

QUESTIVES TO RECLAIM HOUSE

Overriding of Veto on Reclamation Bill Met by Appeal to Chamberlain.

GOVERNOR BIDS DEFIANCE

Executive Requests That Senator Eliminate From Congressional Bill Both Warner and Anderson Lakes.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Jan. 21.

(Special)—Real politics entered into the session today, when Governor West, hurrying back defiance at the House of Representatives for passing over his head the veto bill of Thompson, referring to lands near Warner Lake, forwarded a telegram to Senator Chamberlain, at Washington, requesting that Warner Lake and Anderson Lake be eliminated from a bill which Chamberlain has introduced into Congress.

Commission Measure Assailed Before Commerce and Navigation Committee.
