DEPENDANT WINS PERSONAL INQUIRY SUIT.—The damage suit of James Harvey against the Hurley-Mason Company to recover \$15,000 damages for personal injuries, received during the construction of the Lipman, Wolfe & Co. building, came to a successful conclusion today when Judge Bean directed the jury to return a verdict for the defendant after the testimony of the plaintiff had been introduced. Judge Bean summed up the testimony, in detail, and said that there was every reason to believe that it was one of those unavoidable accidents that do happen, even when all connected with the work are striving to avoid them.

THANKSGIVING FREEDOM ASSURED.—Two Federal prisoners will have completed their sentences in time to take their Thanksgiving dinners in freedom, although unable to be at their homes. Al Newman, completed his sentence of 30 days for selling liquor in Linn County without a license and paid a fine of \$250. Bill Bassett completed his sentence of six months for selling liquor to Indians and paid an additional fine of \$100. Both are men of comparative good incomes and will celebrate the day with the best turkey dinner that they can find.

IRON FALLS, BREAKS MAN'S LEG.—A piece of iron standing by the curb at Fifth and Alder streets, where the Portland Wire & Iron Works is erecting fire escapes, was knocked over by a team of horses yesterday, and in falling struck R. J. Furbeck, 644 Everett street, and broke his leg. The injured man was taken to Meier & Frank's store and later conveyed to his home.

ADMINISTRATRIX RETURNS MONEY.—Mrs. C. J. Reed, administratrix of the estate of Charles Jerome Reed, her husband, who was in 1909 and 1910 United States Marshal for Oregon, yesterday petitioned the Probate Court for and received permission to turn over to the Attorney-General of the United States a money order on the Victoria, B. C. office of the Dominion Express Company for \$1 and cash orders on the Victoria, B. C. branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce aggregating \$70.10. Mrs. Reed says that the orders were given to Mr. Reed as part of his expense money in extraditing two prisoners from British Columbia to Portland and do not belong to the estate. Mr. Reed did not need the money and hence did not cash the orders and evidently overlooked returning them.

POLITICAL SUBJECTS ARE STUDIED.—Preparatory to voting on city affairs next year the Mount Scott Women's Christian Temperance Union and the Woodstock Women's Christian Temperance Union started the study of political subjects at their meetings Tuesday. The Mount Scott Union met at the home of Mrs. D. McKinley, and Mrs. L. P. Addison, National leaders, led the study on political questions. She urged the importance of careful consideration of all political topics so that the women may be prepared to vote intelligently. The commission form of city government was considered by the Woodstock Union at the meeting given to the home of Mrs. Drew. Mrs. Robert McCourt presided.

CABINET PLACE FOR TEAL URGED.—Joseph N. Teal was unanimously endorsed for the appointment of Secretary of State in President-elect Wilson's Cabinet at the meeting of the North Portland Commercial Club Tuesday night in the Kenton fire hall. Resolutions were introduced by S. L. Woodward, who said that the Pacific Coast should be represented in the new administration. He said that Mr. Teal would represent the Northwest as no other man could. The resolutions will be sent to the President-elect. It was decided that the club should take under consideration the telephone rates charged on the Peninsula, as it was the sense of the meeting that they are too high.

PROPERTY OWNERS TO APPEAL.—Property owners on Washington street, between Eleventh and Fifteenth streets, who were unsuccessful in their efforts to have the County Board of Equalization reduce their assessments, yesterday filed at the Courthouse notice of intention to appeal to the Circuit Court from the decision of the board. The assessments of these owners were advanced approximately 50 per cent over 1911 and vigorous concerted protest resulted. County Assessor Sigler defended his action on the ground that they had got off lightly in earlier years.

PERSONAL INQUIRY VERDICT RETURNED.—Mathison & Anderson, contractors, lost in Circuit Court yesterday a personal injury suit in which Jacob Scheuerman, a former employee, was plaintiff. The jury returned a verdict for \$145 in Scheuerman's favor. He advanced approximately \$10,000 as compensation for injuries received when he fell down a light well in a building being constructed by Mathison & Anderson, near Fourth and Stark streets.

SANDY BOULEVARD PAVING TO BE COMPLETED.—I. N. Day, manager for the Independent Paving Company, reported to the Rose City Park Improvement League that he expects to complete the contract for the improvement of Sandy boulevard within the time required by the contract, January 1, provided freezing weather does not prevent. Work has been started laying the top dressing on the south side of the boulevard from the north end at East Seventy-second street.

CITY CURATOR RESIGNS.—Because of the heavy duties which must be performed by the City Curator, Deputy City Auditor Wisconsin who has been serving in that capacity yesterday tendered his resignation. An attempt will be made to fill the position by appointment heretofore having had no salary provision.
