

FRIENDSHIP MOVED JUDGE SAYS JURIST

Archbald Explains Motive of
Negotiating With Lehigh
and Erie Officials.

ACCUSED'S WIFE ON STAND

Trip to Europe Enjoyed at Expense
of Great Northern Director,
Alleged Due to Fact That
Families Are Related.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Friendship for his Scranton associates with whom he had lived and worked for years, was the motive that led Judge Robert W. Archbald, of the United States Commerce Court, to negotiate with officials of the Erie and Lehigh Valley railroads over the settlement of coal land matters, and that induced him to endorse certain notes, according to the statements of the accused jurist today when he took the stand before the impeachment court of the Senate to testify in his own behalf.

Judge Archbald followed his wife on the witness stand. He repeatedly denied that any improper motives influenced his actions or that he had sought to use corruptly his power as a Federal judge to induce the railroad officials to do certain things.

Letters Are Exhibited.
Mrs. Archbald, telling of the trip to Europe which Judge Archbald enjoyed at the expense of Henry W. Cannon, director in the Great Northern and other railroads, said Mr. Cannon was her cousin; that the two families had been intimate for years, and that the invitation to the Archbalds to go to Europe in 1907 came to Mrs. Archbald personally. She gave the Senate the letter from Mr. Cannon. This and other letters that passed between Mr. Cannon and Judge and Mrs. Archbald were read with comment by the Senate and with personal exchanges to emphasize the close relationship that existed.

Judge Archbald admitted his associations with Edward J. Williams, of Scranton, in negotiations to induce the railroad to refuse coal dump, owned jointly by a subsidiary of the Erie Railroad and by the firm of Robertson & Law. He admitted that he had talked with Second Vice-President Richardson and General Counsel Brownell of the Erie in an effort to expedite a decision as to whether the Erie would grant an option on its part of the dump, but denied he had tried or intended to influence them to act in his favor.

Thought of Reward Denied.

Judge Archbald declared he had had no interest whatever in the settlement of the case of the Marion Coal Company of Scranton, against the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad. He went to officials of the railroad in that case, he said, as a friend of George M. Watson, attorney for the coal company, and C. B. Boland, one of the owners of the coal company. He had no thought of reward for his efforts, he said, and no purpose to influence the railroad to make a favorable settlement.

Judge Archbald denied he had tried to get credit from litigants or possible litigants in his courts. He declared that he never had attempted to conceal his interest in the Katydium coal dump deal or in the settlement of the Marion Coal Company case.

Others Not Informed.

The points at issue, he said, had no part in the settlement of the case. Members of the Senate asked if he had shown the correspondence to other members of the Commerce Court, or informed them of it. Judge Archbald said he had not. Senator Reed asked if he thought it proper for a judge in going to the railroad officials in the various coal land deals that form the basis of the impeachment charges against him.

Direct Questions Barred.

Senator Bacon, presiding over the impeachment court, ruled that questions asked as to improper motives, but permitted the attorneys to ask Judge Archbald his motive in going to the railroad officials in the various coal land deals that form the basis of the impeachment charges against him.

EDITOR IS NAMED SENATOR

J. N. Heiskell Appointed to Succeed
Late Jeff Davis.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 6.—Governor Donahay appointed today J. N. Heiskell, editor of the Arkansas Gazette of this city, United States Senator to succeed the late Jeff Davis.

John Netherland Heiskell is 40 years old and a native Tennessean. He served in an editorial capacity in the Chicago and Louisville offices of the Associated Press before coming to Little Rock as editor of the Gazette, of which he is part owner.

Mr. Heiskell never before held a political office. He said today that with the election of a Senator by the Arkansas Legislature he would return to Little Rock and resume his editorial work.

TWELFTH SESSION BEGINS IN BOISE

Incoming Officials Greeted and
Oaths of Office Are
Taken.

HAWLEY PRESENTS HAINES

New Governor Congratulated by
Retiring Executive—House of Rep-
resentatives Called to Order by
Chief Justice Ailshie.

BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 6.—(Special.)—The Twelfth Idaho Legislature organized today with impressive ceremony marking the opening session of the House of Representatives at noon, when Chief Justice Ailshie, of the Supreme Court, administered the oath of office to the incoming officials of state.

The gallery was well filled with spectators. The House was called to order by Mr. Ailshie and Rev. R. B. Wright, an Ada County, chaplain of the Senate, offered prayer. Down the center aisle the incoming and retiring officials made their way to the rostrum, where the oath of office was read to the new officials by the Chief Justice.

Hawley Presents Haines.
Governor Haines was presented by his predecessor in office, Governor Hawley. After the oath had been administered the retiring executive extended his congratulations to the new Governor. Justice Sullivan, of the Supreme Court, was next in line, and he presented Justice George H. Stewart, of the same tribunal, who took the oath from the Chief Justice.

Ex-Lieutenant-Governor Sweetser introduced his successor, Lieutenant-Governor Herman H. Taylor, of Bonner County; Byron E. Hyatt, chief clerk in the office of the Secretary of State, presented W. L. Gifford, Secretary of State; Fred L. Hunter, the incoming State Auditor, was accompanied and presented by his predecessor, S. D. Taylor; Deputy State Auditor George W. Lewis escorted State Treasurer Allen; Attorney-General Joseph H. Peterson was presented by ex-Attorney-General McDouglass, who retires from official duties today, and Miss Grace M. Shepherd, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, accepted the oath of office after being presented by her assistant, Miss Bernice McCoy. Applause was frequent throughout the ceremonies.

Robert N. Bell, State Mine Inspector, elected to succeed himself, was not in line and although the Chief Justice in his absence, the Inspector could not be discovered and accordingly did not appear to take the oath of office.

Senators Take Oaths.

After all the officers and the members of the House had been officially sworn into the state's service, the Senate took the oath. The members of the Senate were seated in the Senate Chamber, where similar ceremonies were held in which the members of the Senate and the Senate attaches figured.

Secretary of State Gifford called the roll in the House and all the Representatives chosen at the November election in the state, with the exception of Frank M. Gardner, of Ada County, and Joseph Rosevear, of Mountain Home, responded. Rosevear sent a letter telling of his detention at home because of illness but Gardner's absence was unexplained.

The election of Speaker brought out the first official test of the political color of the House. C. S. French, of Canyon County, was the only Representative placed in nomination. R. W. Oakes, of the same county, placing the name of Mr. French before the Legislature and A. H. Overmire, of Latah, seconded the nomination. The oath of office was administered to the new Speaker by ex-Speaker Storey, of Ada, who then gave up the gavel and retired to his seat as a member from Ada County. Speaker French was escorted to the chair by a committee consisting

ing of Representatives Oakes and Overmire.

Seats during the present were drawn in the two Houses which notified Governor Haines that they were ready to transact business, after which the bodies adjourned until tomorrow at 10 o'clock.

APPLE WAREHOUSE URGED

Spokane People Propose Plant With
Capacity of 5000 Cars.

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 6.—(Special.)—A plan for the construction of a storage warehouse in Spokane, with a capacity for 5000 cars of apples, has been put up to the committee of business men interested in the warehouse and marketing situation, of which Orrin Dorman is chairman, by C. B. Dennis. Mr. Dennis has proposed the construction of an immense storage plant, which, when the first unit is completed, will store 3,200,000 boxes, and additional units can be built to handle five times this number if necessary.

The big building, which, if constructed, will be several stories in height, will cost about \$320,000, with its equipment for the most modern and up-to-date method for quickly handling material. The company which Mr. Dennis represents already has the site, owning about nine acres almost in the heart of the city. They have a frontage of considerable extent on the Northern Pacific, which extends through to Sprague avenue and takes in a part of the rocky bluff and gulch at the west end of the Sprague-avenue hill.

RAILROAD FILES ARTICLES

Modoc Northern Line to Connect
Klamath Falls and Alturas.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Jan. 6.—(Special.)—The Southern Pacific Company has filed amended articles of incorporation for the Modoc Northern Railway line and it is rumored that work will be pushed on that portion between Alturas, Cal., and Klamath Falls as early as the weather will permit. The right of way has nearly all been purchased and paid for and an arrangement has been made with the Government officials for the water-right charges on that portion under irrigation.

This line is expected to cross the eastern portion of the old Modoc lava beds, skirt the eastern shore of Tule Lake, pass through Merrill and Malin, and give railroad facilities to nearly 100,000 acres of irrigated land in the Klamath Basin, when the Government work is completed.

The proposed Modoc Irrigation project will also be on the line of this road, and its building will insure the completion of that project, the reservoir at Clear Lake being already completed.

Astoria Officials Seated.

ASTORIA, Or., Jan. 6.—(Special.)—Mayor E. E. Gray and the newly elected members of the Council took their seats today. The Mayor presented his annual message in which he urged a reduction of the tax levy and also announced that he would insist on an enforcement of the city ordinances, especially in connection with bringing about an improvement of conditions in the restricted district. The newly elected country officials at the Courthouse were: O. H. Byland, who becomes School Superintendent, and P. P. Lieneweber, the new Assessor. All the other officials were re-elected.

St. Johns Street Paved.
ST. JOHNS, Or., Jan. 6.—(Special.)—The hard surfacing of Dawson street from Richmond to the south city limits was completed last week. Proceedings on the part of Portland residents to continue the improvement to connect with Lombard street have been instituted and are well matured. This will afford another hard surface thoroughfare to the business district of Portland.

Wyoming Banker Drops Dead.

LONG BEACH, Cal., Jan. 6.—While inspecting a house which was for sale, William C. Curtis, president of the First National Bank of Torrington, Wyo., and president of the Laramie County Board of Supervisors, dropped dead today. Mr. Curtis was 54 years old. He had been here two weeks.
