

BOARD FROWNS ON MATERNAL DUTIES

Teacher Finds Scant Sympathy From New York School Directors.

BY-LAWS NOT SUSPENDED

Application for Year's Leave of Absence to Bear Child Rejected. Vote Is 32 to 5 Against Making Change in Rule.

NEW YORK, March 12.—The privileges of maternity cannot be claimed by a New York public school teacher, the Board of Education decided tonight, in denying the application of Mrs. Katherine C. Edgell for a year's leave of absence to bear a child. Her claim, which has been pending before the educational board since the city for several weeks, enlisted the sympathy of only five of the board when it came to a final vote tonight. Of these, two were women—one a matron, one a spinster.

Thirty-two members declared themselves, by their votes, unable to help this married woman high school teacher solve the problem of making the duties of a school mistress not entirely incompatible with those of a housewife and mother. By a vote of 28 to 5 the board decided not even to allow the question to be debated.

A suspension of the bylaws would have been necessary to grant Mrs. Edgell's application. For the purpose of study or restoration of health, a teacher may apply for absence without pay. Rearing children is a topic not mentioned in the bylaws, declared those who recognized the force of Mrs. Edgell's appeal.

The high schools committee considered the teacher's request last week and adopted a resolution favoring it.

Husband Also Is Teacher.
Mrs. Edgell is an instructor in physical training at Erasmus Hall High School, Brooklyn. Her husband is a teacher of mathematics at the same school. The committee's stand in her support was taken mainly upon the ground of her honesty and candor in explaining her wish to be absent.

Publication of Mrs. Edgell's request aroused a storm of expressions of criticism and approval. Educators, clergymen, workers in women's and children's welfare societies and others participated in a discussion as to whether a woman's teaching efficiency would be lessened by motherhood or her efficiency as a mother be handicapped by her position as a teacher.

It was learned tonight that Mrs. Edgell has filed a physician's certificate with the Board of Education, declaring her physically unable to work. Under the bylaws, which the Board refused to suspend, this move probably will entitle the teacher to a total of five months' absence with pay, according to her friends.

MILITARY COURT UPHELD
Judge Will Not Transfer "Mother" Jones to Civil Authorities.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., March 12.—Declaring that the Supreme Court of West Virginia had upheld the right of the Military Commission to try persons accused of violating the martial law proclamation now in force in the Kanawha coal region, where a strike has been in progress almost a year, Judge Littlepage in the Circuit Court declined today to order the transfer of "Mother" Jones and other labor leaders to a civil court for trial. He gave them five days in which to file an appeal.

Since the arrest of "Mother" Jones and 48 other persons in connection with the Paint Creek riots early in February, counsel for the aged woman has been endeavoring to have the cases heard by the civil authorities.

"PLUMS" PICKED IS BELIEF
Seattle Democrats See Moore Judge and McDonald Postmaster.

SEATTLE, March 12.—(Special.)—As the result of conference at Washington, D. C., between Democratic leaders of this state and Cabinet officers in charge of the various departments, the appointments of William Hickman Moore for Federal Judge and of F. A. McDonald as Seattle postmaster have been agreed upon and will be submitted to the Senate by President Wilson at an early date, possibly before the end of the week.

This was the gist of private information received today from the National capital by the local party members. While friends of other candidates do not yet admit the appointment of Moore as a certainty, dispatches from Washington indicate that the Attorney General had practically accepted him, and that his confirmation was only a matter of days.

EVA BOOTH VISITS IN CITY
American Salvation Army Commander Lectures Tomorrow Night.

Commander Eva Booth, of the American branch of the Salvation Army, will speak on the life of her father, General William Booth, at Lincoln High School tomorrow night at 8 o'clock. Miss Booth is making a tour of the United States and has met with large audiences.

In the story of her father's life Miss Booth tells all the facts relating to the great evangelist from his early boyhood until his death, and in addition features the world-famous funeral with the burial in Westminster Abbey.

To illustrate her address, 2500 feet of moving picture film and 100 colored pictures are used.

BETTING LAW IS LEGAL

MISSOURI SUPREME COURT AFFIRMS POLICY GAME ACT. Conviction of Joseph Cummings for Betting on Horse Race at Louisville Is Upheld.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., March 12.—The State Supreme Court affirmed today the constitutionality of the law prohibiting lotteries, policy games or betting, when it affirmed the sentence of Edward A. Hilton to three years' imprisonment for conducting a policy game in St. Louis.

The court also affirmed the conviction of Joseph Cummings for betting on a horse race at Louisville, Ky. Attorneys for Cummings raised the point that it was not known definitely that the race on which Cummings received a \$2 bet was conducted at Louisville. In answering this argument, Chief Justice Brown said in the opinion: "A court that would solemnly decree that it cannot judicially know facts which are well known to all its constituents would furnish thereby substantial reasons for its recall."

HANDBOOKS TO GO, SAY POLICE
St. Louis Chief Declares Supreme Court Ruling Changes Aspect.

ST. LOUIS, March 12.—Chief of Police Young said today that the decision of the Supreme Court affirming the conviction of Joseph Cummings would result in the stamping out of the police to stamp out handbooks in St. Louis.

Police raids on handbooks have been suspended pending the court's decision, as the officers said convictions were impossible if it were necessary to produce witnesses who had seen the races on which bets were recorded.

LAW EXTENSION SOUGHT
Daniels Wants Naval Academy Kept Up to Its Present Quota.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Secretary of the Navy Daniels announced today that he would seek to have the income tax law extended to the Naval Academy every four years by four years to the year 1917, and that the number of appointments to the academy will be cut one-half and within four years the number of midshipmen will be reduced from 1089 to 538.

"The capacity of the Naval Academy," said Secretary Daniels in a statement issued today, "is sufficient without enlargement to furnish officers for the line and staff of the Navy and Marine Corps in adequate numbers for many years to come, but if the number of appointments be reduced, the relative cost of educating each midshipman will increase, while the shortage in the Naval Academy will be increased."

There is little likelihood that the Naval Academy that the Government will require.

AGED HOTEL MAN AT REST
Late Father of Sister Mary Theresa of Portland, Dies at 97.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., March 12.—(Special.)—The funeral of the late Hugh McCormick, father of Sister Mary Theresa, of Saint Theresa's, Portland, Ore., was held here today.

Mr. McCormick was 97 years of age at the time of his death and was a pioneer hotel man of this place and, with his wife, who died nine years ago, was prominently identified with the early development of Atlantic City.

Sister Mary Theresa, the surviving daughter, was present at the funeral and intends to return to Portland soon.

Teacher Denies Whipping Report.
D. E. McArthur, who signs himself a teacher, writes from Erie to The Oregonian to say that the report published concerning the birthday spanking administered to Rheinhardt Kell by several boys playmates was greatly exaggerated and incorrect. According to the writer, the boy's drubbing was not more severe than the usual "spanking" administered to boys by other boys on birthday occasions. Rheinhardt is declared to have played as hard as ever for a couple of days thereafter before he was stricken with pneumonia.

Japanese Provide Harvard Course.
CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 12.—Japanese graduates of Harvard have subscribed a fund of \$20,000 to be used by the corporation as a foundation upon which to establish lectureships on Oriental philosophy. It is proposed to have professors from the leading universities of Japan come to Cambridge for two or more years at a time to give courses.

E. A. Clark Loses Auto.
E. A. Clark, 1881 East Seventeenth street, left his automobile No. 124, standing near the corner of Seventh and Alder streets about 8:30 last night, and when he returned an hour later it was gone. He notified the police, but at a late hour last night no trace had been found of the machine.

Woman Attempts Suicide.
Gwen Bowen, 25 years old, wife of John Bowen, an ironworker, early this morning tried suicide at 444½ Union avenue. She drank carbolic acid.

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Calling for the establishment of a public market, an ordinance recommended at a joint meeting of the public market committee of the Mutualists Association and representatives from similar organizations yesterday will be placed in the hands of one of the Council members of the city to be introduced at a session of the City Council.

The principal provisions of the ordinance, in the draft approved by the joint committee, are for an appropriation of \$15,000 out of the general fund for the establishment of the market, and for the appointment of a market bureau of five members who shall serve without pay, to establish and supervise the operation of the proposed market.

It is also provided that the net surplus of the business of the market shall be divided, 5 per cent to the educational work, 20 per cent to a reserve fund, and 75 per cent shall be refunded to producers and dealers dealing in the market in the proportion of the amount of their patronage, providing that no rebate shall be allowed to anyone except a bona fide dealer.

Another meeting of the joint committee will be held next Wednesday to consider further the plans for the market. Those who were present at the meeting yesterday were: Father E. V. O'Hara, E. R. ANNULMENT PLEA IS LOST
Wealthy Seattle Contractor Wins In Action Brought at Oregon City.

OREGON CITY, Or., March 12.—(Special.)—Judge Campbell today dismissed the petition of the defendant to have a divorce decree granted 20 years ago set aside in the case of Mary Normale against Simon Normale. The plaintiff and defendant married after the decree was granted, and had the plaintiff won her suit for annulment, she would have been legally declared a bigamist. She alleged that her husband left her while they were living in Astoria, Ore., to go to Seattle, promising to send for her and her child when he became financially able. She avers that soon after he filed suit for a divorce and proposed fraudulently sent a copy of the paper containing the summons to a wrong address. The plaintiff, however, admitted that she learned of the decree soon after it was granted. Her husband, who was a wealthy contractor, months later and in a year or so she also was married.

GAS RANGE KILLS NINE
Mother, Six Children and Two Neighbors Burned to Death.

UNIONTOWN, Pa., March 12.—Mrs. Emma Nouts and her six children were fatally burned today when a lamp exploded in their home at Filbert, near here. The children range in age from two to ten.

Mrs. Daisy Holland was burned to death, her husband, Ellis Holland, was fatally injured and Mrs. Louis De Saullies was hurt when the gas in the kitchen range at the Holland home here exploded today. Mrs. De Saullies was a neighbor and attempted to rescue the Hollands.

ADMIRALS IN FIST FIGHT
Italian Officials Cause Sensation by Conflict in Streets.

ROME, March 12.—A street fight with fists between Admiral Pasquale Cattolica, the Italian Minister of Marine, and Admiral Gozzo, recently retired from the Italian navy, caused a great sensation here today.

Admiral Gozzo, meeting the Minister of Marine on the street, went straight up to him and boxed his ears. Admiral Cattolica replied energetically to the assault and a rough and tumble conflict continued until the combatants were separated by bystanders and Admiral Gozzo was arrested by the police.

Gozzo's grievance, it is said, was the Minister's act in placing him on the retired list.
