

ALLEN WILL SERVE TERM OF 35 YEARS

Compromise Brings to End
Action Against Hillsville
Clansmen.

EDWARDS GETS 27 YEARS

Jury Convicts Sidna Allen of Involuntary Manslaughter With Five-Year Sentence and Other Indictments Are Compromised.

WYTHEVILLE, Va., Dec. 11.—Thirty-five years in the penitentiary is the penalty Sidna Allen will pay for his part in the shooting up of Carroll County Courthouse at Hillsville last March, when five persons, including the presiding judge, the sheriff and the commonwealth's attorney were killed by members of the Allen clan and a number of others were wounded. Allen's nephew, Wesley Edwards, will spend 27 years in the penitentiary.

These sentences were the result of a compromise this afternoon following a verdict of voluntary manslaughter in the case of Sidna Allen for the murder of Commonwealth Attorney William M. Foster, the jury fixing the penalty in that case at five years' imprisonment. Allen already had been found guilty of second-degree murder at a former trial for the killing of Judge Masie, for which he had been sentenced to 15 years in the penitentiary.

Third Indictment Compromised.
Another indictment pending against him for the murder of Sheriff Webb was compromised by letting him plead guilty to second-degree murder and take a 15-year sentence. The combined sentences make 35 years.

Three indictments against Wesley Edwards were compromised, he taking a sentence of nine years' imprisonment in each.

The second trial of Sidna Allen ended today. Nine of the jurors on the first ballot stood for acquittal and the other three for murder in the second degree.

This ends so far as the courts are concerned a tragedy without parallel and which stirred the country from one end to the other. After the conviction last March of Floyd Allen, of an offense that would have sent him to the penitentiary for one year, members of the Allen family opened fire on the court officials. At the first volley, Judge Thornton L. Masie fell mortally wounded and after the fusillade which followed, Sheriff Webb and Commonwealth Attorney Foster were found dead.

Woman Witness Also Killed.
On the following day one of the three jurors who were shot died of his wounds as did also Miss Bettie Ayres, who had been a witness in the case.

Floyd Allen was arrested the day after the tragedy, being too badly wounded to escape. The arrest of the others implicated in the shooting followed at various intervals.

The two whose fate was decided today, eluded the detectives for months, but were traced to Des Moines and captured.

Of the six men who have been convicted of complicity in the shooting, Floyd Allen and his son, Claude, are under sentence of death, while Sidna and Fred Allen, and Wesley Edwards have been given long terms in the penitentiary.

Victor Allen, a son of Floyd, was acquitted and Byrd Mason was charged because of lack of evidence against him.

Governor Mann granted today a reprieve until January 17 to Floyd and Claude Allen, who were to have been electrocuted next Friday at Richmond.

were members, accumulated vast holdings of copper. The market price, he said, was 25 cents a pound, but the sales during that time amounted to about 925,000 pounds, as against 11-32,000 in March of that year. Mr. Wolfson said his company held the metal because to have sold it would have forced the price down and embarrassed the producing companies. The United Selling Company advanced money on the metal to the producing companies that wished to sell through it. His company, he added, was finally forced to dump the metal on the market in October of that year.

Stock Held Until Slump.
Mr. Untermyer produced the record of operations in Amalgamated stock from 1900 to date to show that there was great activity in the purchase of the stock for a year prior to March, 1907. At that time, when the metal was being held, he said, great quantities of the stock were sold on the exchange, evidently from the accumulation of former purchases. Despite sales of 2,147,000 shares in March of that year, the price, which had been 121, was maintained thereafter during the period the copper metal was held until when the metal was released in October, the stock dropped to 55.

Mr. Untermyer endeavored to get Mr. Wolfson to connect these two transactions, but without result.

Mr. Wolfson said that about that time his company controlled the sale of about 50 or 60 per cent of the entire copper output of the country.

Clearing House Defended.
Walter E. Frew, chairman of the New York Clearing House committee, appeared by agreement to explain further the rules of the clearing house.

Mr. Frew put into the record a report by the clearing house committee on inland exchange, showing the cost of and the charge for making out-of-town collections during 1911. The report showed a profit to the banks on such collection charges of \$97,000 for the year. It showed total charges for collections as \$2,129,551, and the cost of making collections as \$1,176,162.

In addition to the cost of collection, the report also charges \$169,461.75 for share of rent, postage, salaries, etc., and \$296,560 as loss of interest.

Mr. Untermyer confronted the witness with a letter from Frank A. Vanderlip, the New York banker, declaring that the banks suffered a loss of about \$2,000,000 a year on out-of-town collections. Mr. Frew declared he did not wish to criticize Mr. Vanderlip.

WOMAN IS VIGOROUS

Mrs. Littleton Demands Purchase of Monticello.

STRIKING METHODS USED

Democratic Representatives From New York, Rallying to Support of Fellow-Member, Cause Halt in Plans.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—Mrs. Martin W. Littleton, wife of the well-known New York attorney, is waging an unceasing crusade for the governmental ownership of Monticello, the birthplace and burial place of Thomas Jefferson. At present she is bombarding Washington with full-page advertisements in the newspapers, telling why the government should buy Monticello from Representative Levy, of New York, whose first name is Jefferson and who owns the historic estate, and urging Congress to pass a bill for its purchase. Mrs. Littleton has waged her campaign so vigorously that she has become known as Washington's "woman lobbyist of the hour." She has used many striking methods of bringing the Congressmen around to her way of thinking. Petitions by the yard have been presented, and now the newspaper advertisements are setting the whole Capital talking.

But Mrs. Littleton has struck a snag at least. The Democratic Representatives in Congress from New York State have come to the rescue of their fellow member and have gone on record in a caucus as opposing the proposed purchase. The Senate has passed the necessary resolution, and it is up to the House for action. It now remains to be seen what the result of the opposition of Mr. Levy's fellow Representatives will be.

AMERICAN WOMAN ALIEN

Marriage in Illinois to Frechman Delays Landing From Liner.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 11.—Mrs. Lorton Blair, who says that she was born in Danville, Ill., was taken into custody by immigration inspectors as she stepped today from the Pacific Mail liner Persia, from the Orient.

In Danville she was married four

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years ago to a native of France, and because she thus acquired the nationality of her husband she must remain in detention until certain details concerning her papers can be investigated. As baggage she has 16 trunks, and she wore expensive furs and many jewels.

On the trip across the Pacific Mrs. Blair was second in a cigarette-smoking contest, her record having been 50 cigarettes a day for 17 days. Mrs. Blair expressed indignation at her detention and threatened to cause trouble for the inspectors.

STRATEGY LANDS ROBBER

Hold-Up Man Fled and Delivered to Police by F. W. Isherwood.

Harry Wilson, a steelworker from Los Angeles, was arrested last night by the strategy of Felix W. Isherwood, of 1054 Quimby street, manager of the Bridge and Beach Manufacturing Company.

Wilson, who is but 19 years old, bought a revolver for \$1.50 yesterday, and last night about 7 o'clock waited at Twenty-eighth and Raleigh streets for a passerby. Mr. Isherwood came, and Wilson thrust the gun into his face. Then he relieved the business man of a dollar and started to leave, warning Mr. Isherwood not to make any outcry.

At this point Mr. Isherwood recovered his nerve, and promised Wilson that if he would return the dollar, he would get him a meal and find work for him. Wilson accompanied Mr. Isherwood home and was provided with a meal, and the police notified.

Patrolmen Bales and Schirmer arrested Wilson as he sat at the table. Wilson said that he bought his gun and black mask from "Blue" Woodard, a holdup man who left last night for Seattle, and that Woodard also indicated and instructed him in the art of the masked gentlemen of the highway.

REJECTED SUITOR KILLS
GIRL SAYS DUTY FORBIDS HER MARRIAGE; MAN SHOOT.

Woeer Murders Sweetheart for Whom He Had Bought Trousseau, Then Kills Himself.

SHERIDAN, Wyo., Dec. 11.—Her refusal to marry Peter Jorgensen, a mining engineer here, cost Maxine Clayton her life this afternoon. She came here from Springfield, Ill., recently. Refused for the last time today, Jorgensen ended a wooing that began in their childhood by shooting her through the heart and sending a bullet through his own head.

When the young woman came to Wyoming Jorgensen followed and got a position with a mining company near here. A few days ago she consented

to marry him and he gave her money to buy a trousseau. She changed her mind today.

"It is a case of love and what I call duty," she explained, "but which you will probably call something else. If I marry you I cannot support mother and my sisters."

He urged that he would take care of her family.

"That would be too much of a burden," said the young woman.

Jorgensen stepped back, drew a revolver and fired. She fell dead at the first shot. A second shot and he dropped dead by her side.

LAST RITES PAID TO HERO
Vancouver Barracks Men Play Dirge at Williams' Funeral.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Dec. 11.—(Special.)—With the Second Field Artillery band playing a dirge and an score of 16 soldiers from the Twenty-first Infantry, the body of Captain Robert Williams, hero of the blockhouse siege of 1895, at the Middle Cascades, and

last of that famous band of nine who were rescued by Colonel Stepien, was escorted to the City Cemetery today for interment. At the grave taps were sounded and the escort fired three volleys.

Services were held at 2 o'clock at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. D. Tooley, Rev. C. R. G. Poole, of the First Baptist Church, officiating. A duet was sung by Mrs. William N. Marshall and Mrs. George B. Simpson. The active

bearers were six sergeants from the Twenty-first Infantry: Sergeants Francis E. Ulmer, William Wren, Max Buckman, Thomas B. Pratt, John Malloy and Hugh Friel. The honorary pallbearers were all members of the Spanish-American War Veterans, of the local camp: Glen N. Ranck, Sergeant McSparran, Charles Cook, Fred W. Tompkins, A. H. Fletcher and Charles Hasson.
