GARBAGE MEN AT WAR

FEUD STARTS UPON INVASION BY POWER TRUCKS. First Clash Results in Auto Driver Giving Bond and Three Opponents Face Charges.

Ash cans went undumped yesterday and potato parings fermented in the sun, while the garbage collectors of the city gathered in Municipal Court to present their differences. Not less than a score of the fraternity were present, as combatants, witnesses or spectators, represented by opposing attorneys and filling the air with guttural objections. Not long ago capital looked over the municipal field and selected the disposition of refuse as a lucrative calling. Auto trucks were installed and began making the rounds of the biggest producers of waste. Complaints being of no avail, cave-men methods were resorted to. Henry Schwartz, who cast in his lot with the new concern, complained that he was set upon and beaten by a gang of his competitors. Philip Bechtoldt retorted that Schwartz threatened to kill him. Cross-complaint issued and the first gun of the war was fired yesterday, the advocates of the old system retaining a special prosecutor to make good and sure that Henry went to jail. Thoroughly impressed with the menace of a full-fledged garbage war, Judge Tarwell held up his hands, and set the cases over until next week, urging the competitors to get together amicably in the meantime.

LOST CHILD IS RECOVERED

Victor Lindholm Name of Youngster Found Wednesday by Police.

Little Nemo, alias Johnny Doe, has been identified. After remaining lost for 36 hours, he was claimed, under the name Victor Lindholm, by his father, who lives at 766 Missouri avenue. Victor first came to notice Wednesday morning, when business men around the intersection of Russell street and Albina avenue, saw him playing about their premises. He was exceedingly grimy and went all day without anything to eat, until Patrolman Snyder picked him up late in the day. He was taken to the Police Station and remained there all night, receiving a thorough scrubbing by the women prisoners. When no one claimed him Thursday, he was sent to the baby home, but yesterday morning an anxious father appeared at the Police Station and was put on his trail. He said that the child had wandered off in his absence, the mother being confined to the house by the care of a smaller baby.

GERMANS ARE INVITED

OREGON IMMIGRATION COMMISSION CALLS CONFERENCE.

Action Is Preliminary Step in Getting Northern Europeans Interested in Pacific Northwest.

First of a series of preliminary conferences which will be held by the Oregon Immigration Commission at the Portland Commercial Club, prior to beginning its active campaign to attract desirable foreign immigration to this state, will be a conference with representatives of the German-American citizens and representatives of German-speaking societies in the state. This conference has been set for May 15, at 10 A. M. At later dates conferences will be held in a similar way with representatives in Oregon of the Swedish, Norwegian, Danish, Finnish and Dutch people. In the call that has been sent out by C. C. Chapman, state immigration agent, the plans for the immigration campaign so far as they have been completed, are outlined and the German representatives are requested to participate in the meeting at the Commercial Club, May 15. The call in part is: You and any other representative German-American citizens of your acquaintance or representatives of German-American religious or social organizations are hereby invited to a hearing to be held by the Oregon State Immigration Commission Thursday, May 15, at 10 A. M., at the office of the commission in the Commercial Club building, Portland, Or. Inasmuch as our lists have been completed invitations of this character have been extended to all of the following: President and vice delegate from each German religious and social organization, clergyman and lay delegate from each German church or parish. Editor of each German periodical or newspaper. Representative of each German agricultural colony. State officials of German birth or parentage, including legislators. United States Government immigration officials. Leading citizens who are known to any one of the Immigration Commissioners as having been interested or identified with immigration work. Officers of development leagues or commercial clubs. Realizing that our lists may not be complete, we ask you to transmit this invitation to anyone who should be included in the list and to write us advising us of his or her name, and the organization represented. The purpose of this meeting is for the commission to receive the benefit of advice and suggestions to aid it in adopting a foreign immigration policy of a character that will command the confidence and the respect of German-Americans now residing in Oregon and enlist their enthusiastic cooperation.

MAN OF 80 IS SENTENCED

Fred Harding Given Parole but Efforts to Aid Him Are Foiled.

Fred Harding, nearly 80 years of age, was given from one to seven years in the penitentiary and a parole in Circuit Court yesterday morning. He pleaded guilty to the larceny of a coat, a railway ticket and other articles, but pleaded that he did not know how he came in possession of the property. He had been in the County Jail about three months. Harding contended that he was a veteran of the Civil War, but M. J. Morse, bailiff for Judge Morrow, satisfied himself that this was not true. Harding said he came here from Illinois several months ago, and was sent to the County Hospital and later to the poor farm. Shortly after leaving that institution he was arrested for the theft for which he was sentenced yesterday. Deputy District Attorney Murphy was anxious to do something for the old man, but could get no satisfaction as to where his relatives resided. New Fire Station Opens.
