REID'S WILL OPENED

Entire Estate Except \$110,000 Is Left to Widow.

VALUE 10 TO 20 MILLION

Late Ambassador Expresses Wish That Son, Ogden Mills Reid, Shall Ultimately Succeed to Control of New York Tribune.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—The entire estate of the late Whitelaw Reid, Ambassador to Great Britain, is left conditionally to his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Mills Reid, with the exception of specific bequests totalling \$110,000. The will was made public today. Not a penny was left outright to his son, Ogden Mills Reid, or his daughter, Jean Templeton Reid, now Mrs. Hubert Ward, although it was indicated plainly that the late Ambassador wished them provided for liberally and equally by their mother. The value of the estate is estimated from \$10,000,000 to \$20,000,000.

Mrs. Reid Sole Executrix.

Mrs. Reid is sole executrix and becomes the owner of almost the entire issue of stock of the Tribune Association, publishers of the New York Tribune, which has been under the direction of Ogden Reid for a year. It was announced Ogden Reid would continue as head of the Tribune Association.

The entire estate is placed in the hands of Mrs. Reid without hindrance or suggestion, except that the late Ambassador expressed a wish that should his son Ogden "display capacity and aptitude for the work," he ultimately should succeed to the control of the Tribune.

Ogden Reid was a boy in knickerbockers when the will was written, in 1834.

Lands May Go to Children.

Mr. Reid also expressed a wish that the Reid homestead and adjoining land in Ohio should go "ultimately" to his son and his Adirondack property "ultimately" to his daughter, but he stated that these bequests and the disposition of the control of the Tribune must be left to the judgment of Mrs. Reid.

Among specific bequests were \$50,000 each to a niece, Mrs. Ella Spencer Reid,

Garrison, of Ohio, and the Tribune Fresh Air Fund Association, \$5000 to Robert Everett Smith, a nephew, and individual bequests of from \$100 to \$1000 to employees.

E. B. GAZE VISITS GOTHAM

Portland Business Man Tells East of Oregon's Great Crops.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—E. B. Gaze, of Portland, is in New York for a two weeks' business trip and is at the Hotel Astor. Mr. Gaze is most enthusiastic in speaking of the successful season that Oregon has had in its crop of hops, fruits and grains and he also says that Portland is bound to be one of the largest shipping ports on the Pacific Coast, largely owing to the water grade which allows of 60 to 70 cars being hauled by one locomotive, and this for a distance of about 700 miles.

Mr. Gaze also says that Portland is probably the largest shipping port in the world of lumber and salmon.

KITTITAS DEAL APPROVED

Government to Sell Water Stored in Yakima Lakes.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—The Secretary of the Interior has approved a contract with the Kittitas Reclamation District of Washington for furnishing water stored in the Yakima lakes by the Government upon a basis of payment of \$382,000, with a readjustment of cost in case the total cost of the storage system shall be ascertained to require a greater payment by the district on the basis of acre-foot storage to be delivered under the contract. This contract covers the district in the vicinity of Ellensburg.

HENRY S. GREGORY DEAD

Pioneer Orange Grower, Once Portland Lawyer, Passes Away.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—News of the death of Henry S. Gregory, a San Bernardino attorney and prominent orange grower, has been received in the city. Gregory died at Osburn, Shoshone County, Idaho. He left this city in 1881 and for years practiced law in Portland, Or. He was 62 years old and was unmarried. A brother and three sisters survive him. He planted one of the first orange groves in this county, on the Colton terrace.

SENATE HAS CASE

Final Arguments in Archbald Trial Concluded.

VOTING WILL BE PUBLIC

Consideration, However, Will Be Behind Closed Doors—Two-Thirds Vote on Any of 13 Counts Will Convict Jurist.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—The impeachment of Judge Archbald, of the United States Commerce Court, passed tonight out of the hands of the House managers and Judge Archbald's attorneys, and became the subject of consideration for the Senate sitting as a court. The trial came to an end when representative Clayton, of Alabama, concluded the final argument of the House managers with an appeal for the removal of Judge Archbald.

As the Senate was about to adjourn Senator Reed, of Missouri, asked permission to submit one more question to Judge Archbald—as to whether or not he had altered the record of testimony in the Louisville & Nashville rate case before the Commerce Court. Judge Archbald's attorneys declared that if the question were submitted they would request an opportunity to make further arguments.

A recess was ordered at once. At the end of more than one hour of debate it was announced that the Senate had declined the question submitted to Judge Archbald. Senator Reed then formally withdrew it.

The Senate will resume consideration of the case behind closed doors tomorrow. No vote upon any of the 13 separate charges against Judge Archbald is expected until Monday. While the Senate will consider the case in secret, it will vote in the open.

The full penalty that may be imposed by the Senate includes not only removal from office but disbarment of Judge Archbald from holding any position of public trust in the future. Separate votes will have to be taken on each of the 13 articles of impeachment.

A two-thirds vote would be necessary to convict Judge Archbald upon any of the counts against him. Two new Senators, J. N. Hanks, of Arkansas,

and R. M. Johnston, of Texas, who have not heard the arguments in the case, will not vote; and two vacancies exist, one from Illinois and one from Colorado. A successful two-thirds vote upon a single article of impeachment would be sufficient to cause Judge Archbald's conviction and removal from office.

FOOD STUFF PRICES SOAR

In Year Potatoes and Sugar Decline, All Other Products Go Up.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—Soaring prices of foodstuffs are pictured in a new set of figures compiled by the United States Department of Labor from its investigation of the cost of living in 29 American cities.

Between August, 1911, and August, 1912, only two things decreased in price. These were potatoes and sugar. Meanwhile, everything else advanced. In Boston sirloin steak had advanced 24 per cent; in Buffalo, 18 per cent; in Atlanta, 8 per cent; in Chicago, 19 per cent, and in Birmingham, 15 per cent.

But the figures showing the advance in prices during the last 10 years show the following increases: Sugar, 6 per cent; butter, 34; milk, 35; flour, 35; potatoes, 46; eggs, 47; lard, 57; hens, 59; sirloin steak, 62; hams, 63; rib roast, 63; cornmeal, 64; round steak, 86; smoked bacon, 100, and pork chops, 105.

Within the 29 cities the department investigated live one-fifth of the population of the United States; two-fifths of the urban population and approximately one-third of all the people engaged in gainful occupations, not including farmers.

COCAINE IS ROBBER'S LOOT

Hood River Pharmacist Held Up by Slave to the Drug Habit.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—L. W. Wright, a janitor of this city, craving cocaine, to which drug he is a slave, last night entered the drug store of C. A. Plath and, holding up the clerk, Herman Kresse, secured a large quantity of the drug. Wright entered the store and rushed at Kresse with one of his hands in his coat pocket, which was made to bulge as if he had a pistol concealed there. Although the man had no gun, the drug clerk obeyed his orders when the former commanded him to raise his hands and show him where all of the cocaine and morphine in the house was.

Securing a handful of the drug, the man rushed from the building. The pharmacy clerk called Policeman Robert Stone, who went to Wright's little shack in the east end of the city and arrested him, after breaking down a barricaded door.

OCEAN FREIGHT POOLED

WITNESS SAYS UNDERSTANDING IS NECESSARY.

No Rebates Given on Outgoing Cargoes From United States, Owing to Anti-Trust Law.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—Testifying before the House merchant marine committee today, William E. Halm, New York agent for the Houston line, said that a London "conference" controlled the New York trade to South Africa and Central and South America.

"I may say I know that the freights are pooled," he testified. "Subject to that conference were the Houston line, the Prince line, the Hansa line, the Union City line and the American-African line. He declared not a shipper was dissatisfied with the South African service. His line had a special contract with the Standard Oil Company, agreed upon in London and duplicated to the New York Lubricating Oil Company."

Mr. Halm declared that his company had not given rebates on outgoing cargoes from the United States for many years.

"I know nothing about rebates on cargoes from Argentina to the United States," said the witness, "but I know from correspondence that rebate arrangements exist."

Representative Humphreys wanted to know whether there were any agreements between railroads and steamship companies as to through rates. Mr.

Halm said that as far as he knew no such agreements ever were entered into.

Experience had shown, declared Mr. Palm, that there was only one way of getting service and that was through rebate and pooling arrangements. "These methods are recognized as lawful by the governments of England and Germany," he added.

"Your only reason for not giving rebates on cargoes out of New York is that you think it would conflict with the anti-trust law?" asked Representative Hardy.

"That's true," replied the witness. Paul Gotthell, president of Funch, Edye & Co., a firm acting as agents for large steamship lines, including the Hamburg-American, the Scandinavian-American and the United States Shipping Company, told the committee that the Pan-American Steamship Company was a failure, not because of efforts on the part of companies in the rate agreements to throttle it, but because the people behind the new enterprise did not know their business and paid a profit of 30 per cent to shipowners for the vessels they chartered.

POST RATE ON FRUIT HIGH

Hood River Shippers Find Express Charge Less on Apples.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—The Hood River Postoffice has received, on an average, 50 packages daily to be sent out by parcel post, says Postmaster J. P. Lucas. It was thought that many of the local patrons would ship apples to Eastern friends under the new system. However, express rates on apples are less than that charged by the Government, and result-

dents have ceased presenting packages of fruit at the parcel post window.

Desiring to ship a 10-pound package of apples to a relative in New England, an orchardist learned that the cost of sending the apples by parcel post to the far eastern zone would have been \$1.20. He took the package to the express office and the charge there, for sending the apples, was 50 cents.
