

"FOLLIES" WILL BE REPEATED TONIGHT

Proceeds of Theater Managers' Frolic to Go to Fund for Flood Sufferers.

FULL PROGRAMME BILLED

Parade Today at Noon to Traverse Principal Streets, Led by Mayor

Charity called as the "1913 Follies" of the Portland Theater Managers' Association crowding the Hellig Theater Thursday night the first thought of the actor-showmen was that a new call on the benevolence of residents of the city might raise a fund equally as large in aid of the flood sufferers of Ohio and Indiana.

The suggestion met instant approval, announcement was made that the Follies in all their grandeur would be repeated tonight, the ticket rack of the Hellig was refilled for another worthy cause and before the laughter over "East Lynne" had subsided the clink of gold in the Hellig boxoffice bore the message that Portland's theatergoers were emptying their pockets to help the afflicted states.

In a special meeting yesterday it was decided by the theater managers to repeat the "Follies" for a night, and the entire cast of the Hellig tonight and toat every cent garnered by the benefit performance would be turned over to the Chamber of Commerce in aid of the flood and fire-stricken cities of Ohio and Indiana.

Mayor to Lead Parade. The 19 theater managers seemed to be in control of as many portions of the city in preparation for the evening. George L. Baker telephoned to Mayor Rushlight, who promised to lead a grand parade advertising revival of the "Follies" for a night, to be held tonight by Chief Siewer, that a platoon of police would join the pageant, other theater managers rang up automobile concerns; in but a few minutes every front in the city had pledged himself to aid the cause; men, women and children were listed to sell flowers in behalf of the stricken states while all this was in progress the matinee audience at the Baker, Orpheum, Empress, Pantages and Lyric were being urged to attend the Hellig tonight, to help the unfortunate thousands of Ohio and Indiana. An orchestra of 25 pieces, provided by the Musicians' Mutual Association, local No. 59, will play during the Follies.

Every candy factory in the city will donate sweetmeats, the sale of which will help swell the fund for the Ohio and Indiana victims of the flood. Noon today is the time set for the parade, which promises to be of proportions seldom equaled in Portland. Every member of the Hellig tonight will be in costume, and the entire cast of the "Follies" band or suffer a fine. This means, it is estimated, that at least 300 hand musicians will be in line at the Hellig at noon today to head the all-theater pageant.

Chorus Girls to Parade. The 10 theater managers will ride in taxicabs as in their parade Thursday, chorus girls from the Lyric will go with Sam E. Kramer in his coach and four, every actor and actress entertaining at the vaudeville houses in Portland and the fire department will be represented by a delegation, members of the Theatrical Mechanics' Association will march and even the members of the various theaters of the city.

No particular line of march has been mapped. It will be a case of "follow the leader"—Mayor Rushlight, Dr. W. H. Fisher, however, will lead the parade, and persons who station themselves at any corner on Theater Row from Washington to Taylor will not miss any portion of the Hellig. The same programme that tickled the multitude at the Hellig Thursday night will be presented tonight. All the vaudeville acts that graced the "Follies" card promised with alacrity to appear again and the theater managers will close the charity show with their delightful burlesque of "East Lynne."

ELKS LEAVE TODAY

Large and Joyous Crowd Going to Seattle at 11.

LODGE MEN PARADE HERE

Seattle Herd Plans Noisy Reception When Brothers Arrive in Puget Sound City — Cornerstone Laying to Be Event.

Every Elk in Portland will be in Seattle tonight—if not in person, then in spirit—to assist in the ceremonies laying the cornerstone of the new Elks' temple at the corner of Fourth and Spring streets in that city. It is certain, though, that there will be 150 or more real, live Portland Elks in Seattle at that, for the reservations for the special train leaving at 11 o'clock this morning indicate a large and joyous crowd.

Parade Starts at 10:30. All the excursionists will assemble in the clubrooms at the Elks' temple, Stark street and Broadway, at 10:30 this morning. At that hour the lodge men, headed by the band, will start on a parade through the principal business streets preparatory to boarding the train.

Members of the Seattle herd are planning a noisy reception. The train is due to arrive there at 6 P. M. A big delegation will meet them and take them to the Seattle Hotel, where a big "feed" will be staged.

The Portland party will stay in Seattle until 11 o'clock Sunday morning, when the special will start for home over the Northern Pacific. Tickets, however, will be good returning until April 1.

A stop of half an hour will be made at Centralia this afternoon and the band will give a little concert there in the street. The Centralia Elks will join the Portland delegation and go to Seattle to help in the cornerstone laying.

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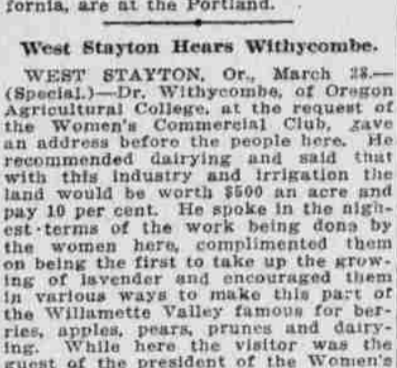
