CITY PRINTING CONTRACT IS LET.—The Daily Abstract, a business newspaper of the city, was yesterday awarded the contract for city printing during the year beginning July 1. The award was made on a bid of 29 cents an inch for the printing of 200,000 copies, notices and other matters required by the city.

MAYOR NAMES COMMITTEE.—Mayor Rushlight yesterday appointed Mayor A. N. Felts, Dr. Sarah Whitesides, George A. Thacher, Father McDevitt and W. G. MacLaren members of a committee to investigate ways and means of establishing a detention home for women and for a municipal hospital for the treatment of venereal diseases.

WILKINS SEEMS CONCERNED SEAT.—A. Winans, of 451 Almsworth avenue, yesterday filed notice of intention to seek the Republican nomination for Councilman from the Tenth Ward. His slogan is "Punish Speed Maniacs." In his platform he says, "If nominated and elected I will during my term of office work for adequate streetcar service, regulation and punishment of speed maniacs and in general will give faithful and efficient service for the betterment of the city and the upbuilding and prosperity of the city."

BULGER MADE STATE AGENT.—In order that he may make arrests in all parts of Oregon without bothering local officers Harry Bulger, special agent of County Judge Clouston in the enforcement of the non-support law, has been appointed a state agent by the Sheriff for New York to attend to business matters there.

WOODMEN WILL RALLY TONIGHT.—A rally of the Woodmen of the World will be held tonight in the hall of Multnomah Camp No. 7, Washington and East Third streets, when a large delegation of members will gather for the district convention which meets in Salem May 21. A large number of the delegates to the convention will be present. There will be a drill of prize teams.

OPTOMETRY SOCIETY MEETS.—The recently-organized Portland Society of Optometry held its meeting at the Imperial Hotel Tuesday night which was well attended. The object of the society is to promote the welfare of optometry and bring about a closer relationship between its members.

DELEGATES WILL ATTEND GENERAL ASSEMBLY.—Rev. Jacob Snyder, of First Presbyterian Church, and Rev. Thomas H. Walker, of Calvary Church, are delegates to the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church, which convenes in Atlanta, Ga., about the middle of May. The important feature of the meeting of the general assembly in May is the matter of union with other Presbyterian bodies, the general assemblies of which will meet at Atlanta at the same time.

PHREIGHT RATE ON SALT TO BE CUT.—Effective June 1 the rate on salt moved between Portland and Eugene in railroad lots will be reduced from 20 cents per 100 pounds to 25 cents per 100 pounds on the North Bank line. This is a concession to Spokane business men who long have protested for this reduction. Salt comes to Portland from California in shiploads and is distributed from here to Spokane and other inland points.

AGED WOMAN DIED.—Mrs. Anna Johnson died at Champege, Or., Thursday night and the body has been brought to Portland for interment. She was 81 years of age and had lived in Portland before moving to Champege. She was mother of Mrs. E. Oberg and Mrs. J. Johnson. The funeral will be conducted from Zeller's chapel, 422 Williams avenue and the interment will be made in Rose City Cemetery.

H. M. LANDIS IS ARRESTED.—H. M. Landis, a real estate dealer with an office in the Henry building, was arrested yesterday by Detectives Mallet and Price, on a charge of the larceny of a note for \$500. The complainant is D. D. Hill, a business man of Mosier, who alleges that he received the note from Landis in a business deal, and later Landis asked to see it, put it in his pocket and refused to return it.

NINTH WARD TAXPAYERS ORGANIZED.—To protect themselves against " unjust tax" the graft, street improvements and " unjust laws," the property owners of the Ninth Ward have organized the Ninth Ward Protective Association.
