Power Company President's Resignation Is Regretted by Operators of Cars.

KIND DEEDS ARE RECALLED

Committee of 25, Representing 1200 Conductors and Motormen, Invade Private Office to Express Sentiment.

Marching into the office of the President of the Portland, Railway, Light & Power Company in the Electrin building without ceremony or no-tification, 25 motormen and conductors yesterday afternoon surrounded B. S. Josselyn, while he was at work and notified him of their regret over his decision to retire July 1. The conductors and motormen were appointed as a committee to represent the 1200 piatform men of the company, and were instructed to call upon Mr. Josse. lyn and notify him of the sentiment among the rank and file over his resig-

D. W. Collier, of the Savier-street barns, acted as spokesman. He said that during the six years of Mr. Josselyn's occupancy of the position of president, he had constantly looked after the interests of the men—that his door was always open to every man in the employ of the company, no matter what might be his position—and that the men felt that he was a real friend, inasmuch as he had worked up from the ranks himself, and for that reason the men wanted to express their gratitude for his many kind acts and to express their keen regret over his resignation.

President Josselyn replied in a few words, saying that he was highly pleased over the expression of loyalty and friendship of the men and that he simply had tried to do his duty—that while he worked up from the ranks himself, he always felt that by so doing he was better able to sympathize with the platform men than if he had not "performed on the hurricane deck of a freight car."

C. M. Clark, chairman of the executive board, who was present, also made a few remarks and told the committee that, speaking for himself and the Eastern stockholders of the company, that they equally regretted with the men the departure of Mr. Josselyn from the company's employment.

"I hope," said Mr. Clark, "that you will give Mr. Josselyn's successor the same able support that you have given Mr. Josselyn."
