

FRENCH ELECTION OUTCOME DOUBT

Poincare and Pams in Close Race in Caucus on Eve of General Assembly.

BOURGEOIS WILL NOT RUN

Premier May Receive Conservative Republican Vote Unrepresented in Caucus, and Socialists May Support Pams.

PARIS, Jan. 14.—A President of France will be chosen tomorrow by the members of the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate sitting together as the national assembly in Versailles. The eve of the election finds the situation regarding the candidates as involved as it was at the beginning.

The joint caucus to nominate a candidate for the Presidency ended today without giving an absolute majority to either Premier Poincare or Jules Pams, Minister of Agriculture, and it is impossible to forecast tomorrow's result, although apparently the election lies between these two officials.

Conservatives Favor Poincare. There are more than 100 right and Conservative Republicans who were not present at the caucus, most of whom, it is believed, will vote for M. Poincare.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Edward F. Mylius, journalist, convicted in London of libeling King George, was turned back from the gates of the United States today by Secretary of Commerce and Labor Nagel, who held that Mylius' offense was a crime involving moral turpitude, which barred him from admission.

Secretary Nagel denied that the offense was a purely political one. "I cannot assume," said Mr. Nagel, in his decision, "that a law which excludes anarchists and those who advocate the overthrow of government or the assassination of public officials was intended to admit the publisher of a false charge of bigamy, simply because he advanced a political motive for the act or because the false charge was directed against a King, or because the court before which the trial was held regarded the political aspect of the case as an aggravation of the offense."

Defenders Declare Trial Fair. Proponents of Mylius held that he had been convicted of a political libel—a political offense; that his trial had been a farce and that in attacking the honor of the King of England, he was attacking a monarchial government in the interests of republicanism.

The story published in a Paris paper, the "L'Espresso," of which in England Mylius was convicted, charged that King George had contracted a morganatic marriage in 1896 with the daughter of a French nobleman, Countess de Saxe-Coburg, now the wife of Captain Trevelyan Napier.

In discussing whether the offense was purely political, Nagel said that a charge was directed not only against the King, but by inference against Mrs. Napier.
