PHILOMATH WANTS CONSOLIDATED COLLEGE.—Rev. C. C. Polling, representing the United Evangelical Conference, and Rev. J. A. Dancy, representing the Evangelical Association, have returned from Philomath, where they held a conference Wednesday night with the leading citizens about making an offer to secure the Consolidated College. Mr. Polling said that the conference was held in the assembly hall of Philomath College, and the matter was placed before the people. The people, said Mr. Polling, have taken hold of the matter and will submit a proposition to have the college moved to this city. Wednesday night the full committee, Rev. B. O. Bonebrake, Mr. Polling and Mr. Goodie, will lay the matter before the citizens of this city. The matter is probably a matter of time, and will be considered if it were made, as the amount is short one-half of the requirement which is \$50,000.

SETTLEMENT OF ROADWAY SUICIDE.—A letter has been written by the County Court to J. P. O'Brien, general manager of the O. W. R. & N. Co., asking for a conference to settle the details for the right of way in Multnomah County of the Portland-Hood River wagon road, which will follow the main line of the railway company. A settlement is made necessary by the fact that the railway company has encroached on the old survey for the road while in other places it will be necessary to secure concessions from the railway people. Everything indicates that a satisfactory agreement will be reached by the process of give and take, rendering court action unnecessary and making it possible to go ahead with the construction of Multnomah County's end of the wagon road this Spring.

NORTH ALBINA ASKS FOR BETTER CAR SERVICE.—The women's auxiliary of the North Portland Commercial Club has taken up the matter of car service between Union avenue and the district surrounding the new North Albina Library and Jefferson High School. At present there is no car service on Killingsworth avenue between Union avenue and this district. The St. Johns cars turn on Williams avenue and cross on the railroad bridge, and the Union avenue cars do not run west on Killingsworth avenue. The auxiliary asks that the Union-avenue cars be operated on Killingsworth to the cars on the branch line which will be opened February 1, and the matter has been taken up with Councilman Joy, chairman of the streetcar committee.

BROOKLYN STREET CAR CONSTRUCTION.—The Brooklyn street car extension will be 60 feet wide and the new lines run through 12 houses located on both sides. No estimate of the cost of the extension has been made, but the City Engineer will figure that out in a short time. If the extension is made part of the city street, it will be made part of Powell and called by that name.

He has recovered from the severe mauling administered at the time by an underpaid citizen who grappled with him and took his revolver away. His partner in the attempt, who escaped at the time, has fled the city.

GEVURTZ NOW OUT

Thompson Estate to Handle Multnomah Hotel.

NEW COMPANY IS FORMED

Edward Boyce, Manager Director, Asserts No Change Will Be Made in Portland Hotel, Despite Enticing Offers.

The Multnomah Hotel Company, which has operated the Multnomah Hotel since its opening, has passed out of existence and a new company, the Multnomah Hotel Company, has been formed. The property has been taken over by the R. R. Thompson estate and by its agent Roy O. Yates has organized a new company for its operation with H. C. Bowers as its manager and with full and exclusive authority to conduct every detail of its business.

The new management will go into effect this morning and Mr. Gevurtz will devote himself in the future to the management of his other interests. In speaking of the change Mr. Yates said: "It was fully expected that the opening and operation of a hotel like the Multnomah would result in a loss of more than \$50,000 the first year, but in checking up its accounts it is found that it has paid dollar for dollar, even in the face of a charge of \$1,000 for opening expenses. Mr. Bowers will have entire charge of the hotel in the future and under his direction its owners have full confidence that it will warrant the hopes of its builders."

Another hotel project that has been widely discussed in the Portland Hotel. This has been settled definitely by Manager Director Edward Boyce, who made this statement yesterday: "We know that in the Portland Hotel and its site we have a very valuable piece of property. We do not propose to sacrifice this for any personal or financial ends. We, that is myself and my partners, are miners in practical life and not hotelmen and in fact the business does not especially appeal to us, but we know that we have a very valuable nugget in the heart of Portland."

During the present year, at least, the Portland Hotel will remain as it is and we will await developments before we decide to sell, build a new hotel or an office building. We have received offers of all kinds for the property, some of them very enticing, but we are in a position to hold the property and propose to do so."

POLICE SCHOOL POSSIBLE

Need of Greater Knowledge by Peace Officers Is Felt.

Need of greater knowledge of the city laws on the part of policemen may lead to the passage of an ordinance by the Council, compelling a certain amount of study by applicants for positions in the department before they can be assigned to duty. At present there is no special course of preparation. A civil service examination is all that is required. If this is successful, those passing are certified for appointment as patrolmen and are put to work.

Chief of Police Slover favors a course of instruction for the members of the department, such as would give them an adequate knowledge of the laws which they are sworn to enforce. Under present conditions a policeman need study no more than he feels inclined to.

2 POLICEMEN DISCHARGED

City Executive Board Finds Men Guilty of Woman's Charges.
