

30 PACIFIC COAST WITNESSES CALLED

Evidence About Dynamiting in Western States Is Sought.

CONSPIRACY TRIAL HALTED

Juror's Illness Requires Postponement—McManigal Tells of Loss of Nitro-Glycerine Through Union Man's Treachery.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 12.—Thirty witnesses from the Pacific Coast, it was announced today, have been subpoenaed to testify at the "dynamite conspiracy" trial concerning explosions in Western states.

More than 20 of the Pacific Coast witnesses have arrived or are on their way to Indianapolis.

Illness Postpones Trial. After an hour's session, the trial today was postponed until tomorrow because of the illness of Allen Spaulding, a juror.

In relating his preparations to blow up jobs at Kansas City and Peoria, McManigal testified that he had arranged the Roebuck hiding place, but in August, 1910, in "double-crossing" the union, he had "tipped it off" to a superintendent of a steel firm in Pittsburgh, who, six weeks before the Los Angeles Times explosion, dug up and destroyed the nitro-glycerine.

Twelve Quarts of Nitro Used. McManigal told how with 12 quarts of nitro-glycerine he arrived in Kansas City, Mo., to blow up a bridge across the Missouri River there in 1910.

He testified he had gone as a paid accomplice of John J. McNamara, who at Indianapolis had instructed him to cause three explosions on a bridge being built by non-union workmen. The explosion took place about 8:30 P. M. August 21.

At Kansas City, McManigal said he left his nitro-glycerine, successively, at the railway station, a boarding-house and at a hotel.

"I had one 10-quart can and one two-quart can," said McManigal.

Busted Bomb Lost. "To divide it into three bombs, I went to a paint shop and got three four-quart varnish cans, distributing the explosive in the new cans. With alarm clock attachments, I took the stuff out and buried it in a swamp near the bridge. While working in the swamp, I thought I saw someone coming, so I hurriedly hid the bombs in the weeds. On returning I could only find two of them.

"I set the bombs to explode that night and went back to town. The explosion failed to some extent, the batteries being too weak and I replaced them the next day.

"From Kansas City, I went to Peoria, Ill., where I met Judge Weldon R. Heyburn, who with Edward Smythe, the Iron Workers' business agent, Smythe took me through a cornfield and pointed out the plant of the Eugene Weldon R. Heyburn Company, saying, 'That's the job to be blown up.'

McManigal said he caused the Peoria explosion November 14. It damaged several adjacent buildings.

APPLICATION IS DENIED

Minority Stockholders Sue Asking Intervention on Receiver Deal.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Opposition to the reorganization plan of the United States Motors Company, manufacturers under consolidation of many well-known makes of automobiles, fell flat yesterday when Judge Hough, in the Federal District Court, denied the application of several groups of minority stockholders asking intervention in the suit which has brought about the appointment of receivers.

Lack of jurisdiction and insufficiency of allegations in the bill of the complainant were the grounds of dismissal. Judge Hough contended that the action of the various defendant companies in answering the complaint filed by the Brown & Sharp Manufacturing Company of Rhode Island, plaintiffs in the dissolution suit against the United States Motors Company, practically constituted a waiver of jurisdiction, binding the stockholders and making application to intervene unnecessary and improper.

Another motion on behalf of some minority stockholders of the Columbia Motor Car Company for the production of that concern from the proceedings on the ground that the concern was solvent, was also denied. A proposed bill of sale in accordance with the provisions of the decree of foreclosure was submitted by the receivers. The sale has been fixed for January, the day to be set next Monday.

DIETRICH BOOM LAUNCHED

Federal Judge's Friends Would See Him in Senatorial Chair.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 12.—(Special.)—A boom for Judge Frank S. Dietrich, of the Federal Court for the jurisdiction of Idaho, was launched here yesterday by his friends for United States Senator elective by the next Idaho Legislature to succeed the late Weldon R. Heyburn, and his recess successor to be appointed by Governor Hawley. Judge Dietrich is now at Moscow holding court.

The boom of Judge Dietrich brings four men of prominence into the senatorial race, the three others being ex-Governor Gooding, ex-Governor Brady and Judge James F. Allison, of the Supreme bench. All three are actively working among members-elect of the Legislature.

Hugo Facilities Hit by Company. SALEM, Or., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Complaint has been filed with the State Railroad Commission by the Hugo Development Company, in which it is alleged that shippers of wood and lumber are suffering from discrimination from alleged inadequate facilities furnished by the Southern Pacific at that point.

Young Anarchist Kills Foremost Statesman of Spain.

Premier's Body Viewed by Public as It Lies in Chamber of Deputies. Elegy Received in Silence by Republican Members.

of society will not triumph, for we are all united to defend society."

Body Viewed by Public. The Premier's body later was taken to the Chamber of Deputies, where the public was admitted to view it. The funeral probably will take place tomorrow with all the honors accorded a general who died at his post of duty.

Throughout the evening thousands assembled in the streets and other thousands passed through the chamber to witness the lying in state. All the diplomatic corps paid their tribute of respect. When the wife of the Premier arrived she fell in a faint over his body.

Premier Opponent of Clericalism. Jose Canalejas y Mondes, Prime Minister of Spain, who was assassinated today, was selected to form the Spanish Cabinet in February, 1910. He was leader of the Monarchist Democratic party which came into power on the resignation of the Liberal Cabinet headed by Senor Moret y Prendergast.

Senor Canalejas, who belonged to a wealthy and prominent family, came to the front in political life only in 1908, when he took a leading part in the campaign against Clericalism. He had, however, taken great interest in politics as a student and public speaker for many years before that. At the age of 25 he became a member of the Spanish Parliament, attaching himself to the advanced liberal section. He became a member of Premier Sagasta's Cabinet in 1903, as Minister of Agriculture. He introduced many reforms, especially in regard to the working classes, and eventually created a department of labor.

When he was asked in February, 1910, by King Alfonso, to form a Ministry, the request caused a great sensation, and it was the first time in the history of Spain that an advanced radical had been placed at the head of the Ministry. His Cabinet has since undergone many changes, but he has always retained the leading place. He had much to do with the signing of the agreement between Spain and France on the question of the future of Morocco, which was recently satisfactorily settled.

Break With Vatican Headed. The plan introduced by Senor Canalejas for the separation of church and state in Spain caused a rupture of relations between that country and the Vatican. These have since been resumed, and the question of separation is being discussed with a view to a friendly settlement. The Spanish Government, however, insists on the supremacy of the civil power.

Senor Canalejas visited New York in 1907, just before the outbreak of the Spanish-American War. It was stated at the time that his mission was to study the sentiment of the American people and of the administration regarding Cuban affairs, but it was hinted that he was intrusted with a secret diplomatic mission to offer pecuniary inducements to the Cuban leaders to stop the rebellion in Cuba. He denied the truth of the report. He was at that time editor of El Heraldo de Madrid.

POPE IS DEEPLY AFFECTED. Crime Attributed to Stamping Out of Religion in Spain.

ROME, Nov. 12.—The assassination of Premier Canalejas of Spain produced the deepest impression here, especially at the Vatican, where the remembrance is still vivid of his energetic struggle against the religious orders.

Cardinal Merry del Val received news of the crime early in the afternoon in a cipher telegram from Madrid. He went immediately to the Pope and communicated the news to him, using great precaution not to shock him. The Pope was deeply affected and expressed his horror at the crime, exclaiming:

"This comes from stamping out religion in the most Catholic country. His holiness then knelt and remained absorbed in prayer for the safety of Spain.

The impression produced on Cardinal Merry del Val was profound, as he himself, a Spaniard and together with Cardinal Vives y Tuto possesses the most powerful influence with the Pope and gives the present pontificate a somewhat Spanish atmosphere.

DEATH IS BLOW TO LIBERALS. Washington Doubts Party Leader Can Be Found to Take Place.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—It is believed here that the assassin of the Spanish Premier may have been connected with the proposed anti-strike bill being discussed in the Spanish Cortes. The assassin, it is said, may have been a fanatic who was opposed to the measure.

The bill, introduced as a result of the recent railroad strike in Spain, provided that no strike would be permitted which might tend to be revolutionary in character or which might be looked on as injurious to the nation as a whole.

The opinion was expressed that the death of Canalejas would probably be a hard blow to the Liberal party. He had held the various factions of the party together nearly three years that he had served as Premier, but it was doubted whether any other Liberal leader could do so well.

Count Ramones, another prominent Liberal leader, was mentioned as a probable successor for this spot. Senor Canalejas' visit to Washington prior to the Spanish-American War led to a sensational incident which attracted widespread public attention. He conferred with Senor Du Puy de Lome, then Spanish Minister at Washington, in reference to the American attitude on the Cuban rebellion against Spain.

On his return to Madrid, Senor Du Puy de Lome wrote Canalejas a long letter dealing with political conditions in the United States as affecting the Cuban rebellion and making unfavorable allusions to President McKinley. A copy of this letter fell into the hands of the Cuban junta in Washington and became public.

This precipitated a serious diplomatic incident. The Spanish Minister on inquiry from this Government admitted the accuracy of the letter and prepared to resign. Without delay for this spot, the American Government sent Senor Du Puy de Lome his passports and he was at once relieved of his functions as Minister. He was succeeded by Senor Polo y Bernabe, who remained in charge of Spanish affairs up to the breaking out of the war.

SPANISH MINISTER LAMENTS. Canalejas Rated as Strongest Man in Nation—Loss Held Irreparable.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 12.—Don Juan Blay y Fayago, the Spanish Minister to the United States, today lamented the assassination of Premier Canalejas. Senor Blay said: "Spain has lost the strongest man in the country. The loss is almost irreparable. He was a man of high ideals and one of the most capable in Spain. He had enacted many reforms, especially in educational matters, and he obtained many liberties for the mass of the people. I do not know of any man who can fill his place. He was democratic in all his actions."

BURNS ARRANGED LABOR REPORT

Federation Council Holds Society Was to Blame for McNamara's Crime.

HOME WORK IS OPPOSED

Convention Urged to Aid in Measures for Abolishment—Opposition to Boy Scout Movement May Be Withdrawn.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 12.—The second day's session of the convention of the American Federation of Labor was occupied almost entirely with the reading of the report of the executive council.

William J. Burns was arraigned as an example of his own characterization of private detectives, and the investigation of the Federation since the McNamara trial was declared to be a concerted attempt by employers associations and subsidized newspapers to destroy the Federation and bring its officers into disrepute.

First Vice-President Duncan began the report at 10:15 o'clock this morning and after a two-hour recess for lunch, he concluded at 4:04 this afternoon. More than an hour in the afternoon session was occupied with the section dealing with the McNamara case and Detective Burns.

Home Work Opposed. Other parts of the report recommended that the convention take measures to aid in the movement for abolition of the Boy Scout movement.

Part of the afternoon session was taken up with a dispute over seating delegates from the American Flint Glass Workers. The delegates were seated by a vote of 177 to 25.

Senor Blay said: "The McNamara case was a social crime. Thinking people, who were made to realize the poisonous atmosphere of industrial life, were well-nigh overwhelmed by the weight of collective responsibility devolving upon them as a result of the existence of such conditions."

"The McNamara case either were criminally insane or insanely criminal. Their condition due to imperfect education, incomplete education or defective mentality.

"In any case society is responsible for not remedying the conditions. What concerns labor and society generally is preventive measures and human betterment, so that life and working conditions may be pure, wholesome and clean. Those infected by deadly social poisons, due to social neglect, are the heritage of our own aims and those of our fellow men."

Of Burns' connection with the McNamara case the report said in part: "Burns has not and could not substantiate his oft-stated statement: 'Gomper knew.'"

The report charges that Burns made it clear that officers of the Federation were the "higher ups," and that when Gomper made reply "This turned upon him the brunt of the attack."

BEAUTIFUL GIRL ENIGMA. MANY THINK YOUNG WOMAN IS EVELYN THAW.

Venice, Cal., Beach Resort Stirred by Person Who Is Said to Resemble Missing Wife of Slayer.

VENICE, Cal., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Evelyn Thaw, a chorus beauty, former model and wife of the man who shot Stanford White, is believed by many to be living incognito with a friend in Venice, Cal., where they have been seen on the street and in cafes during the last 10 days.

Aside from this assertion the identity of the woman whose beauty has stirred the beach town is a mystery. No one seems to know just where she stays. She appears on the street during the middle of the afternoon for a short walk, then drops from sight until late in the evening, when she is seen along the board walk or in one of the cafes. Usually she is with a companion and both are heavily veiled.

Several persons who formerly lived in New York assert that she is the same model who won the heart of Harry Thaw. They assert they know her in the East, saw her many times at Madison Square Garden and are positive.

At any rate the beach city is greatly stirred over the report of her presence and wherever she goes she is followed by curious persons.

It is now known that she has disappeared from her home in New York.

TAFT TO FILL VACANCIES

Appointments to Be Made Regardless of Change of Administration.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—President Taft said today that he planned to fill all vacancies occurring before March 4 without regard to the approaching change of administration. There are several important appointive offices now vacant including the commissioner-ship of the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the office of chief of the Bureau of Chemistry.

The President intimated that President-elect Wilson probably would find all positions filled when he came into office.

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situation is becoming strained between the factions. The fight is so bitter, with John Nugent as leader, assisted by Robert H. Elder, National committeeman from this city, on one side, and Governor Hawley, Fred T. Dubois and K. I. Perky on the other side, that it is being carried to Princeton to head off the Hawley faction.

Mr. Elder left for the East last Sunday, Dubois left Boise Saturday and is to meet John Nugent in Chicago, from which place they will journey together to Princeton, and it is said by their friends that they will succeed in obtaining the support of Wilson in securing the distribution of Federal patronage and thereby completely down the Hawley faction.

An effort was made to keep the mission of the political pilgrims to Princeton quiet, but the facts have become known, and there will be some lively skirmishing among the different factions in the city until one faction or the other is quiescent. It is said by those close to the pilgrims that they have the documents to defeat Dubois and the distribution of Federal patronage from his control, and intend to lay the matter before Wilson in such a manner that he will give heed to their side of the controversy.
