The Swedenborg doctrine of correspondence, or the relation of this world to the spiritual world as the relation of cause to effect, was quite clearly explained by the speakers. They said that all phenomena of this world have their origin and cause in the spiritual world. It was shown by Swedenborg's teachings that all honest seekers after truth, whether in this or pagan lands, are saved.

MISSING MAN SODUET HINT—J. Q. Wickham, an engineer of Ames, Ia., searching for his brother, R. H. Wickham, who disappeared from the knowledge of his relatives 17 years ago, has asked the postmaster in Portland to look for mail addressed to his brother. His clue to the possibility of his brother being in Portland is the assertion of Dr. J. E. Christ of Ames, who met a man in Minneapolis last year giving his name as R. H. Wickham, said he had been in Ames at one time and was now interested in a box factory in Portland.

New Road Ordered Staked Out—At the request of a committee of Lents people the County Court yesterday decided to instruct County Surveyor Holbrook to set the stakes for a road running through Mendocino Addition a distance of 2100 feet north from the Foster road at Lents Junction to a road known locally as the Gilbert road. The improvement work will be undertaken by the people living along the route. The street in question is dedicated. It is just one block beyond the city limits.

BURTON BILL IS CANNIBAL—Mayor Rushlight and City Attorney Grant were at Salem yesterday in consultation with the legislative committee to which has been referred the bill providing for an adjustment of the streets by which the county is to take control and provide for the maintenance of the bridges over the Willamette River. The measure that was adopted by the committee did not specify that the city should receive the tolls from the streetcar companies for use of the bridges.

CORRECTION McNABB SOUGHT—Information as to the whereabouts of William McNabb is wanted by Lewis N. Bernays, acting British Consul at Portland, as he has been requested by McNabb's brother to locate him. The missing man is said to be about 30 years of age and when heard from in September was contemplating leaving San Francisco for this city. It is feared that he is either ill or the victim of an accident, and Mr. Bernays is anxious to gain trace of him at once.

Disagreement as to Disposition of Children Leaves Couple Married.

Because they could not agree on the disposition of their children Circuit Judge McGinn yesterday morning cancelled a decree of divorce granted Hettie Hazel and James F. Hazel. The judge was instructed to enter an order setting aside the findings and the result is that they find themselves married again. New Bills Open at the Vaudeville Houses

Orpheum.

EVEN when Sarah Bernhardt's wonderful performance of Lucretia Borgia, which is reviewed elsewhere, is eliminated, the Orpheum bill this week continues to maintain an excellent quality and a more than sufficient quantity of real vaudeville entertainment. That it pleased the patrons yesterday, is a double triumph. When a dozen curtain calls come in the middle of a bill, it is certain to leave a big void for the acts to come after.

But dainty, velvety Josie Heather, the winsome English comedienne, more than fills that void, as usual. She is just as charming as when she was the only headliner at the Orpheum on her former visit. A wealth of gorgeous costumes, an individual way of wearing them and songs, songs, and graces. Josie still remains a head-line act and her songs are as refreshing as ever. She brings back "I Want a Husband" and the bathing song and adds three or four new ones, the most pretentious of which "He Was Nice." Miss Heather becomes more than a songster in this—she displays sparks of emotional genius. In fact, Miss Heather shared honors with Bernhardt yesterday and when she had depleted a big stock of songs and dresses she was forced to make do with the friendliest kind of a curtain speech. Certainly Josie found welcome and open arms.

Sarafon, a violinist billed as "A Gypsy Idol," was a steadfast favorite with a rich string of Gypsy camp surroundings he opens his playing and when he has run the musical gamut of classics he reappears in a silk shirt and outing trousers and plays ragtime and popular music.

Dorothy Brenner, a pretty, graceful and versatile actress as well as a songstress, has a novelty with Joe Ratcliffe in "At the Flower Stand." Incidentally Miss Brenner wears the smartest kind of a frock and she wears it well. Later in a child imitation she appears anew to just as much effect.

There is a real novelty in "And They Lived Happily Ever After," a burlesque of 1913 freshness. The actors in the sentimental cast and they all work overtime and to effect. To tell what it is would spoil a big surprise that awaits.

Opening the bill are McMahon, Diarmid and Cleve in the "Scarecrow." It is a singing, dancing and talking novelty which stirs up a lot of dust and some good round applause.
