EASTER SERVICES CROWD CHURCHES

Impressive Ceremonies Held by All Religious Denominations in Portland.

Knights Templars Commemorate Resurrection and Oratorical Soclety and Centenary Choir Offer "Redemption."

In solemn and impressive ceremonies yesterday the churches throughout the city, both of the Catholic and Protestdenominations, commemorated the Resurrection in appropriate Easter services. Attendance at the principal churches of the city at both morning and evening services was so large that almost without exception it was nec-

almost without exception it was necessary for them to turn away many persons from the doors. At the White Temple and the First Congregational Church hundreds of people were unable to secure seats within the auditoriums and were turned away.

Ceremonles in all of the Catholic churches of the city were simple, special music and seasonable decorations being the principal features apart from the ordinary services. In the Episcopal churches services were held and in the Pro-cathedral at Thirteenth and Clay streets, Elishop Scadding presided at \$4.15 in the afternoon over a special Easter-dag service.

Dr. L. R. Dyott preached upon "The Triumphs of the Knights Templars." The members of the Oregon Commandery marched through the streets from their lodgerooms to and from the church.
