

CHANCELLOR'S HOME WRECKED BY BOMB

Mrs. Pankhurst Accepts Full Responsibility for Destroying Lloyd-George's House.

RESIDENCE IS IN RUINS

Suffragettes Exult and Leader Says Police Need Look No Further, but if She Is Locked Up She Will Declare Hunger Strike.

LONDON, Feb. 19.—A bomb which was exploded in the country residence of Chancellor of the Exchequer David Lloyd-George at Walton Heath this morning, virtually destroyed the handsome house but injured none. Police inquiry brought the suffragettes under suspicion and tonight a message from Cardiff, Wales, quoted Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst as accepting full responsibility for the act.

"We have blown up the Chancellor of the Exchequer's house," Mrs. Pankhurst said to an enthusiastic meeting of suffragettes at Cardiff. "The authorities need not look for the woman who actually did it. I personally accept full responsibility for it."

Mrs. Pankhurst declared that if she were sent to penal servitude she would go on a hunger strike.

"The Government will then have to set me free," she added, "or let me die. If I drop out a hundred women are ready to take my place."

The beautiful Lloyd-George country residence is now and has not yet been occupied. Mr. Lloyd-George himself is on a motor trip through France.

Most of the rooms in the building were wrecked. The bomb, which consisted of two seven-pound cans of powder, had been placed in oil-saturated rags of shavings in separate rooms. Burning candles carried the flame to the wood and caused the explosion. The force of the blast split the brick walls in all directions.

Finding of two batons in the wreckage at once led the police to suspect women. Then came a report from neighbors that an automobile containing several women had passed through the village early in the morning.

An official of the Women's Social and Political Union, however, told the police that the society had no knowledge of the perpetrators.

"General" Flora Drummond, however, declared that the explosion was "undoubtedly the work of women." She exclaimed enthusiastically: "I think it is grand. It was a fine act, successfully carried out and shows the determination of the women. I say 'all power to all kinds of militancy in the direction of harassing Cabinet ministers, short of taking human life.'"

This is the second time within a year that violent methods have been used against the residences of Cabinet Ministers, the first being an attempt to burn the house of Lewis Harcourt, Secretary for the Colonies, at Nuneham.

STATE ASKED TO DECIDE

Commission Gets Complaints From Grants Pass and Portland.

SALEM, Or., Feb. 19.—(Special.)—The State Railroad Commission this morning received a formal petition from the Rogue River Water Company, of Grants Pass, asking for intervention in its dispute with the City Council. Last Summer the Council passed a series of ordinances calculated to regulate the water rates and to control the service generally, and the company objects on the grounds that compliance would involve bankruptcy.

The Commission also received a petition from 52 visitors and townsmen of the Mount Scott Cemetery, in Portland, asking that the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company be ordered to extend its lines out to the burial grounds.

EARL CRALL FOILS ROBBERY

Prairie City Man Knocked Senseless by Blow From Thief.

PRAIRIE CITY, Or., Feb. 19.—(Special.)—When Earl Crall, a baker in the meat market here, entered the front room of his market at eleven o'clock last night, he was grabbed by someone in the back room. Crall resisted and others came to the assistance of the burglar who first attacked him, after Crall fired himself for a moment. He emptied his revolver at his assailants, probably wounding one of them, but was then knocked senseless, allowing the burglars to escape.

The motive was no doubt robbery, but being interrupted by the shooting of Crall, they did not succeed in opening the safe.

TREASURY BALANCE SAFE

MacVeagh Says \$35,000,000 Is Enough to Work With.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Secretary MacVeagh told the House committee on Treasury Department expenditures today that \$35,000,000 in the treasury above current liabilities was a practical working balance, and that in emergencies it could be run beyond that amount.

"There is now an actual surplus in the treasury," said he, "created practically by the sale of \$50,000,000 in Panama bonds nearly two years ago."

It had been figured out for him that the treasury could have put in the banks during the stringency of last Autumn \$40,000,000 without impairing the working balance.

3-CENT RATE ENJOINED

DIFFICULTIES ARE SEEN

MONEY TRUST COMMITTEE NOT CLEAR AS TO REMEDY.

Regulation of Stock Exchanges Regarded as Matter for States Alone to Deal With.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—The House money trust investigation committee began today consideration of the financial regulation legislation which will be recommended in its report. The committee discussed informally the bills disclosed by the hearings and possible remedial laws. No action was taken and the report will not finally be framed until Samuel Untermyer, counsel for the committee, arrives in Washington at the end of the week. The committee expects to submit the report by February 27.

A variety of legal difficulties confronting the committee in framing regulations for stock exchanges and clearing-houses were discussed today. The opinion was general that the Federal Government would have great difficulty in prescribing rules and regulations for stock exchanges throughout the country, particularly the New York Stock Exchange. Several members of the committee held that these institutions were entirely under the jurisdiction of the various states.

Recommendations necessarily will be based upon the jurisdiction of Congress over National banks and interstate corporations. Laws forbidding directors of National banks from accepting a bonus from borrowers for granting loans and forbidding interlocking of directors in National banks also were discussed.

MINERS REFUSE TO STRIKE

Pennsylvania Workers Will Not Quit in Sympathy.

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 19.—A sympathetic walkout of upwards of 40,000 miners in Western Pennsylvania to aid the striking miners in West Virginia was urged and defeated in resolution presented today to the convention of District No. 5, United Mine Workers of America. The defeat came after stirring debate. President White of the United Mine Workers of America, denounced Governor Glascock, the West Virginia coal operators and the miners.

DIRECT ELECTION PASSES

South Dakota Legislature Ratifies Proposed Amendment.

PIERRE, S. D., Feb. 19.—A resolution for the direct election of United States Senators, which already has passed the Senate, was adopted today by the House of the South Dakota Legislature.

CONCORD, N. H., Feb. 19.—The State Senate today completed New Hampshire's legislative ratification of the amendment to the Federal Constitution providing for direct election of United States Senators. The vote was 20 to 2.

MONTESANO MILL IS SOLD

Hogiam Company Pays \$50,000 for Property and Will Move Plant.

MONTESANO, Wash., Feb. 19.—(Special.)—The Syverson Lumber & Shingle Company's big mill located here was sold today to the Hogiam Sash & Door Company, owned by Warren J. Eger and F. L. Hartung. The consideration was approximately \$50,000. The Hogiam Sash & Door Company will move to this city, its river-front property in Hogiam having become too valuable for manufacturing purposes.

The plant will resume operations about March 15 and employ 100 men.

Stone to Mark End of Trail

OLYMPIA, Feb. 19.—(Special.)—To mark what they insist to be the end of the original Oregon trail, the local Daughters of the American Revolution are having hewn a large granite stone which they will place in the Capitol Park in front of the state building. The dedicatory ceremonies will be held Sunday afternoon.

SLANG TERM DISPUTED

COURT RULES OUT "COME ACROSS" IN TESTIMONY.

Effort Will Be Made to Vitalize What McManigal Said on Stand in Darrow Trial.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 19.—The colloquialism, "Come across," will result in the throwing out of most of the testimony given by Orrie McManigal, the confessed dynamiter, from the records of the trial of Clarence S. Darrow unless Judge Conley decides over night from the apparently fixed determination he expressed today.

Late today the court took up the matter of McManigal's testimony which has been in dispute and announced that it would be stricken from the records unless the prosecution could convince him that sufficient foundation had been laid for its introduction.

McManigal testified that his wife and uncle, George Behm, had come to him at the instigation of Darrow, then chief counsel for the McNamara, and endeavored to persuade him to "come across." Judge Conley held in today's arguments that the slang phrase did not necessarily imply criminality on the part of Darrow—that he might have believed McManigal had lied in his confession and only wanted him to tell the truth.

Two exciting incidents featured the afternoon session, which was devoted chiefly to testimony in impeachment of Bert McManigal. A newspaper reporter, passed Franklin as he was leaving the stand and Franklin is said to have cursed him. Nicholson made a jump at Franklin, but a bailiff intervened.

In the course of cross-examination of McManigal, Kernaghan, the former stenographer in the office of the McNamara defense, counsel for the defense protested that the questions asked the witness were improper. Assistant District Attorney Ford asked the young woman if his questions embarrassed her.

"No, they don't," said the witness, "but they are decidedly insulting."

Ford then apologized.

The company is to build and operate a factory in this city for the manufacture of automobile tires to replace pneumatic rubber tires.
