Northern Pacific Must Give Up 293,000 Acres on Edge of Yakima Reserve.

SUPREME COURT DECIDES

Twice Appealed, Case Which Has Been in Courts Five Years, Returns to Government Very Valnable Area in Washington.

SPOKANE. Wash. Feb. 28.—(Special.)—By a decision handed down by the Supreme Court of the United States the Government recovers from the Northern Pacific Railway 293,000 acres of land extending from the western boundary of the Yakima Indian reservation to the Cascade Mountains, and valued at approximately \$2,000,000.

The case has been in the courts for five years. The Government's case was based on the contention that Federal surveys and engineers made a mistake when the western boundaries of the Yakima Indian reservation were fixed and that consequently that area extending from the western boundary of the reservation to the Cascades should revert to the Government in spite of the fact that the Northern Pacific had acquired title to most of the land and had resold some of it.
