LIBERTY PRISON HERO DIES—The funeral of Robert W. Pool, a Civil War veteran who died Monday, was held yesterday from the chapel, 414 East Alder street, under the auspices of Sumner Post, No. 12, Grand Army. Interment was in Lone Fir Cemetery. Rev. H. R. Talbot, pastor of the First Church, conducted the religious services and the post followed with the rites of the Grand Army. Robert W. Pool had been a resident of Portland and vicinity for 25 years, and was active in the M. A. Ross Post reunions at Pleasant Home several years ago. For nearly ten years he had been suffering from illness. He was a member of the Eleventh Ohio Volunteers, was captured and imprisoned for 11 months in Libby, and was later exchanged and returned to his home. His widow survives. Several grown children live in Ohio.

WORK ON HILL PROPERTY STARTS—Work on the hill at the mouth of Sullivan's Gulch and along East Second street north of Burnside bridge has been completed for the present, and the steam apparatus has been moved to the block on East Second and Belmont streets, owned by the Hill interests. This block is being filled from the East Second street side, and south of the half block owned by the Hill interests on which the freight building is to be erected. Part of the buildings on the half block on Union avenue between East Morrison and Belmont streets have been vacated, and will be moved when construction on the freight building is started.

CATALOGUE RATING VARIES—According to the latest ruling of the Postoffice Department printed catalogues of third-class mail and postage on them is required to be prepaid by ordinary stamps at the rate of 1 cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof. If, however, at least 20 per cent of the space of the catalogue is occupied with samples of merchandise it shall be considered fourth-class mail and subject to the parcel post regulations.

MUCH SOUGHT JAPANESE LOCATED—After all the Japanese papers had been endeavoring to locate him for the past four months, and the aid of the Japanese Consul had been invoked, Detective Maloney and Sweeney yesterday secured George Tsukada, in a Japanese rooming-house. He is wanted by Sheriff Taylor, of Umatilla County, for swindling a brother Japanese out of \$140 December 31. Tsukada has been in trouble at Astoria, La Grande, Pendleton and other places.

ALEXANDER SAPP DIES—Alexander Sapp died Tuesday at his home 442 East Caruthers street, aged 59 years. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Nancy J. Sapp, and the following children: David A. John, Alphonso, George C. Rhoda, Lee and William Sapp, Mrs. E. J. Bennett and Mrs. Mary Sapp. The funeral will be held today from Dunning's chapel, 414 East Alder street, at 2 P. M., with interment in Rose City Cemetery.

AGED WOMAN DIES AT SANDY—Mrs. Susanna A. Chaffee, aged 84 years, died Monday at her home in Sandy, Or., and the body has been brought to Portland. The funeral was held from Skewes chapel yesterday. The body will be sent to Denver, Colo., where services were under the auspices of Shiloh Circle, No. 19, Women of the Grand Army, of which she was a member.
