

\$50,000,000 CITRUS CROP MAY BE LOST

California by Thousands Burn Smudges in Effort to Save Oranges and Lemons.

RECORDS FOR COLD BROKEN

Pail of Smoke Hangs Over Ice-Laden Orchards and All Southern Part of State Shivers in Unprecedented Blasts of Winter.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 6.—Thousands of men were out tonight battling the cold, in an effort to save from further damage Southern California orange and lemon crops, which were valued at nearly \$50,000,000. What the loss caused by last night's freeze is cannot be estimated with accuracy, but it was serious; so serious, growers and citrus experts say, that it will have an appreciable effect upon the price of fruit. The outlook tonight was not encouraging. The weather bureau predicted a calm, windless night with temperatures lower than those which last night shattered the record of 29 years.

Smudge Pots Lighted.
Within a radius of 150 miles of Los Angeles, an area which embraces practically all of the important orange and lemon-growing sections, smudge pots by the thousands smoldered or blazed, emitting dense clouds of smoke, which, it was hoped, would raise the temperatures within the orchards and groves sufficiently to prevent any further freezing of fruit on the trees.

All sorts of smudging systems were employed. Crude oil was used to roll thick clouds of black pungent smoke among the orange and lemon trees. Blazing smudge pots dotted the hillsides and valleys, luridly illuminating the smoke clouds overhead. These smudging operations were in progress all of last night and today and will continue until the cold wave abates. When the cold wave passes it will be possible to estimate the damage not only to the citrus crop, but to the winter vegetable crops and the orchards of walnut and deciduous fruit trees, which also suffered severely.

Hardly Tenth of Crop Shipped.
According to the sales managers of various growers' associations, hardly more than a tenth of the orange crop has been shipped out.

The weather breaking all winter records the last 30 years, created much inconvenience. Suburban trolley lines were demoralized through the freezing of air-brake valves. In Los Angeles water pipes burst and in one instance a householder was forced to call the fire department because his garden hose had frozen and could not be used to extinguish a fire in the kitchen.

Long icicles on fire plugs were objects of curiosity and in Los Angeles and in the towns of the orange belt ice formed thickly over the water so that children attempted skating.

Riverside Has 18 Degrees.
At Riverside, in the heart of the orange belt, the thermometer fell to 18 degrees. S. A. Little, head of a fruit company, said that the frost on the oranges immediately around Riverside would be a total loss. The temperature at Pomona ranged from 13 to 26 and the wind that now after midnight lifted the smudge smoke and left the frost in its work on the orange trees. It was reported conservatively that at least 15 per cent of the citrus crop was ruined.

San Diego, with a minimum of 28 degrees, experienced the coldest weather in its history, according to weather bureau records. The coldest in the San Diego, Pasadena, Ontario and Santa Barbara all had the coldest weather recorded in 30 years. In these places temperatures recorded ranged from 20 to 25 degrees. Citrus growers in these districts were out all night fighting the frost with smudge pots. In Los Angeles the minimum was 30 degrees, reported at 7:55 o'clock this morning.

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Reports of freezing weather in the California orange and lemon belt and the prediction that frost might destroy a large part of this year's crop were discussed here with interest today.

Chicago receives about 2400 cars of oranges and lemons from California annually and next to New York is the largest wholesale distributing center for citrus fruit in this country. It is estimated that about 90 per cent of the oranges and lemons received in Chicago are shipped from California. Frank Cuneo, one of the largest dealers of citrus fruit in this city, in discussing the report, said today: "Less than 10 per cent of this year's orange crop has been marketed and if the damage to the fruit is anything like great as reported, there is certain to be an orange and lemon famine in this country, which will cause the price of fruit to rise to a prohibitive figure in the near future, as our stock on hand is comparatively small."

GOLDEN GATE PARK LAKES ICY
San Francisco Has Coldest Weather in Period of 25 Years.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6.—A. G. McArdle, director of the Government Weather Bureau at San Francisco, said tonight the cold weather practically now is at an end. Indications are for heavy frost tomorrow morning, followed by a rising temperature. Today was the coldest in 25 years in San Francisco, according to the official records. The temperature reached 32 degrees, which was the lowest mark since January 15, 1888, when it dipped to 28. The lakes in Golden Gate Park were frozen over for the first time known.

Killing frosts were general over the state. The temperature at San Diego was 28 degrees above zero, the coldest on record; at Eureka 23, Los Angeles 24, Fresno 20, Porterville 20, San Jose 24 and Sacramento 26. McArdle stated that while the loss in the citrus belts will be heavy, it would not be extensive as feared, owing to the general use of new and improved methods for heating the orchards.

CROP MAY PROVE TOTAL LOSS
Continued Cold Doing Great Damage in San Diego County.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Jan. 6.—The cold wave has caused much damage in San Diego County and probably will cause more during the night. Reports from El Cajon, La Mesa, Chula Vista and other fruit-growing centers are that the orange and lemon crops have suffered severely and that continuous cold tonight will make them almost a total loss. The frost was heavy, having escaped thus far. Much garden truck has been destroyed.

The thermometer registered 43 degrees at noon, but since that hour the mercury has been falling.

ALBANY'S EXPERIENCE UNIQUE

For Whole Day Temperature Ranges Below Freezing Point.

ALBANY, Or., Jan. 6.—(Special).—The unusually rare occurrence for this city of a day when the weather is below the freezing point continuously for 24 hours, was experienced by Albany today. The maximum temperature recorded by the Government thermometer at this city today was 23 degrees.

The minimum temperature last night was 15 degrees above zero, which equals Saturday night's record for the lowest temperature reached here this winter. Funds in this vicinity are frozen over and many Albany people today enjoyed ice-skating. Snow began falling here at 7 o'clock tonight.

Though very light thus far, it is falling steadily and is rapidly covering the frosted ground.

ASHLAND SEES SNOW IN STORE
Temperature Moderates Though Frozen Pipes Are Experienced.

ASHLAND, Or., Jan. 6.—(Special).—The lowest temperature recorded within the past few days was reached this morning, the figures being 11.4 degrees above zero. Both yesterday and today have been light and bright, and exhilarating, with little wind. The temperature given above is conceded to be the lowest which has occurred in this vicinity during the past three winters.

There has been no particular damage done here, though some inconvenience has been occasioned by frozen pipes and temporary suspension of the gas service. The lighting of the high school was also interfered with, the cold affecting crude oil used for fuel. The temperature tonight has moderated considerably and indications point to snow.

COLD SPELL IS BROKEN

Walla Walla Reports Minimum of 12 Degrees With Snow Predicted.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Jan. 6.—(Special).—Local ponds are frozen and youngsters are enjoying skating as the result of the cold weather of the last two days, the temperature this morning dropping to 15 degrees above zero. The coldest this winter was yesterday morning, when it was 12 degrees. The warmest today was 32. Tonight a warmer wind sprang up from the west and the general indications pointed to snow which was predicted. The winter so far has been the warmest in many years. Records, however, show that in the past much of the cold weather has come after this date.

BLANKS SENT TO PRISON

Bonds for 32 Convicted Labor Leaders to Be Submitted to United States Court of Appeals Within Ten Days at Chicago.

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Bonds for the 32 labor leaders convicted in the dynamite suits and in whose cases appeals were granted last week will be submitted to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals in Chicago within the next ten days, attorneys for the defendants said tonight. The bonds will not, as was first announced, be submitted to Judge Anderson, who presided in the case at Indianapolis. District Attorney Miller, who prosecuted the case, will be asked to aid in passing on the sureties.

"Sureties will be tendered in the form of appeals for their release on supersedeas bonds. J. F. McCleary, secretary of the International Iron Workers' Union, brought the applications from Leavenworth today to friends who were waiting for their release."

Herbert S. Hookin was the only one for whom an application had not been prepared. After the others had signed their applications, Hookin requested an audience with McCleary.

"He asked me," McCleary said, "if his application had been prepared. That was my first intimation that he wanted to appeal his case. I do not know that any arrangements have been made to secure his release."

The men were summoned into an ante-room opposite the warden's office and Hookin explained the object of his visit.

"Boys," he said, "I am here with applications for your release. It probably will be three weeks, after they are signed, before all are released. Don't be disappointed if some get out before the others, for I am certain we can raise enough money for everyone."

"Each man wore a broad smile as he signed his name. Hookin handed to the paper which he hoped would bring his release."

41 CONVICTED AT RAYMOND

Court Cases for 1912 Reported to Governor and Laws Suggested.

RAYMOND, Wash., Jan. 6.—(Special).—Robert G. Chas. has been appointed attorney in his annual report to the Governor, shows that in 1912 his office, out of 77 cases, secured 41 convictions. There were four acquittals, 13 dismissals, seven cases left pending. In 12 the defendants have not been apprehended.

STATE POWER OVER RAILWAY SUFFERS

Contracts Limiting Liability for Loss Cannot Be Annulled, Rules Court.

DEMURRAGE LAW IS SLAIN

Justices Declare Statute Allowing Shippers \$1 Day for Every Day Cars Are Not Furnished Is Illegal.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—The power of the states over railroads and express companies suffered a hard blow today when the Supreme Court held that since the passage of the Carmack amendment to the interstate commerce law in 1906, the states had ceased to have the right to annul contracts between railroads and shippers limiting their liability for the loss of interstate shipments.

Another serious blow was delivered when the court held that the states, since the passage of the interstate commerce act, and particularly the Hepburn law in 1905, had no power to penalize railroads for failure to furnish cars for interstate shipments.

Penalty Held Illegal.
In this connection the court declared unconstitutional the Minnesota reciprocal demurrage law, authorizing the recovery by shippers of a dollar a day for every day on which the railroad failed to furnish a car for the removal of freight.

The court pointed out today that previous to the passage of the Carmack amendment the court had upheld a contract limiting the damages in case of loss, had been annulled and also had approved a Pennsylvania case in which it was held that the policy of the state was opposed to such contracts.

As a result of the passage of the Carmack amendment, however, the court said, the policy of the state held that Congress had manifested its intention to deal with the subject of carrier liability for interstate shipments and that being the case, the state laws must give way. Consequently its decision at once annulled the Kentucky and Nebraska laws holding such contracts void.

Contracts Not Prohibited.
The court not only annulled state laws which seek to regulate carrier liability, but it held that the Federal law, as expressed in the Carmack amendment, dealt with the damage of railroads and that it did not prohibit contracts limiting liability in return on a low rate.

Justice Lurton said it was just as reasonable to base rates on value as on the character of shipments. Furthermore, he added, it was not conformable to plain principles of justice that the shipper should understate the value of his property for the purpose of reducing the rate and then receive a large value in case of loss.

As to the reciprocal demurrage law for interstate commerce, the court said that the Hepburn law expressly fixed the duty of carriers to furnish cars and that precluded the states from acting further on that subject.

STUDENT SUES SISTER

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO HERO IS YOUNG MAYRUS MITLING.

Couple, Clad Only in Night Clothing, Escape Flames by Slide Down Snowy Roof.

MOSCOW, Idaho, Jan. 6.—(Special).—Miss Caroline Mitling, a student at the University of Idaho, sued her sister, Mayrus Mitling, for \$1000, claiming that she was injured by her sister's negligence. The case was filed in the district court of the county of Blaine.

The acts and effective work of the hero, who was overcome by the smoke, are regarded as most daring and almost impossible for any human being to have performed. With his hair matted with blood and cold, and his hands and feet badly cut from broken glass and his naked feet partially frozen, and with his body numbered from frost-bite and cold combined, young Mitling presented a pitiable appearance when the firemen and neighbors arrived at the fire.

The two occupants of the house, which was a total loss, together with all the contents, occupied rooms upstairs, and the house was in flames before it was known. Mayrus Mitling was awakened at 1 o'clock, and he says his first thought was for his sister, who occupied a room over the kitchen portion of the house. Making his way across the hall to her room, he arrived in time to witness his sister falling on the burning floor trying to get to the door. The floor was burned so that she could not get up, and he and her feet and legs were severely burned. Mayrus dragged her across the hall to a window over the one-story portion of the building, and breaking the glass with his hands, dragged her to the roof, where she was revived by the snow. Mayrus then slid to the ground. After muttering pleading his sister finally made the slide down the snowy roof and was caught by her brother.

Mr. Mitling had purchased his sister a new piano for Christmas present, which, together with all the contents, were a total loss.

EARLY PROSPECTOR DIES

JAMES M'VAY, WHO CAME WEST IN 1851, PASSES.

Coos County Pioneer Discovers Mines and Other Wealth, Only to Be Robbed by Marauding Indians.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Jan. 6.—(Special).—With the passing of James M'Vay, who died at the home of his daughter in Crescent City, Cal., one of the prominent figures in the early life of Oregon and California is gone.

The early history of Southern Oregon and Northern California was woven about the life of James M'Vay. Probably no other pioneer saw so much of the thrilling days when the country was in the making. M'Vay first crossed the plains in 1851, locating at Jacksonville, where he spent a year in mining on Jackson Creek. When the Coos Bay Company began the exploitation of the territory now known as Coos County, he, with a party of 100 others, journeyed there in 1852, crossing the mountains between the Umpqua River and Coos Bay. On the arrival of the party here M'Vay and his brother Joseph, took part in the discovery of the coal mines now operated here. A company was formed, but the work was abandoned, owing to the difficulty of placing the product in a market. After recovering from his wound, M'Vay returned to Missouri, where he was married, and then, acting as guide, piloted a large party across the plains to the section now known as Coos County, where they located in the early '70s M'Vay moved to the Smith River country, where he established a hotel and was thus engaged at the time of his death.

In company with his brother, M'Vay, in 1851, journeyed down the coast to the mouth of the Rogue River, where they became the original owners of the famous sand mines that gave Gold Beach its name. Wealth was within their grasp when the Indians broke out, and they escaped from the Indians only after they had seen their buildings and mining ditches destroyed. Continuing their trail to the coast, they discovered the famous Dolan mines at Pistol River, remaining there until 1855, when another Indian outbreak resulted in the destruction of their plant, and in the flight that ensued during their escape James M'Vay was wounded by a rifle bullet.
