

Employers Warned Against Entering Under Provisions Commissioner Defends Bill.

The question as to whether the work. man's compensation act passed by the last Legislature will be an improvement over the present employers' lia-bility law was debated Wednesday slight before 150 members of the Bullders' Exchange, an organization of con-

ractors and builders. Opposed to workman's compensation was Coy Burnett, an attorney, who discussed its provisions in detail. He warned employers against entering under the provisions of the act, which the law itself leaves to their own choice. He declared that if employers accept the provisions of the act they are entering into a compact which forfeits their constitutional rights. He said, should the courts decide the act constitutional, the employer would be defenseless against a hostile Legislature, who could raise the sum to be paid to injured workmen to any amount.
