

George Clemenceau, ex-Premier, was one of the principal opponents of the proportional representation bill in the Senate. The measure provides for abolition of the small constituencies established in 1875. Under the old system, each elector votes for one deputy only. The

elector votes for one deputy only. The proposed law substituted a system of list voting by which the electors would vote for as many deputies as the entire department had to elect. It also in-troduced a system to provide repre-sentation for minorities, by which, after the poll was taken, the number of seats in the department was to be di-vided proportionately among the dif-ferent parties.

The amendment on which the Cabi-net was defeated proposed that the majority party should receive absolute representation insteacd of a proportional vote.
