "Don't lie, daughter," cautioned Hlog, who was prosecuting his own case. "Has he told you to tell lies?" he continued. "Speak, child: is it your father talking to you; tell the truth." The girl faintly admitted that she had heard her father threaten Weise with the police, and the court found him guilty. A sentence of 30 days was suspended on condition that he remain away from the Hlog home.

DUCK HUNTERS 'DUCKED'

CALVIN HEILIG AND H. L. KEATS ARE SORELY TRIED.

Attempt of Theatrical Magnate to Carry Auto Dealer Through Water Is Disastrous.

If certain Portland people, among them Calvin Heilig and H. L. Keats, enjoyed some nice duck for dinner Monday night it was not without previous effort and inconvenience. Both Mr. Heilig and Mr. Keats like duck. Also, they like the sport of shooting them. Knowing of their tastes and ambitions, the entire membership of the Crescent Outing Club, consisting of Julius L. Meier, M. C. Dickinson and Charles Wright, invited the aforesaid sportsmen out for a Sunday's sport. Now the club members are accustomed to almost any kind of outdoor conditions and were prepared for emergencies. Besides, it had been raining.

Arriving at Sauvie Island, where the shooting "grounds" of the club are, they found a "ground" of their own. That's how it was that the guests of the club, namely, Mr. Heilig and Mr. Keats, paid for their ducks so dearly.

Being somewhat unfamiliar with the territory on Duck Island the two visitors did not like the idea of everyone shifting for himself, especially since Mr. Keats had on a pair of boots that reached only to his knees. The water was high. To reach the blind from which he was to do his shooting Mr. Keats must necessarily wade 15 feet through the water that threatened to flow into his boot tops. Mr. Heilig had on a pair of those regulation hip boots without which no

He was not careful, and he exercised both care and caution. Suddenly he bumped his right foot against a submerged rock and both men went sprawling into the water. They got wet up to their necks. After drying their clothing the unfortunate pair yet had time to indulge in a little careful shooting late in the afternoon. In spite of their early morning handicap they say they shot the legal limit.

EXTENSION WORK PLANNED

State Instructors Will Lecture to Railway Employees.
