"BOON" SENT FOR PRISONER.—An Oregon "boon," most effective of restraints for prisoners, was discovered by express yesterday to Detective Day, who is in Chicago, seeking the extradition of E. E. Von Klein, alleged to have stolen diamonds from his wife here two years ago, and sought in various parts of the country on charges of swindling women. Mr. Day telegraphed for the instrument. Early in the afternoon he began to appear that the extradition would be granted. As Von Klein is estimated as slippery, and there is bad blood between him and Day, the officer will take no chances. PAINTER DIES FROM FALL.—Samuel Grison, 66, a painter, was fatally injured at Third and Harrison streets yesterday, when he fell from a scaffold he stood while painting, away and caused him to fall 20 feet to the pavement. The injured man was taken to St. Vincent's Hospital but died immediately after arriving there, and the body was turned over to the Coroner. Mr. Grison sustained a fractured skull, laceration of his head, and a cement walk. He lived at 164 Union avenue, and is survived by a wife and daughter. "LITTLE ROUND-UP" IN SIGHT.—A little Round-Up is forecasted in the announcement of the Rodero and Wasco County Fair, which will be held in The Dalles, September 17-20. J. L. Young, president of the Rodero organization, and J. S. Fish is secretary. In addition to the general exhibits of the products of the county, a long program is announced in which bucking bronco contests, roping and riding contests, "bulldogging" and many other sports of the ranch which have characterized the Round-Up, will figure.

GEORGE GRAHAM ARRESTED.—Charged with obtaining money by the theft of his roommate's bank book, George Graham, 17 years of age, was arrested yesterday by Superintendent Holmes, of a detective agency, and City Detective Abbott. The case was referred to the Court. Young Graham has relatives in Minneapolis, but came here as a tramp. He has been lodging with G. K. Hershey, who has a savings account, and obtaining the pass book, drew out \$50 before the loss was discovered. BIDS ON LUMBER ASKED.—Opportunity is offered for lumbermen of Portland to bid on big supplies of lumber to be sent to the Canal zone, according to a call for bids received at the Chamber of Commerce yesterday. The bids on this lot of supplies are to be opened on May 17. The lumber supplies which Portland mills will be able to bid upon will easily amount to a big supply. The bids will reach an approximate total of between \$2,000,000 and \$4,000,000 feet.

THEODORE F. BOWMAN DEAD.—Theodore F. Bowman, aged 48 years, of 426 Hoyt street, died yesterday from dropsy and heart trouble, with which he had suffered for three years. Mr. Bowman was born in Portland, from Indiana six years ago. He formerly was a member of the Methodist Church. Two sons, Fulton B. and Richard S. Bowman, of Portland, survive. Funeral services will be held privately at the grave in River-view Cemetery at 1:30 P. M. today. 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SUMMONS ORDERED IN NEWSPAPERS.—In the case of E. T. Hansen against Peter Wilson, a foreclosure of a tax title, Circuit Judge McMillin has refused to permit Fiegel & Baynola, the plaintiffs' attorneys, to secure service by publication by publishing in the Pacific Christian Advocate. Instead he has ordered that the advertisement be run for six weeks in one of the three big dailies of the city and that persons be carried in the other two. The judge's reason is that the circulation of the Pacific Christian Advocate is limited and confined to a particular class of people. He has stated that hereafter he will not allow publication of summons in obscure newspapers for the reason that there is small chance of defendants becoming aware of the pending litigation through them.

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VARIED ADVICE IS GIVEN WOMEN GET ANSWERS TO REQUESTS FOR COUNSEL. Some Persons Say Vote "No" When in Doubt, Others Urge That No Action Be Taken. "When in doubt should we vote 'No' on the charter, or refrain from voting?" To this question a large number of answers were read yesterday at the meeting of the Women's Political Science Club held in the Medical building. Requests had been sent out to prominent citizens for their opinions and the responses were many and varied. The women were advised by many to study the problems more thoroughly and then they surely could decide. Others said decidedly, "Vote No, if you cannot understand an issue or find out anything satisfactory about a candidate." To refrain from casting the vote was the advice of still other authorities quoted. Gay Lombard said in part in his message to the club, "Vote No, if in doubt. More harm may come from the passage of a measure than from its defeat. If it is a good measure, surely you will be able to understand its good points."

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
