BIG POWER PLANT AT CELILO IS PLAN

State Senator Day Tells How to Control Full Current of Columbia River.

WASHINGTON AID SOUGHT

Measure to Go Before Legislature Asks Immediate Action and Removal of Prison to Site to Assure Cheap Labor.

To harness the entire current of the Columbia River, developing a minimum of 100,000 horsepower, the project to be prosecuted and operated by the states of Oregon and Washington, will be the end aimed at by a bill now being prepared by L N. Day, Senator from Multnemah County, which will be introduced early in the coming session of the Oregon legislature.

the Oregon legislature.

The bill will provide for the immediate appointment of a commission of competent hydro-electric engineers to investigate the feasibility of the project and to report to the coming Legis-lature; for the acquisition of the prop-erty necessary for the construction of a canal and power plant in case the commission's report is favorable; for the moving of the Oregon State Prison to the scene of the work, or the location of a branch prison there, and the employment of the prisoners on the project; and will embody a resolution addressed to the Washington Legislature, asking that body to appoint a commission to work with the Oregon commission, and urging the state to co-operate with Oregon throughout in the prosecution of the enterprise.

Great Power Available.

The scene of the proposed undertaking is at Five-Mile Rapids, two miles above the lower entrance of the Cellio Canal and tive and one-half miles up the Columbia from The Dailes. Plans that are virtually complete, showing the immense possibilities of the project, have been made by Senator Day and William E. Morris, a civil tor Day and with the congineer of the Cascade Locks, which were built by the firm of J. G. and I. N. Day. These plans are the result of several years' work on the part of Senator Day and Mr. Morris, who figured on the project with the intention of its de-velopment as a private enterprise. lopment as a private enterprise, ving to its great cost and the fact at an immediate market does not exist for the resultant enormous power they have been unable to interest suf-ficient capital, and have satisfied themselves that if the project is to wait on private enterprise it will be many years and perhaps generations before it consummated.

Data Alrendy Compiled.

The work of the contemplated com-mission will be greatly facilitated by the data, diagrams and maps based on soundings, gauge readings, surveys an other observations, the result of Mr. Morris' work, so that Mr. Day believes that the commission will be able to report to the Legislature within 30 days after it is appointed. Mr. Morris' figures show that while the project will develop at least 100,000 horsepower

(Permanent Rates on Application) the mouth of Five-Mile Rapids, Power could be developed from this preliminary canal sufficient to operate all drills, hoists, trams and other machinery necessary in the prosecution of the main project. This preliminary canal, as well as the main canal, which construction would follow, would be out entirely in hard rock, requiring for the most part such unskilled labor as the convicts could furnish.

However, the project is of such magnitude that even with the entire convict forces of Oregon and Washington at work, there will still be a big demand for both skilled and unskilled labor.

Utilization of the project need not wait on its completion, as minor plants be established, operated by water taken at intervals from the main canal into lateral canals spilling into the Columbia and in many cases not to exceed 100 feet in length. In fact, these smaller plants would probably be a feature of the completed project, as being the best means of handling the large volume of water, especially at high stages. high stages.
