OLYMPIA, Wash, Jan 24.—(Special.)

-- Women loubyists representing clubs, societies and charitable organizations of Souttle Tacoma, Olympia and other Washington cities won the first two rounds of their fight for the passage by the Legislature of a bill providing for state aid of destinate mothers.

The judiciary committee reported favorably on the bill and the House adopted the report without amendment. The bill was sent up for third reading. As the bill has been drafted, by Corkery and Rowland, a mother who is in destitute circumstances and has minor children to support is given \$15 a month for the support of the first child and \$5 a month for each additional child. The boards of county commissioners are authorized to determine what mothers are deserving of help.

The House also adopted a committee port in favor of a bill providing for the payment by state or counties of 1.5e a day to the families of inmates f penal institutions, for the services such inmates on public roads. During the past week women advo-cates of the mothers pension measure have been exceedingly active. They have been exceedingly active. They have worked almost continuously in both branches of the Legislature explaining their bills and setting pledges for its support. They say they have found but little apposition to the measure. Their argument is that the bill is necessary for the moral, social and financial welfare of the state. To destitution in the home during the early life of boys and girls, the women attribute delinquency in later life. They declare the saving to the state by the pension system would be enormous by reason of relieving destitutions.


