"Absolutely nothing doing on a game with Whitman," is the message which comes over the telephone wires from Coach Dobie of the University of Washington team at Seattle. "We are willing to play Washington December 8," replies Coach Hahn, of Whitman. Whether or not Dobie will be allowed to dominate the Washington policies remain to be seen, but the chances are if Whitman defeats the Oregon Aggies Saturday student sentiment will crash aside Dobie's peroxidic feelings; at any rate there will be no issue as to "who's afraid?" That much has been disclosed already.

"We pay Dobie \$3000 a year and his assistant coach, Eakins, \$500," said a Washington official in Portland Sunday. "Dobie is the most unscrupulous mortal in the world and his petty foibles cost us hundreds of dollars in addition to that. We pay close to \$125 before every game clearing pebbles and clouds off Denny Field to suit Dobie's whims. He forces us to re-clean all the shoes before each game, while new uniforms from head to foot must be purchased every Fall and kept in perfect trim the whole campaign through."

"He costs us a lot of money and I think we are entitled to a deciding of the championship," added the Seattle man. "It keeps Zednick guessing to make both ends meet financially."

Dobie's value, of course, rests in his ability to win games and one can hardly blame him for trying to evade a contest that he knows will be a hard one. Whitman has always been a tough nut for the Purple and Gold. The two schools have not met since 1910, when Washington won 17 to 0. In 1908 Washington barely won 10 to 9 and in 1909 6 to 0.

A game this Fall would undoubtedly be a hummer and those who saw the Oregon Aggies batter their heavier opponents around Multnomah Field believe Whitman can beat a game would undoubtedly draw close to \$10,000 on a good day.

If Washington and Whitman finally agree to terms Dow Walker, of the Multnomah Club, will make strenuous efforts to have the championship battle played in Portland. It is not believed that Whitman will consent to journey to Seattle, nor is it likely that Spokane will please Washington, while Walla Walla could not attract the crowd. That leaves Portland the most probable location. Such a game would undoubtedly draw close to \$10,000 on a good day.

If no Washington-Whitman game is agreed to there is a still further chance that Multnomah and Whitman may meet in Portland. Mr. Walker telegraphed Coach Hahn yesterday and received an answer regarding an arrangement. The two eleven's last met about four years ago, Multnomah winning by a small margin. Up to that year annual games were scheduled.

Whitman College will be in Portland Thursday afternoon and will practice on Multnomah Field, en route to Corvallis.

While the Eastern football championship will not be settled until Yale and Harvard meet, the coming Saturday will dispose of the question of supremacy in the Middle West. Minnesota meeting Wisconsin in Minneapolis and the Northwest Washington and Oregon hooked up at Seattle and Whitman and the Oregon Aggies at Corvallis.

One of the most interesting tangle of the Haveringians believe they can win and atone for their previous defeat by soundly beating back into the running. Of course, it will be necessary for Harvard to defeat Yale and for Dartmouth to wallow Harvard from head to sound well, but makes actual justification rather circuitous. Cup Challenger May Send Another
Shamrock Model to San Francisco
to Compete in 1915

Sir Thomas Lipton, the titled tea merchant known to American sportsmen as the persistent challenger of the yacht supremacy held for years by the United States, will be in Portland Friday and Saturday of this week. While here he will be a guest at the Portland Press Club and the Commercial Club.

The far-famed owner of numerous "Shamrocks" is on his way to San Francisco to confer with the directors of the Panama-Pacific Exposition relative to the international yacht and power-boat races during 1915. He has been traversing the continent by express through Canada, and will make the trip to San Francisco down the Coast from British Columbia points.

The success of the yacht meet, from an international standpoint, depends largely upon the attitude of Sir Thomas. Should he decide to bring another Shamrock model on both sides of the Atlantic will fall into line to make the event the biggest in the history of the pastime.

Portland Men Going, Too.
It was at first planned to have Portland representatives at the California meeting accompany Lipton on the trip from Portland to San Francisco, but Elwood Wiles and George S. Shepherd, two of the Portland delegates, will leave Sunday night, joining Miller Freeman, of Seattle, and other Washington men on the Shasta Limited.

Wiles and Shepherd returned Monday morning from the Tacoma meeting of the International Power-Boat Association, with the news that Everett, and not Astoria, is the probable scene of the 1915 Pacific Coast championship motor-boat regatta. The matter has not been definitely settled, but the 1909 Everett guarantee, coupled with the lukewarmness of the Astoria people, practically assures the meet for the inland city.

Elwood Wiles was elected vice-commander of the association, while Mr. Shepherd is one of the five members of the council. B. F. Jacobs, of Tacoma, is commander.

Jurisdiction May Be Extended.
An effort will be made to extend the jurisdiction of the international association to include California points at the coming meeting. Miller Freeman, of Seattle, and Sam Perkins, of the Tacoma Ledger, and Elwood Wiles, of Portland, were named committeemen to represent the association at the meeting. Their principal duty will be to amalgamate all power-boat interests on the Coast so that a strong front may be presented to Easterners in the effort to induce them to send boats to San Francisco for the 1915 meet.

"I am satisfied that we can bring the Harmsworth trophy event to San Francisco in 1915," says Mr. Shepherd, who has been negotiating with Eastern people for some time. "But we must work together in the matter."

CLASS A RATING SEEMS FAR AWAY

Northwestern Leaguers Get
Little Solace From Farrell
in Their Fight.

TINKER WANTS BEAVERS

McCredie Refers Offer to Buy Club
to Judge—Magnates Busy With
Trades and Purchases—Salary
Limit Is Agreed Upon.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—The minors did absolutely nothing today in the way of transacting business for the association at the opening formalities of the National Association meeting today, but the Northwestern Leaguers, who were informed by arrival of D. E. Dugdale and Walter McCredie, were a busy aggregation, buttonholing other delegates with reference to class ratings, which they so much desire. President Fielder Jones, with all of his directors, talked over the situation and held many private consultations with other league magnates. Jones reiterated his statement that the Coast League had promised not to interfere with the plans, and Dugdale seems to feel there is reasonable prospect of the deal going through.

They admit that without counting Portland they can't show the necessary million population, but they claim that special privilege ought to be granted them if necessary.

Northwesterners Are Opposed.
Secretary J. H. Farrell told Jones it was his understanding when use of the Portland territory was granted the Northwestern League an agreement was signed that the Northwestern body would not include Portland at any time in making a request for admission to the Coast League at a recent meeting postponed action on granting the right of Portland to Jones' league is held to understand how the Northwesterners can include that city.

Cal Ewing is laying back on his oars and still insists he is against the gathering of his neighbors, so it is hard to account for the elation of the Northwesterners, which looks rather to be misplaced confidence. The matter may come up for consideration although it will likely not be disposed of until the last day of the session.

According to Cal Ewing he had been authorized by Joe Tinker to make an offer for the Portland Class AA franchise. Tinker played third base for the old Portland Northwest team, but is now in the big end of the game.

It is not likely that other National League clubs would let Tinker get away, even if Charles Webb Murphy should be agreed to. Tinker would be a valuable asset to the Reds, although it is not definitely settled. Tinker and Johnny Evers, and the other players of the Cubs, are about as friendly as two strange bulldogs, judging from what Evers says, and it is certain that Tinker would refuse to play for Evers.

Turner Eligible as Owner.
Of course even an ineligible player, Tinker could own Portland if McCredie felt like selling out, but he could not play or manage for the team. Now is it probable Portland will think of disposing of a club that nets him a tidy profit each year. Ewing didn't talk over the matter with Walter McCredie, but he will put the proposition up to the judge.

Walter McCredie arrived this morning but says he does not intend to manage the team. He will play for the team and make some deals. Just at present, he is about as communicative as a clam in regard to his baseball prospects.

They haven't any idea of making trades," he said, "but may buy some player outright. Any players I would be willing to trade I would just as soon give away."

Northwesterners got busy with some baseball purchases and once more it is lanky Connie Mack who figures on the scene. The Athletics bought two men from Mack. One is Gipe, former Vernon twirler, and the other Barry, a college boy from Santa Clara. Gipe will play pitcher to take the place of James and Thompson and that he is well satisfied with the transaction.

Joe Cohn, of Spokane, purchased "Noverliki" from the Athletics. Noverliki is a youngster who was the hero of a no-hit no-run game against Detroit last season, and is reported to be a good pitcher.

Good First Sacker Available.
There is chance for some Coast League Club to secure the services of a rattling good first sacker. Joe Cantillon, manager and first owner of the Minneapolis team, gave Cal Ewing permission to talk business with Dr. Warren Gill, who was at one time with Pittsburgh and for several seasons with the Athletics. Dr. Gill is a dentist and already located in Los Angeles. He absolutely refused to leave that state, although he would like to continue with the Athletics. Cantillon doesn't want to let Gill go, but he will not stand in his way.
