

GREECE EXPECTED TO REJOIN ALLIES

Provision in Protocol That Besieged Forts Shall Not Be Revictualled Is Concession.

AUSTRIA DELAYS ACTION

Stand as to Ambassadorial Conference Depends on Greek Government Sends Touching Appeal to Balkan States.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—No news has yet been received that Greece has signed the armistice, although she is expected to do so, as the protocol provides that the besieged garrisons are not to be provisioned. Greece had strongly objected to their being revictualled.

The fact that Turkey has agreed to this clause is held to indicate that there is no likelihood of the immediate surrender of the fortresses.

Austria Delays Action.

It is possible that two conferences may be sitting concurrently at London after next week. The proposal for the ambassadorial conference reached the Austrian foreign office today and is said to have been received sympathetically by the Austrian cabinet. Count von Berchtold, however, is delaying his reply until he has consulted with the other members of the triple alliance.

As Germany is known to favor the conference it is believed that Austria will embrace the proposal, and the ambassadors are likely to meet at the same time as the peace delegates.

Greeks Make Touching Appeal.

With respect to the dispute between the allies, it appears that the Greek government last Saturday addressed a dignified and touching appeal to the governments of the allies beseeching them to take no action calculated to weaken or endanger the league.

At the same time, Greece offered all her naval and military resources in case Turkey declined to accept terms less damaging to what Greece regarded as the allies' best interests.

It is understood that this appeal forms an important historical document, which will show that Greece far from having any intention to break away from the league, made the strongest efforts to maintain it in its original form.

VOICE OF ITALY IS RAISED

Occupation of Aegean Islands Complicates Balkan Dealings.

ROME, Dec. 4.—After two days' discussion, the peace treaty between Turkey and Italy, known as the treaty of Lausanne, has been approved by the Chamber of Deputies. The vote was 338 to 24, the latter being cast by Socialists.

Premier Giolitti in replying to the various speeches in the chamber today said the occupation by Italy of islands in the Aegean Sea was merely a military measure and had been so declared by the powers. Peace between Italy and Turkey had been concluded before the declaration of war between Turkey and the Balkan states. Therefore, he argued, Greece could make no complaint with regard to these islands.

Italy, continued the Premier, had asked for guarantees for the protection of the inhabitants of the islands in case of evacuation. If this occurred before peace was arranged between Greece and Turkey, Italy could not oppose their occupation by Greece. If evacuation occurred after the conclusion of peace, Italy could fulfill whatever terms were agreed to in the treaty between Turkey and the Balkan allies. At any rate through the treaty, Italy was free to make her voice heard in the European concert in favor of the legitimate interests of other peoples.

GREECE WILL CONTINUE WAR

Athens Press Believes Country Will Act Independently.

ATHENS, Dec. 4.—Commenting on the conclusion of the armistice, the Athens newspapers express the conviction that the Greek government will continue the war without her allies.

According to advices from Saloniki, the Greeks are meeting with considerable opposition in Epirus. The Turkish army, which retreated from Monastir has not surrendered, but the submission of small detachments continues.

An official communication issued by the minister of marine, describing the operations of the Greek fleet during the war, gives details of the capture of 13,000 Bulgarian troops and 3000 animals. The transports and escorting warships left Saloniki on the morning of November 27 and reached Dedeaqatch at 1 o'clock the afternoon of the following day, and were greeted by a squadron of the Greek Aegean fleet.

The Bulgarian troops were drawn up on the deck and cheered heartily. The work of disembarkation was suspended at nightfall and continued the next morning. All were landed safely by the night of November 29. The fleet then left Dedeaqatch.

ARMISTICE IS NOT LIMITED

Provision for Revictualing of Garrisons Is Abandoned.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 4.—An official note issued this evening says: "An armistice has been concluded with Bulgaria, Serbia and Montenegro. The state of war with Greece continues."

Although the complete terms of the protocol have not been made public, it is learned that the question of revictualing the beleaguered towns was abandoned, the government being satisfied that the towns were sufficiently supplied with foodstuffs to last until the conclusion of peace.

The only condition mentioned in the official communication to the press is that the troops will remain in the positions now occupied.

It is understood that no limit has been fixed to the armistice, which may be terminated by 48 hours' notice by either side.

It is reported that the Turkish and Bulgarian delegations will meet again tomorrow at Baghche for the purpose of arranging preliminaries for the peace conference.

Astoria Host to Birds.

ASTORIA, Or., Dec. 4.—(Special.)—The second annual poultry show by the Lower Columbia River Poultry Association was opened today and several hundred birds of the various highest class breeds on exhibit. ORE VALUES SMALL

Expert Testifies to Silver in Hawthorne Mine.

LOW GRADE IS USELESS

Writer Declared to Have Made Capital of Fact Company Was Actually "Taking Out Silver Ore Today."

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—William J. Clark, a manufacturer of Salem, O., and Colonel Charles H. Heyl, United States Army, retired, today identified letters which they had received from Julian Hawthorne, the writer, who, with Josiah Quincy, Dr. William J. Morton and Albert Freeman, is on trial in the United States District Court charged with fraudulent use of the mails in promoting Canadian mining claims. In reply to one of the letters Hawthorne wrote: "We are actually taking out silver ore today."

He urged the writer to employ an expert to investigate, saying: "It will serve your purpose better than any statement I might make."

Writer Not "Professor."

George Walker, of Boston, testified he wrote an article that appeared in a Boston publication under the caption: "Cobalt Mines Are Making Good." He said he was not a professor, as was stated in a circular letter written by Hawthorne, which the prosecution offered in evidence as calculated to create the impression that the Temagami-Cobalt was being commended in Walker's article.

Joseph T. Handy, a mining engineer employed by one of the paying Canadian mines, testified he made an examination of the Temagami-Cobalt property in October, 1908, for Dr. Morton. The results of assays 39 specimens of ore showed, he said, "what mining engineers would call scarcely a trace of silver."

Low-Grade Ore Valueless.

The low-grade ore ore shipped from Cobalt was 92 ounces to the ton and ores of less silver mineralization than that could not be profitably shipped.

Referring on cross-examination to a report that Mr. Handy admitted he probably had made of finding of from five to 10 ounces of silver to the ton in one mine, he said this quantity would not pay to work. "Silver 19 ounces to the ton is no better than silver one ounce to the ton," he declared.

the way for an attack by infantry which cannot be trained in a hurry. The news of the signing of the armistice was not known here until this morning, but it was generally expected. It was a day of driving snow and rain and there were no signs of a celebration of the actual announcement of an event meaning the end of war which resulted in a triumph of the village cause, territorial addition and economic advantage to every individual in the future and the great development of the country. People are going and coming in the street as usual, serious about a serious war.

Calm Attitude Disappointing.

Such a calm attitude is disappointing to the journalists who wanted to write about the cheering crowds courting the streets and excited men standing on the tables in the cafes directing the singing of national songs, but there is nothing of the kind.

With 8000 to 12,000 dead in seven weeks of fighting, the people are considering the cost rather than the celebration as everyone has some relative at the front and is waiting, in the absence of official news for letters to tell whether the loved one is alive or dead. Many superficially wounded are returning home on furloughs. They are bringing the latest news of their peasant village comrades who were killed.

One of these with whom I talked on the way from Mustapha Pasha explained how he had to tell two wives

in his village of the death of their husbands.

"They are ill but do not complain," he said.

DANEFF MAY ACT FOR BULGARS

Public Worried by Attitude of Greece—Forts Bombarded.

SOFIA, Dec. 4.—The Bulgarian delegates to the peace negotiations have not been announced, but it is presumed that Dr. Daneff, president of the Chamber of Deputies, will head the mission, and it is expected he will visit Bucharest before going to London.

Public satisfaction at the completion of the armistice would be deeper but for the attitude of Greece, which not only excites annoyance in official quarters, but also arouses apprehension of future difficulties between Greece and the Balkan allies.

The Sofia newspapers offer no comment on the completion of the armistice or its terms. The people have received the news with any public demonstration. No lists of casualties have appeared since the war began. Many hundreds of families are receiving no news, and relatives await with anxious suspense the return of the troops.

The Mir says the garrison at Adrianople began a heavy bombardment at 8 o'clock last night. It continued until 2 o'clock in the morning, when it suddenly ceased, probably owing to the receipt of the news of the signing of the armistice.

JESUITS TAKE OFFENSE

GERMAN CATHOLICS LOSE CONFIDENCE IN BUNDESRATH.

German Chancellor, Also Condemned, Defends Acts Only as Interpretation of Old Law.

BERLIN, Dec. 4.—The Jesuit question was raised in the Reichstag today by the radical leader, Dr. Peter Shahn, who said the Bundsrath's recent interpretation of the anti-Jesuit law of 1872 had made more severe the provisions of the law, thereby affronting 24,000,000 Catholics in the realm.

He read a formal declaration of the clerical center party to the effect that German Catholics, so far as they are represented by one clerical party in the Reichstag, "have no confidence that the needs of the Catholics in the German empire will receive just consideration from the Imperial Chancellor and the Bundsrath, and will order their conduct accordingly."

The Imperial Chancellor, Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, defended the Bundsrath's decision as only an interpretation of a law 40 years old. This decision in effect holds that Bavaria's recent course in modifying the severity of the encroachment of the Imperial legislation against the Jesuit order in Germany was illegal. The Chancellor said the Protestants always had bitterly opposed the Jesuits, who also in the past had not been tolerated in certain Catholic countries on account of their militant activity in politics, the church and the schools, their international character and their opposition to the growth of the modern conception of the state.

While 24,000,000 Catholics wanted the anti-Jesuit law repealed, continued the Chancellor, 40,000,000 Protestants wanted it retained, and he warned the Centerists against a renewal of the religious conflict of the '70s.

A Socialist speaker assured the Clericals that his party would support any attempt which was made to repeal the law. The two parties together have a big majority in the Reichstag.

DR. SUN YAT SAN IS COMING

Seattle Government Officials Ordered to Prepare for Chinese.

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 4.—Instructions were received from Washington, D. C., today by the local customs and immigration officers to prepare for the early arrival of Dr. Sun Yat San, former Provisional President of the Chinese republic, and other Chinese dignitaries who are expected here soon.

The Department at Washington ordered the local officials to arrange to facilitate the landing of Dr. Sun and his party and to show the distinguished Chinese courtesy. According to the advices from Washington, Dr. Sun will be accompanied by Wang Chung Chung, Hu, former Chinese Minister of Justice; Hu Chen, former Vice-Minister of Justice; and Chenting T. Wang, former Vice-Minister of Industries and Commerce.

EVIDENCE AND ON ADVICE OF LAWYER

Ryan, of Ironworkers' Union, Denies He Knew Check-book Was Destroyed.

McNAMARA FUND UNKNOWN

Defendant in Dynamite Case Tells of Efforts He Made to Resist Removal of Evidence in McNamara Case.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 4.—Frank M. Ryan, indicted president of the Ironworkers' Union, testified at the dynamite conspiracy trial today that after the arrest of the McNamaras he, on advice of counsel, resisted the removal of evidence wanted at Los Angeles, where the McNamaras were charged with murder and dynamiting.

"Knowing James B. McNamara was charged with murder in blowing up the Los Angeles Times building and that J. J. McNamara, secretary of the union, was charged with dynamiting, you were willing to prevent the removal of evidence wanted at Los Angeles," asked District Attorney Miller.

Ryan was willing to resist the removal of the papers anywhere, because I was acting through my attorney," said Mr. Ryan.

The papers referred to were hundreds of letters and records afterwards procured by the Government in connection with the indictment of the 41 men now on trial. The witness named as the attorney who took charge of the union's affairs Leo M. Rappaport, who had testified that after interviewing J. J. McNamara in jail at Los Angeles he returned to Indianapolis and destroyed a check book.

That check book, the Government charges, contained the disbursements by McNamara for the expenses of the "dynamiting crew."

Mr. Ryan was asked whether he consulted about Rappaport's destruction of the check book. He answered he had not been and he never heard that McNamara was drawing \$1000 a month from the union's funds, for which no accounting was given, until the night of McNamara's arrest in April, 1911.

Attorney Helped in Fight.

The witness said he sent various petitions to enable Rappaport to resist the application of the District Attorney of Los Angeles County on Marion County, Indiana, for the union's letter files and records, and to resist the Federal Government in taking over the papers afterwards were turned over to the Government by Herbert Hocking, a defendant charged with "double crossing" the union. Referring to the alleged use of the union's funds for carrying on a "dynamiting campaign," District Attorney Miller asked:

"How much money was issued to McNamara, Hocking, Frank C. Webb, of New York, and Eugene A. Clancy, of San Francisco, that was not accounted for in their salaries and expenses?"

"I never figured it up," answered Ryan.

Knowledge of Explosions Denied.

Ryan testified he saw William E. Reddin, business agent in Milwaukee, before an explosion there in March, 1911, and saw Frank J. Higgins, of Boston, New England organizer of the Ironworkers, and Michael J. Young, of Boston, a business agent at Hartford, Conn., before an explosion at Springfield, Mass., in April, 1911, but he denied knowledge of the explosions.

When objection was made to a repetition of questions put to Ryan, District Attorney Miller said:

"Well, this witness has been dodging the question and I want a straightforward answer."

Judge Anderson ruled that Mr. Miller's characterization was "improper."

PHOEBE DAVIES IS DEAD

Leading Woman in 'Way Down East' Succumbs After Long Illness.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—(Special.)—Phoebe Davies, the actress, who in private life was Mrs. Joseph R. Grismer, wife of the producing manager, died today at her home in Larchmont, N. Y., after a long illness following a serious operation.

Miss Davies had retired from the stage about four years ago after a career as a theatrical star, which concluded with 12 full seasons as leading woman in "Way Down East," in which she was seen by hundreds of thousands of theatergoers.

Portland theatergoers of a generation ago will remember Phoebe Davies and her husband, Joseph R. Grismer. As joint stars they headed the Grismer-Davies Dramatic Company, which played a number of extended engagements at J. R. Howe's New Park.
