Additional snow and rain, putting the United States Winter wheat belt in almost perfect condition and almost precluding any serious crop scare the present season, failed to stop the upturn in the market. The slight reaction at the close, however, came through assertions in some quarters that the Duluth export sales could not be confirmed. Primary receipts of wheat for two days were 1,577,000 bushels, against 791,000 a year ago; clearances of wheat for two days were 1,577,000 bushels.

Aggressive support by leading bulls forced the corn market to bulge. They were helped by the unacttled weather which threatened to interfers with wagon hauls and to increase feeding.
