Only Three Convictions by  
Senate Result in Period  
of 125 Years.

TWO CASES ARE POLITICAL

Impeachments of President Johnson  
and Justice Chase Result of Bitter  
Partisan Feeling and  
Both Result in Acquittal.

NINE IMPEACHMENT CASES CONSIDERED IN UNITED STATES SENATE.

- William Blount, United States Senator, 1797-98, no trial, lack of jurisdiction.
- John Pickens, United States District Judge, 1804-05, tried, found guilty and removed from office.
- Samuel Chase, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, 1804-05, tried and acquitted.
- James Peck, United States District Judge, 1828-30, tried and acquitted.
- West H. Humphries, United States District Judge, 1832, tried, found guilty and removed from office.
- Andrew Johnson, President, 1868, tried and acquitted.
- W. W. Belknap, Secretary of War, 1876, tried, failed of conviction on ground of lack of jurisdiction.
- Charles Swayne, United States District Judge, 1905, tried and acquitted.
- Robert W. Archbold, Judge of United States Commerce Court, 1912-13, tried, found guilty and removed from office.

In a century and a quarter there have been only nine impeachment proceedings against a civil officer of the United States Government officially instituted in the United States Senate and, until the conviction of Judge Robert W. Archbold yesterday, only two of the trials resulted in conviction. Both the others found guilty were Judges of the Federal District Court. Of those who failed of conviction, one was a Secretary of War, one a Justice of the United States Supreme Court, one a President and two District Court Judges.

ARCHBOLD IS GUILTY

Senate Convicts Jurist on 5 of 13 Counts.

JUDGE STRIPPED OF OFFICE

For Third Time in History Senate Finds Public Official Guilty of "High Crimes" — Archbold Again Protests Innocence.

The full penalty provided by the Constitution. The Senate therefore do order and decree, said Senator Bacon, "and it is hereby adjudged, that the respondent, Robert W. Archbold, Circuit Judge for the United States for the Third Judicial Circuit, and designated to serve in the Commerce Court, be and he hereby is removed from office, and that he and he hereby is, forever disqualified to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States.

SENATE OPERATIVE AT ONCE.

The sentence of the Senate became operative at once, and directions were given that the President and the House of Representatives be notified of the verdict and the punishment imposed. Of the 19 men who have been impeached before the Senate since the organization of the Government, Judge Archbold is the third to be convicted and the only one convicted who appeared to make a personal defense against the charges brought by the House of Representatives.

CORRUPT INFLUENCE CHARGED.

The first article charged that Judge Archbold had gone to officials of the Erie Railroad, while that road had a suit pending in the Commerce Court, and had corruptly influenced them to agree to give him a favorable opinion on the Katsvild claim dump.


