OREGON SENATORS TO ACT TOGETHER

Action on Appointments Will Await Conference of Lane and Chamberlain.

APPLICANTS FLOOD MAIL

Nine-Tenths of Letters Received by Each Refer to Patronage—Junior Senator Not in Hasto to Make Selections.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, March 12.—Senator Chamberlain and Senator Lane are literally swamped with letters from loyal Oregon Democrats seeking jobs for themselves or recommending their friends for appointment, and so great is the flood of correspondence that neither Senator has been able to sift out the wheat from the chaff.

Senator Chamberlain has some advantage over his colleague, in that he has had time to consider many of the applications that have been filed with him, but Senator Lane, since his arrival in Washington, has been so busy trying to classify his letters that he has not yet had the opportunity to look into the qualifications of various applicants and pick out the men he believes are best suited for the respective jobs.

Senators Will Confer.
Until the two Senators have a conference, no recommendations will be submitted to President Wilson or his cabinet advisers, for it is the purpose of Senators Chamberlain and Lane to act unitedly, if such a thing is possible.

The fact that few, if any, appointments will be made by President Wilson until Congress convenes in special session in April has given the Oregon Senators time to go over their correspondence. It was Senator Chamberlain's desire to get some of the appointments out of the way during the extra session of the Senate, but Senator Lane was not able at that time to classify his applications, and at his suggestion senatorial action was postponed. Senator Lane appears to be in no hurry whatsoever about filling any of the offices now at the disposal of himself and Senator Chamberlain, but it is inferred that the senior Senator would be glad to clean up the available slate with as little delay as possible.

"I am here representing the people of Oregon, not the Democrats alone," said Senator Lane, "and I feel it is incumbent upon me to recommend in every instance the most available and the most competent man who can be found. The people have a right to demand that we select good men and not play politics with this newly acquired patronage, and it will be my endeavor to support only men who, if appointed, will give efficient service."

Senators' Desks Congested.
When Senator Lane arrived in Washington he brought with him "from 50 to 75 pounds of applications for office," as he expressed it, and since his arrival new applications have been coming in by mail and by wire at the rate of about ten pounds a day. Probably nine-tenths of his mail bears on patronage, either applications from Democrats seeking appointments or endorsements sent by friends.
Senator Chamberlain's mail is quite as large, and the percentage of patronage correspondence is about the same. Neither Senator has been able to make reply to all the applications filed, and it takes several weeks before the

OREGON SENATORS ARE ABLE TO CLEAR THEIR DESKS

LAND SUIT TO BE HURRIED
Attorney-General Promises to Expedite Proceedings in Oregon.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, March 12.—Senator Lane, Representatives Sigmund and Lafferty and National Committeeman King called today on the Attorney-General and urged that the Southern Pacific land-grant suit be expedited as speedily as practicable consistent with public interest.

Senator Lane explained that he is getting many complaints on account of the delay, especially from settlers whose lands are involved. The Attorney-General promised to give the request prompt attention and said it probably would be necessary to withdraw B. D. Townsend from the California oil land and other cases and to direct him to devote his entire time to the land-grant suit in Oregon until it is disposed of.

EXILED WIFE JOINS RULER

President Plaza, of Ecuador, to See One Child for First Time.

NEW YORK, March 12.—Senora Leonidas Plaza, wife of the President of Ecuador, sailed today with her five children for Colon, there to cross the Isthmus and join her husband in Quito. The varied political fortunes of Senora Plaza have kept her for more than five years, an exile from her native land.
Senora Plaza, who was elected President of Ecuador last September, after years spent in the United States as an exile, never has seen his youngest child, born 17 months ago, a month after he returned to his home in South America. All five children were born in America and none of them can speak Spanish, the mother tongue of the country which their father rules.

DRESS STRIKE NEAR END

Workers Likely to Accept Small Increase and Other Concessions.

NEW YORK, March 12.—It was indicated tonight that the strike of nearly 15,000 workers in the dress and children's dress trade, which began last Monday, will be settled tomorrow and the employees return to work by the latter part of this week. At meetings today, various groups of workers voted on a settlement offer made by the manufacturers and the majority favored acceptance.
The terms of the offer include a 5 per cent increase in wages at once, an additional increase of 5 per cent July 1, a 50-hour week, the abolition of the subcontract system, a sanitary board to look after conditions in the shops, and time and half for overtime.

AID IS NOT GIVEN PRINCE

French Court Refuses to Consider Case of American Fortune.

PARIS, March 12.—Prince Henri de Bearn et Chalais today failed to get the assistance of the French Court of Appeals in obtaining \$249,000 from a bank in Baltimore as part of the fortune left to him by his late wife. She was Beatrice Winans, daughter of the late Rosa Winans. The Prince represented that the brothers of his dead wife opposed his inheritance of the property.
The presiding judge declined to consider the case, ruling that the Prince must lodge his claims in the American courts.

The Princess died in St. Petersburg in 1907, leaving two small children.

PASTOR TELLS HOW CONN STOLE WIFE

Minister Intercepts Letter From "Society Burglar" to His Home.

FIVE CHILDREN DESERTED

Love Epistle Found by Husband but Man in Jail Protests It Is Meaningless and Remains Visitor Until Woman Goes.

CHICAGO, March 12.—Letters written by Owen D. Conn, the "society burglar" now under arrest at San Francisco, to Rev. Nestor K. Clarkson and a letter from Conn to Mrs. Clarkson, intercepted by Rev. Mr. Clarkson, throw considerable light on the attachment between the burglar and the wife of a Chicago missionary. Mrs. Clarkson, her husband says, not only left him to go with the burglar, but she also deserted her five children that she might be with the man who now says he entered upon his career of robbery to provide her with luxuries.
A letter intercepted by Rev. Mr. Clarkson, written by Conn when he was serving a prison sentence at Waukegan, Wis., was couched in terms of endearment, but, though a love letter, the terms used were moderate. Conn apologized for being compelled to use moderate terms.

"Lock of Hair" Mentioned.
An excerpt from the letter, which evidently is a reply to one from Mrs. Clarkson, reads:

"I recall a message that I received while in the Milwaukee jail to the effect that someone who said they would stick by me through thick and thin, when all others would desert me.
"This has been a beacon of hope to me in times of discouragement and much of my hope is centered in its promises. Will it be fulfilled? Oh, I hope so, yet I sometimes have doubts about it. Where is that lock of hair? Why, I've got it and intend always to have it. Also the ring, or what's left of it. The photograph would not have been returned, only I have another like it. Would you like to see that one returned, too? Well, you can all you want for all the good it will do you. I've got three now. What do you think of that? The last one is the best, because it was the last one received. Wireless here."

Minister Warns Burglar.

Immediately upon finding this letter, Rev. Mr. Clarkson says, he wrote to Conn, telling him to leave Mrs. Clarkson alone. Conn answered, seeking to convince the minister that there was nothing wrong in his association with Mrs. Clarkson. This letter reads:
"Under the circumstances, I have tried to imagine myself in your position, as you stated it, and I will answer you accordingly.
"I must admit that you have the right to be indignant at the seemingly frivolous or sentimental tone of my correspondence with Mrs. C. But, my dear sir, you are wholly mistaken as to my intentions regarding her. I know I have been very familiar in my attitude in many ways, but, as God is my judge, I have never suggested or proposed anything dishonorable to her at any time.
"While, perhaps, I have taken some extreme liberties in addressing her, I have always borne in mind the fact that I look upon her as a good friend, yet as your wife and as the mother of your children, sacred ties to me.
Sentiment Said to Be Gratitude.
"Mrs. Clarkson was a very good friend to me when I did not have a

friend in the world. She interceded for me in court, cheered me up when I was discouraged. She has helped me on and in many ways kept me from being discouraged. Would not I be a base ingrate if I was not grateful for this?"

Rev. Mr. Clarkson says Mrs. Clarkson met Conn while she was acting as a jail missionary. Her devotion for him is said to have grown out of attempts to reform him, immediately after being released from prison, after meeting Mrs. Clarkson, the "society burglar" professed religion and became a frequent visitor at the Clarkson home. So noticeable became his attentions to Mrs. Clarkson, Mr. Clarkson says, that even the children saw that something was wrong and one made the remark that she was afraid that Conn would "try to marry mamma."

Mr. Clarkson tells of several efforts on his part to break up the growing attachment and of a final break with his wife when, finding Mrs. Clarkson with Conn on the North Side, he demanded that she choose between himself and the burglar.
"I will go with Mr. Conn," she is said to have replied to his demand. She then fled with Conn and Mr. Clarkson says he saved for a request by telephone from her that she be permitted to see her babies again, he has never heard from her. The call was two weeks ago. Rev. Mr. Clarkson says he was compelled to decline his wife's request.

MORE BOOTY IS RECOVERED

Secret Cache of Conn's Loot Brings Total Value Far Above \$100,000.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—Mrs. Owen D. Conn, alias Papa, secretly cached a large amount of loot before she disappeared and the police believe the total amount of Conn's thefts was far in excess of \$100,000. Detectives refused today to give the location of the newly-discovered stolen jewelry, but said positively that the loot had been located and that the place was being watched in the hope of catching other members of the gang.
The jewelry recovered in the hotel, that found at the pawnshops and today's find will make up the largest collection of stolen goods ever recovered in the city," said Captain of Detectives Mooney.

Hundreds of persons viewed the display today of jewelry at the office of the property clerk at the city prison. Thirteen persons recovered, by positive identifications, all or portions of their property. Mrs. Anna Partridge, of Pasadena, from whose home jewelry valued at \$8000 was taken, arrived here today and recovered a breastpin and two rings. Other loot identified was the spoil of Bay City burglaries.

LARGER ARMY OPPOSED

FRENCH SCHOLARS OBJECT TO HURRIED INCREASE.

Professors Ask Thoughtful Consideration Without Haste and Without Excess of Emotion.

PARIS, March 12.—Some opposition to the immense and hurried increase of the peace footing of the French army has made its appearance. Some 350 professors of the Sorbonne, among them the finest scholars in France, have issued a united address to the people of France not to yield thoughtlessly to the military panic and to forces of reaction which tend toward desperate adventures hostile to the republican government.
The professors do not declare themselves opposed to the three-year period of service in the active army, but ask for the fullest and most thoughtful consideration of the situation, without haste and without excess of emotion. Another declaration signed by Anatole France and several members of the French Institute, literary men, scientists and professors, published today, urged calm consideration of the proposed military measure, "which, if adopted, will profoundly affect the life of France, both intellectually and economically."

GOVERNOR ACCUSES HEAD OF PRISONS

Sulzer Charges Clark With Neglect of Duty in Conduct of Thaw Case.

ACCUSED TO REPLY TODAY

Superintendent Said to Have Allowed Records to Be Changed and to Have Permitted Prisoners to Violate Rules.

ALBANY, N. Y., March 12.—Charges of "non-feasance and neglect of duty" were preferred today against Colonel Joseph F. Scott, Superintendent of State Prisons, by Governor Sulzer. The Governor in presenting the charges wrote Colonel Scott that he would have an opportunity to be heard tomorrow.

The charges are based largely upon the report submitted by the Governor's committee of inquiry.
It is charged that Colonel Scott "intentionally and wilfully neglected and refrained from discharging a sales agent of the prison's department until his dismissal was demanded by the Governor, that Scott appointed, Dr. James V. May as superintendent of the Matteawan asylum instead of Dr. Amos

T. Baker, assistant superintendent of the institution, who stood first on the civil service list.

Thaw Allowed to Alter Record.

The Governor declares that Scott failed to investigate reports that Dr. May altered the hospital case book containing a record of an examination of Harry K. Thaw made by Dr. May and Dr. John W. Russell, "and that even Thaw himself was allowed to alter such record, and that Dr. Russell, then superintendent of the institution, was not suspended nor dismissed."
It is further charged that because of neglect to maintain proper supervision over Matteawan State Hospital, Thaw was permitted to receive and have large sums of money in his possession; that Dr. Russell permitted various persons to see Thaw virtually without restriction and to transact business with him without official surveillance over him; that Thaw was permitted to "give large sums of money to some of those persons and money to all of them," and that Dr. Russell knew that John Nicholson Anhut had received \$25,000 in cash and marketable securities for the purpose of releasing Thaw from the hospital.

Attitude Toward Russell Criticized.

The accusation further recites that Colonel Scott neglected to suspend Dr. Russell after he learned of the alleged statement on the part of Anhut to bribe Dr. Russell and after Anhut had testified before the committee of inquiry that Dr. Russell had told him "he would not do anything for Thaw without being paid for it" and that "\$25,000 would not begin to compensate him," and that by accepting Dr. Russell's resignation as superintendent over the telephone Colonel Scott "intentionally attempted to defeat any demand of the Governor for the dishonorable dismissal of said superintendent of said hospital."

Supreme Court Admits Clark.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Speaker Clark was admitted today to practice before the Supreme Court. He was introduced by ex-Judge Sheppard Barclay, of St. Louis, Mo., who vouched for his good standing and qualifications as a lawyer. The Speaker does not expect to practice before the court in the immediate future at least.
