

SUFFRAGE STIRS BITTER FEELING

British Atmosphere Seethes With Intrigue as Parliament Reaches Issue.

VARIOUS FORECASTS VARY

Opinion Is That Women Will Lose Because Militants Have Alienated Support—Three Plans Under Consideration.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—A small sample of the bitter feeling which will be loosed when the House of Commons begins on Friday the debate on the amendments to the franchise reform bill was given this afternoon.

Shouts of "traitor" were hurled across the floor of the House because the Premier refused to allow the suffragette amendments to the bill to be debated without any restrictions as to time.

The noisy scene was brought to an end only by the Speaker rising and publicly reprimanding the members who had started the storm.

Intrigue Prevails At The House of Commons, as well as the political clubs and drawing-rooms are seething with intrigue. Forecasts vary from hour to hour as to the probable fate of the amendment brought forward by Sir Edward Grey, which eliminates the word "male" from the first clause of the bill and which, if carried, opens the way for amendments which will enfranchise a numerically varying army of women. The issue is likely to be decided by a score of votes either way.

There is a strong suspicion that when the votes have been counted the suffragettes will find themselves disappointed largely because the militants have alienated so many of their supporters.

Differences Are In Millions. The three amendments which the Grey amendment has been disposed of propose respectively to enfranchise 1,000,000, 6,000,000 and 11,000,000 women.

The first of these would give the vote to wealthy and well-to-do women only, as it simply provides for the enfranchisement of women householders.

The second amendment proposes to give the franchise to women householders and also to the wives of electors, and as this would distribute the vote fairly among all classes it is received with much favor.

The third proposal comes from the labor party and would confer the vote on every woman over 21 years old.

ANSWER SENT BY TELEGRAPH

Knox Outlines Status of Negotiations With Britain.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Secretary Knox today outlined the status of the Panama Canal negotiations with Great Britain in this country.

The answer of this Government to the British protest against the Panama Canal act was forwarded to London last Saturday by telegraph. It was read by the American Charge d'Affaires and a copy was delivered to Sir Edward Grey Monday morning.

It was proposed by this Government to make it public Tuesday, but at the request of Sir Edward Grey, who desired to transmit it to the British Parliament on Thursday, its publication was deferred as a matter of courtesy to the British government.

"It is expected to be given to the press on Thursday afternoon for publication here Friday morning, coincident with its publication in Great Britain, at the same time that a copy is delivered to the British Ambassador here."

CORN FOR OREGON SOUGHT

Hawley Amendment Provides for Experiments by Government.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Jan. 22.—Under an amendment to the agricultural appropriation bill, secured by Representative Hawley, the Department of Agriculture will continue next year its work looking to the discovery or development of a variety of corn that can be successfully grown in Oregon, confident that in time such a corn can be found.

For the first time the department took up this work this season, under a previous appropriation secured by Mr. Hawley, and in co-operation with the department a farmers' corn club, comprising some 300 Oregon farmers, was formed last season and various varieties of corn were planted and grown for experimental purposes. The first year's work has been successful in solving the problem. Hence the additional appropriation this year.

PASADENA HAS NEW CLUB

"Royal Order of the Rose" Modeled After "Royal Rosarians."

PASADENA, Cal., Jan. 22.—(Special.)—Pasadenans are planning an organization similar to the Royal Rosarians of Portland, whose visit here January 1 occasioned much comment. It is proposed to name the organization the Royal Order of the Rose. Frank G. Hogan, who is one of the prime movers, says the purpose will be "to boost Pasadena and back the tournament of roses."

It will be financially a losing venture, and said that the city may as well face that issue now as later.

Proposition Is Looking One. "It is not a money-making proposition at all," said he. "We will have a deficit every year and will have to go back to the Council for money to pay up on the loss. For interest on the bonds, etc. I have grave doubts whether the people would have voted as much money as they did for this purpose had they realized that it is a losing institution as far as finances are concerned; not even self-supporting."

The Commission having taken these preliminary steps, it is now up to the City Council to act by selling the bonds and vacating Market street.

Bride 44 Years Old. Miss Gould is now 44 years old. She was 24 when her father died, and when she was called upon to decide whether it should be society for her or business, philanthropy and a quiet life, she chose the latter combination.

STEEL RAIL POOL REACHES ABROAD

Former Head of Trust Admits Understanding as to International Trade.

OWN COUNTRIES SACRED

Competition Restricted to Neutral Ground, Says Corey—Roosevelt Reiterates He Saved Country From Disaster.

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—William Ellis Corey, former president of the United States Steel Corporation, a witness today in the Federal suit to dissolve the corporation under the Sherman anti-trust law, furnished the Government with the first testimony it has been able to obtain in support of its allegation that the corporation participated in an international steel rail pool.

Mr. Corey followed Theodore Roosevelt on the stand after the Colonel had repeated his testimony given before the Stanley Steel investigation committee concerning the acquisition of the Tennessee Coal & Iron Company by the corporation at the time of the panic of 1907.

Colonel Roosevelt, after reiterating that he had given his sanction to the deal "to save the country from disaster," and after he had been asked if he had heard various reports about the Tennessee Coal & Iron Company, including one that the United States Steel Corporation within a year previous had had experts examining the property, declared today that "not one thing could have been known to me about that company that would have altered my action."

Colonel Heard in His Office. Colonel Roosevelt was examined at his editorial offices by Jacob M. Dickenson, former Secretary of War, chief counsel for the Government in this case.

Mr. Corey testified in a room in a downtown office building. He said that as late as 1910 an understanding had existed with foreign rail manufacturers by which the steel corporation agreed not to compete with them in their own countries and foreign manufacturers in turn agreed not to seek business in the United States.

"It was understood," said Mr. Corey, "that competition should be restricted to neutral markets, countries which did not produce steel."

Whether in these markets there was an understanding with the foreign producers as to prices and a division of territories the witness professed ignorance.

Farrell Arranges Details. Mr. Corey explained that he had had little to do with making the arrangement himself, but had gained his knowledge from James A. Farrell, then in charge of the corporation's export business, who since had succeeded Mr. Corey as president of the corporation.

Mr. Farrell, he said, had made trips abroad to discuss the subject with the foreign manufacturers.

Mr. Corey testified as to the existence of a steel pool among American manufacturers as late as 1904, under which prices of rails were kept on an even keel and business was divided. In this the Steel Corporation participated, he said, and was represented at meetings by Charles M. Schwab, Judge Gary or himself.

Mr. Corey testified further that one of the reasons that the United States Steel Corporation was by that time a steel business was that it

DARROW HAS FIVE JURORS

Defense Objects to Aged Veteran and Will Call in Physician.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 22.—After state and defense had exercised their first peremptory challenges, five permanent jurors finally were sworn to hear the evidence against Clarence S. Darrow, who is charged with the bribery of Robert F. Bain, a juror in the Mc-

namara trial. Another juror took the oath, but the defense reserved the right to bring about his dismissal on a showing of physical and mental incapacity due to his advanced age.

The jurors accepted by both sides were: Frank M. Sanderson, Sylvester Grant, David Dunn, H. J. Robinson, George Robins and John Farley. Farley is an old soldier 75 years old and the defense has promised to call physicians whose report of the jurors condition will disqualify him.
