"This Chamber of Commerce," said Dr. Eliot. "has before it the very important job of undertaking to correct the extraordinary miscarriage of the civil service in the higher stages."

He advocated the adoption of the merit system in the Government as against the spoils system. He said that the positions in the lower grades in the Government service had been open to young men, but that they could not get into the higher places because these places were "spoils."
