WHEAT CAKES

Sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar into mixing bowl; add milk very gradually, beating smooth. Add well-beaten egg and melted butter or cream. "Bake" on a hot griddle, slightly 1-2 cups flour even teaspoons baking powder 1-2 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons sugar 1 1-2 cups milk but evenly greased. Do not have cakes too thick; as soon as lightly browned on both sides, spread egg 1 teaspoon melted butter or two one side with butter, roll them up and serve of rich cream immediately on a warmed plate.
