

CITY NEWS IN BRIEF

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ROSE CITY CLUBHOUSE MAY BE ENLARGED.—At the last meeting of the directors of the Rose City Clubhouse at East Fifty-sixth street and Sandy boulevard was considered, and a special committee with H. H. Rhoads as chairman was appointed to look into the matter. It has been found that the auditorium on the second floor is too small for dancing and is often overcrowded. Also it is desired to have a billiard-room and bowling alleys. When the clubhouse was planned it was thought it would answer for several years, but already there is need for more room. The club has 178 members, and the income from all sources in January was \$461, according to the report of Secretary O. G. Higginson. The clubhouse is in constant use and it is expected the south unit of the building will be erected. The matter of constructing a basement will be considered also.

NEW CORPORATIONS FORMED.—Articles of incorporation were filed at the Courthouse yesterday as follows: Ringier Dancing Academy, W. M. Ringier, Robert J. Ringier and J. H. Jones, incorporators, capital stock, \$3000; Hygiene Farming Company, Percy A. Smith, C. Gibson and Charles J. Schnabel, incorporators, capital, \$3000, to engage generally in the dairy, milk and cream business; American Food Company, D. M. Stron, E. H. Boyer and G. K. Wentworth, Jr., incorporators, capital, \$125,000, to manufacture, buy and sell gunpowder; Twiss Manufacturing Company, Ben H. Wilson, Thomas McCusker and A. S. Wilson, incorporators, to manufacture and sell washing machines, capital, \$50,000.

WOODSTOCK MUTUALISTS TO MEET.—The Woodstock Mutualist Association will hold mass meetings next Tuesday night in the Kenilworth Presbyterian Church, and the following Tuesday, February 15, in Smith's Hall, East Forty-second street and Gladstone avenue. The latter will be a general meeting for all improvement organizations of the district, including the Mothers' Club, to further the co-operative movement. The association has formed a temporary organization to handle the articles of incorporation. There are about 40 members so far, and it is intended to increase the membership to 100 at the two meetings.

VICE PRESIDENT CHANGES OF VENUE.—E. S. J. McAllister, whose trial on a charge of degeneracy is scheduled to commence February 12, in Circuit Court, was denied a change of venue by Judge McGinn yesterday morning. Holmes & Corby, of Salem, attorneys for McAllister, contended that sentiment in favor of conviction of the members of the alleged vice clique is so strong in Multnomah County as to preclude the possibility of a fair trial. The District Attorney's office has elected to try McAllister on an indictment in which Roy Kadel is named. McAllister has pleaded not guilty.

RAVENS WILL SPEAK on the convention of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations at Beth Israel tonight at 8 o'clock. Rabbi Wise has just returned from delivering the principal address at the dedication of the Hebrew Union College buildings, in Cincinnati, which event was a feature of the convention. Public classes will be held Wednesday at 8 P. M. All men and women are welcome. The music tonight will be in charge of Mrs. Rose Bloch Bauer.

SEWER TO BE CONSIDERED.—The Rosemere sewer district will be considered this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the City Hall by the street committee. The committee of the Rosemere-Hancock Improvement Club asks that all property owners in this district who can do so attend the meeting and support the request for a change of venue of the sewer, which was approved at a recent mass meeting in the Rosemere district.

POULTRY LECTURES TO BE GIVEN.—Professor Dyer, of Grand Agricultural College, will lecture on poultry raising at the East Portland Branch Library, East Eleventh and East Alder streets, today at 2 P. M. and at the Albina Branch Library, 350 North Street, tonight at 8 o'clock. These lectures will be illustrated with stereoscopic views, and will be of interest to all who are raising poultry whether on a large scale or small.

L. M. LEPPER TO LECTURE IN HOOD RIVER.—L. M. Lepper has accepted an invitation from the Hood River Commercial Club to deliver his illustrated Panama Canal lecture in Hood River March 1 at 2 P. M. This hour was fixed so that orchard men in the valley could have an opportunity to hear the lecture. More than 100 pictures of canal construction will be shown.

BUILDING CODE REVISION COMMITTEE TO MEET.—The new building code revision committee, recently appointed by Mayor Rushlight will hold its first meeting this afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Mayor's committee room, second floor of the City Hall. The committee will be organized by the selection of a chairman and secretary, and the work to be done will be discussed.

JUDGE MCGINN INCREASES HOURLY.—Intent on proving the truth of his declaration that the Circuit Judges could "wade through" a great deal more work than they do were they so disposed, Judge McGinn has announced that court will open hereafter in his department at 8:30 in the morning instead of 9:30. The first hour will be used in hearing motions, demurrers, etc., and trial work will be taken up at the regular hour. This is one method which Judge McGinn will use of demonstrating that Multnomah County can get along with the judges if they all pitch in and do their share.

FALL KILLS CAPTAIN DANIEL HAYES.—Captain Daniel Hayes, a pioneer river captain, met his death accidentally Wednesday morning through falling down the steps of the Home for the Aged, just as he was starting out for a walk. For many years he was employed by the Oregon Steam Navigation Company and afterwards with the O. R. & N. piloting boats between Portland and Astoria. He was a native of Ireland, and was 77 years old. Funeral services will be held this morning at 9 o'clock at the Cathedral, by Father McDevitt.

GENERAL SEWER TAX NOT FAVORED.—The Center Addition Improvement Club declined Wednesday night to favor the suggestion of W. C. Embow that there be inserted in the official commission charter a provision providing for payment of the cost of building of trunk sewers by general taxation instead of by property owners at present. A resolution was adopted urging prompt opening of East Burnside street, between Laurelhurst and East Fifty-second street. A committee was appointed to get more lights for Center Addition.

MARSH CASH RETURNED

WOMAN STOPS PROSECUTION OF YOUNGER HUSBAND. Bridegroom Deserting Elderly Wife Here Located at Los Angeles and Gives Up Money.

Mollified by the restitution of a considerable part of \$9000, which was taken from her by her new-found husband, Mrs. Robert Marsh has dropped criminal charges, according to advices received yesterday from Los Angeles by Detective Captain Baty. The exact amount of the settlement was not mentioned.

The case of the elderly Mrs. Marsh and her young husband created a stir some months ago when he abandoned her here, taking the money and jewels valued at \$1000. The pair, newly married in San Francisco, after a brief acquaintance, were on their way north, ostensibly to take a steamer for Australia, where Marsh, financed by his elderly wife, intended to enter the automobile business. In his haste to embark in trade he departed without her and did not leave his address.

Considerably older than her husband, who she told the police, was "very attractive," Mrs. Marsh reported her loss to Detectives Price and Royce, through whose inquiries Marsh was traced to Los Angeles, some months later. Then, when it was attempted to prepare extradition papers, it was found that Mrs. Marsh also was in the Southern city, unaware of the presence of her husband. Without her aid it was impossible to settle the case here and it was left in the hands of the Los Angeles police, intended to enter the city on general principles, and now, it is learned, has obtained his liberty by returning to his bride as much of her money as remained in his hands.

CASE "FIXED" IS CHARGE. Warrant Issued for Absent Prosecuting Witness in Assault Case.

Charging that an attempt had been made to "fix" a case which he was prosecuting, Deputy District Attorney Deitch demanded in Municipal Court yesterday that a bench warrant be issued for the complaining witness who had failed to appear, and a subpoena for Jos. Morak, a well-known character about town, who, he said, had made advances to have the case settled. Both requests were granted by the court and the wanted man will appear today. Deitch also reflected upon the defendant's attorney, who, he said, had made similar requests.

The case at issue is that wherein John Ludman is accused of assaulting Andrea Pellechia. After bringing the charge and causing numerous persons to leave their work to appear as witnesses, the officers say, Pellechia appears to have dropped the prosecution, but will be compelled to appear.
