

TAFT SAYS WORK NEEDS MORE TIME

Plea Made for Currency Legislation and Extension of Civil Service.

SECOND TERM NECESSARY

Dr. Elliot Urges Adoption of Merit Instead of Spoils System in Public Service, and Abolishment of Bargaining.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—President Taft, at an address last night at the banquet of the National Chamber of Commerce, urged that the organization use its influence among the members of the country for renewed life for several matters of National legislation, which, he declared, were the most important now before the people of the country.

The President asked especially for adequate and comprehensive currency legislation and support for the economy and efficiency commission. In addition, he urged that the organization take up the question of the extension of the civil service to all local appointive offices in the Government.

Guiding Influence Requires Time. The President, referring to the approaching end of his Administration, said that more time was necessary in order that the guiding influences of an Administration might be brought to a successful conclusion.

Dr. Charles W. Elliot, president emeritus of Harvard University, addressed the delegates on the "craving need of reform in the civil service." He declared that it was a mistake to think that civil service reform in this country had been completed.
