SAN FRANCISCO, April 13.—(Special.)—With the morning game a tie that was called in the 12th inning, and the afternoon spectacle, 4 to 0, in favor of the Oaks, the Beavers leave for home tonight after four out of the seven games played the property of the Oaks.

The score sheet of the afternoon game shows that James is charged with the defeat, but as a matter of fact it was Fisher more than any one else who deserves the blame. James got away with a three-hit game as compared to the seven hits rolled up by Malarkey, but in the fifth inning, in which all the trouble happened, a combination of lack of control on the part of James, two bad errors by Fisher and a questionable decision by Finney, were responsible.

Fisher Throws Away Game.

James started the inning by walking Rohrer. Malarkey tried to sacrifice but Fisher would not have it that way and instead of forcing Rohrer threw the ball away to center field. Lead sacrificed when he hit to Derrick, for although he forced Rohrer, Rohrer went on to third. Schirm walked, although from the stands it looked as if he had been fanned, and then came Fisher's faux pas. Zacher hit to James for an easy out, but Fisher, anxious to make a double, dropped the throw and two men—Rohrer and Lead—scored. Zacher stole second and Coy singled to center to send more runners across the plate. Coy was caught at second trying a steal and hitting fanned.

The Beavers never had a chance until the ninth, when they bunched two hits, and by that time they were too far behind.

For the morning game this summary tells the story: Portland, 2 runs, 13 hits, 3 errors; Oakland, 2 runs, 2 hits, 2 errors. Called in 12th inning.

Luck All With Oaks.

The above sum and substance is evidence in itself to prove the element of luck which was enjoyed by the Oaks. To substantiate Manager Walter McCredie's claim of "hard luck," Hi West can be trotted out again. Last Sunday morning he was beaten in another 12-inning game by a 1 to 0 score after he had allowed only five hits. This morning he battled even harder against fate.

West went in the box in the third inning, after Stanley, the left-hander, had yielded the Oaks their only two runs, and 'twas well for the Oaks. West allowed two more runs, single by Hettling in the succeeding 10 innings, and he had his opponents going out in one-two-three order. West undoubtedly pitched one of the best games of his career, and still the best he gets is a draw.

On the other hand Gregory was receiving all the smiles of Dame Fortune.

McCredie's Boot Costly.

In the first, with Stanley pitching, Schirm walked after Lead had fanned, and promptly stole second. Zacher fled to Krueger, and Coy hit one to McCormick that figured an easy out. The shortstop booted the ball so badly, however, that Schirm scored.

In the second Ness led with a triple to center, and he trotted home on Cook's sacrifice fly to Fitzgerald. The Beavers did not score until the third. Lindsay singled to Hettling and Rodgers sacrificed. Krueger fouled out to Rohrer, but Derrick dropped a Texas Leaguer to right, scoring Lindsay.

In the seventh the Beavers tied it up. Lindsay singled to center. Rodgers flew to Zacher. Krueger forced Lindsey at second, but in later later stole second. BEAVERS RETURN FIRST DIVISION

Record of .500 On Road Regarded as Good by Portland Fans.

BATTING SLUMP WORRIES

Team Fails to Convert Hits to Runs and, While Pitchers Are Showing Class, Supporters Want to See Greater Scoring.

NEWHOUSE AND HELD TO UMPIRE IN PORTLAND.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 13.—A shift of umpires for the coming week's games of the Pacific Coast League is announced today. Newhouse and "Red" Held to go to Portland, Bush and McCarthy to San Francisco, Ed Finney and Billy Phyle to Los Angeles.

Despite the loss of the second series of the year to Oakland, four games to two, the Portland Beavers will return home Tuesday morning with a winning percentage of .500. This is mighty good work for any club on foreign soil, especially at the start of the year, and Portland fans naturally are highly elated with McCredie's AA bunch.

The three weeks at home against Los Angeles, Sacramento and Venice should give the Beavers a chance to recoup and get a good toe-hold on the percentage ladder for the next trip around the circuit.

When the Portland club springs its new white uniforms to the public game Tuesday afternoon at 2:15, more than one-half the squad will be new to the club—will be new to Portland fans. Only eight of the 23 athletes—Fisher, Higginbotham, Rodgers, Lindsay, Chadbourne, Fitzgerald, Doane and Krueger—are holdovers of the 1912 team, but Krapp, Carson and Berry are all familiar to Coast League enthusiasts.

Twelve New to Fans.

The new stars are: Catchers, Riordan and Loan; pitchers, West, Krause, Hagerman, James and Stanley; infielders, Derrick, Kores, McCormick and Heilmann, and outfielder, Cunningham.

While fans cannot but be satisfied with the first two weeks' showing, the batting slump which the club seems to be enjoying at present is causing considerable concern. For a team boasting of seven .300 hitters, the Beavers have done little scoring in the series with the Oaks, which closed yesterday.

Aside from the opening game, which Portland won, 5 to 0, Krause setting blizzards down with two hits, the Beavers scored only five runs in the series. Five runs in six games will not win many pennants, and it's no fault of the twirlers that McCredie did not attack the series in three of the games the Oaks kalsomined us.

Old Stars Due to Hit Stride.

But Rodgers, Krueger, Doane and Fitzgerald, at least, are natural .300 hitters and they should hit about as hard as their stride in the three weeks impending on the home lot. When that bunch does get into action, with the pitchers working as hard as they have been the first two weeks, the Beavers are bound to soar skyward like a Fourth of July rocket.

McCredie's choice of Harry Krause as opening day pitcher at Portland is a happy one. Krause is one of the most widely exploited fingers in the National pastime and his sensational two-hit performance at San Francisco last Tuesday stamps him as one of the best men in the league.

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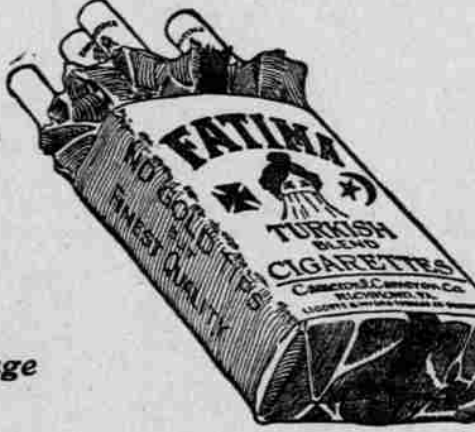
