Referendum Likely on Important Washington Bills. PEOPLE'S WILL IS WANTED. State Legislature Inclined to Shift Responsibility of All Large Appropriation Acts Direct to Voters' Shoulders.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 16.—(Special.)—When the Washington Senate recently invoked the referendum on the proposed problems of the session, which was passed by both houses, it is believed a precedent was established which will effect important legislation during the session.

Since that action the referendum idea has permeated the atmosphere at the Capitol with the result that an attempt will be made to invoke the referendum on practically all of the important problems of the session.
