CLUB MAY ELECT SECRETARY.—The East Side Business Men's Club will hold its annual meeting tomorrow night at the clubrooms, Hotel Clifford, East Sixth and East Morrison streets, for election of officers for the ensuing year. The matter of electing a secretary, establishing a manufacturing bureau and enlarging the scope of the club will be considered. By many of the members it is thought that the time has come when a secretary should be engaged who shall give his entire time to the work of the club and that the membership should be enlarged to take in the whole of the East Side. That the club take up the question of encouraging manufacturing establishments on the East Side, now that the railroad are to provide freight facilities, is urged.

COURT AUTHORIZES PAYMENT.—An order was made in the United States District Court yesterday authorizing R. S. Howard, Jr., receiver of the Title Guarantee & Trust Company, to pay to W. M. Ladd the sum of \$20,000 as the holder of approved deposit claims. In the petition for the order it was set out that the receiver had this amount in his possession and that by paying it to W. M. Ladd, at this time it would result in a saving of interest to the estate. When the trust company failed W. M. Ladd assumed its liability to depositors to the amount of about \$450,000 and the receiver will pay the receiver as its assets were disposed of. So far the receiver has been able to pay him back less than half this amount.

COMMITTEE TO MEET BUSINESS MEN.—Committee on union denominational college, C. C. Poling and J. A. Goode, of this city, and A. E. Bunker, of the Commercial Club there today on the matter of submitting an offer to obtain the proposed union college. That place in connection with the Dallas College. CITY LABORERS MAY GET RISE.—Councilman Burgard last night said that he probably will recommend an increase in salaries for laborers on the night shift of the city hall. Mr. Burgard and Councilman Daly were named by the ways and means committee to investigate as to whether the increases should be granted. Mr. Daly is making a fight for the increases, as he declares that men cannot support a family on less than \$3 a day. Mr. Burgard says he is willing to vote for increases to 105 night men.

TRADING STAMP IS PROBLEM.—Retail merchants are intensely interested in the action that will be taken tonight on the trading stamp question by the Portland Retail Merchants' Association. Dealers in the city are in election of officers of the organization will be held tonight at the Hotel Imperial. Following a banquet, which is scheduled to start at 6:30, the merchants will take official action on the trading stamp question. Rev. Father O'Hara has been invited to address the meeting on the minimum wage bill which he has been advocating.

FLORIDA PEOPLE COMING HERE.—A letter received at the Portland Commercial Club yesterday from Miami, Fla., announced that a colony of ten persons is preparing to come to Oregon to make homes. A request was made for information upon agricultural and industrial conditions in Oregon for the guidance of immigrants, and from the Portland club letters will be sent to all of the commercial organizations of the state asking that literature upon the various communities of Oregon be sent them.

ASSOCIATED CHARITIES DIRECTORS TO MEET.—A meeting of the board of directors of the Associated Charities will be held this afternoon at the office, 411 Commercial block. Reports of the work of the society for December will be given by Secretary Manning. A committee of the board is to be appointed by President Freischnick to confer with the society's legal aid committee regarding the forming of a remedial loan company.

INSURANCE COMPANY SUES.—On trial before a jury in the United States District Court is the suit of John and Susanna Vierck against the Insurance Company of North America to recover \$5000 on a policy that covered the store building and stock of the plaintiffs at Lents that were destroyed by fire. The defense, as set out in the answer, is that there were false representations in securing the policies.

AGED SUSPECT HELD.—Believed to be preparing to carry on a whirlwind campaign of circulating bad checks, Joe Kelley, an elderly and well-dressed man, was arrested in a Washington-street store yesterday by Detectives Moloney and Swensen. He had in his possession a large number of checks prepared for cashing. He refused to give any account of himself and was held on a charge of vagrancy.

HOLGATE STREET REOPENED.—The Southern Pacific Railway Company has laid a temporary roadway on Holgate street, in the South East Side, to enable the public to use that street until such time as the proposed viaduct may be built. The roadway was laid between East Eighteenth and East Twenty-third streets, where the viaduct will be built.

Mr. Dole was formerly employed in the Portland building inspector's office and later a member of the firm of Ertz & Dole, architects. He was 27 years old and a member of Portland Council, Knights of Columbus. Funeral services will be held at the St. Mary's Cathedral, Fifteenth and Davis streets, Thursday at 10 A. M. Interment will be in Mount Calvary cemetery.

TWO SUITS DISMISSED.—Two suits were dismissed in the United States District Court yesterday by Assistant District Attorney Johnson. One was a civil suit of the Government against Downard & Schaffer to recover \$71 for grazing 350 sheep on the Wallawa reserve and the other was a suit to pay into court this amount with all costs. The other was an indictment against Charles Johnson, a Siletz Indian, charged with an assault with a dangerous weapon. Official notice had been received that the man had died a few days ago and it was suggested to the court he had passed to another and higher jurisdiction.

ENGINEERS TO MEET.—A regular meeting of Oregon Society of Engineers will be held tomorrow at 8 P. M. at the quarters of the Oregon Technical Club, 247 1/2 Stark street, Portland. John H. Lewis, State Engineer, will read a paper on "Oregon Water Resources, Their Development and Use." An important business meeting will be held to consider revision of the constitution. A full attendance is necessary in order to authorize action on such revision, as action must be taken at this meeting or not at all this year.

ACTION ON GILMAN STREET DEFERRED.—At the meeting of the Montavilla Board of Trade Monday night it was decided to defer action on the paving of East Gilman street, between East Sixteenth and East Eighty-second, until the sewer has been put under ground. It was announced that there is an injunction against the construction of the Montavilla end of the East Stark street sewer which must be gotten out of the way before active work can be started.

REV. J. R. KNOELL WELCOMED.—Rev. J. R. Knoll, the new pastor of the Laurelside Congregational Church, in the Mount Scott district, was welcomed to that field last night by a public reception. Many congregational pastors of the city and also of other denominations were present to welcome Rev. Knoll to his new charge. He was formerly superintendent of the State Anti-Saloon League and since retiring has been on a farm near Portland.

SEVEN TAKING EXAMS.—The Oregon State Board of Optometry is holding its annual examination at the Imperial Hotel to test the qualifications of those who desire to secure state licenses to practice this profession. There are seven taking the examination and it will continue three days. The members of the board in charge are: Dr. E. O. Matten, president, and Dr. C. W. Lowe, advisory member.

YOUNG JANNON BURIED.—While trying out a new foot valve Albert Grant, 21 years old, the janitor of the Highland Court Apartments, was badly burned about the face and hand as a result of a gas explosion in the fire-box, early yesterday. Grant was trying out his device in front of the fire-box, and the explosion struck him in the face and hand. He was taken to Good Samaritan Hospital.

He leaves a widow and several children.
