

STOCK PROMOTERS GET PRISON TERMS

Judge Declares Person Interested in Case Made Love to One of Jurors.

LAWYER IS ALSO ACCUSED

Court's Accusation Comes in Reply to Charge That Wife of Juror and Inspector's Daughter Were Unduly Friendly.

PHILADELPHIA, April 29.—Five promoters and officers of the International Lumber & Development Company were sentenced today to terms ranging from one to two years and fined from \$1000 to \$15,000 today by Judge Witmer in the United States Supreme Court.

Stewart Declares Innocent. The judge, before passing sentence, asked the defense if they had anything to say. Colonel Stewart, on the verge of bursting into tears, was the only one to answer.

The judge made no reply. During his argument for a new trial today, former Senator Mason, of Illinois, for the defense, said that the daughter of a postal inspector and the wife of one of the jurors were friendly and sat together in the courtroom during the entire trial, which lasted four weeks.

Judge Witmer interrupted Mason and with much emphasis said: "Now look at the other side. I have positive information that a person interested in the defense made a friendly and sat together in the courtroom during the entire trial, which lasted four weeks."

treaty was framed. Japan asked for all the rights as to ownership of land in California that that nation desired for her subjects, and that the treaty as it now stands represents all that Japan asked and all that the United States was willing to grant.

Treaty Rights Observed. "This act does not draw the line on aliens who are ineligible to citizenship. Those words are not used. It gives not only to Japan, but to every nation whose subjects are ineligible to citizenship under the laws of the United States, the full rights to ownership in land in California that the treaties between the United States and such nations give."

Several of the Progressive Republican leaders in the Legislature who saw the bill tonight expressed the hope that it would meet with the approval of the Federal Administration. It is generally believed that the new act would accomplish the ends said to be desired by the people of the state, namely, to prevent the further acquisition by Japanese subjects of farming lands and ranches.

45 INCHES TRUNK LIMIT

Railroad Restrictions on Size of Baggage Effective June 1.

Restrictions on trunk baggage and baggage of extreme length or width will be placed in effect about June 1, according to plans now being made by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

It is understood that these new regulations, which will limit the size of the trunk to 45 inches in length, will work no hardship on the traveling public, but will serve to check effectively the tendency of commercial salesmen and the houses that employ them to carry queer-shaped trunks and baggage of unusual proportions.

Police Seek 14-Year-Old Edna Meves in White Slavery Investigation.

BIXBY BEFORE GRAND JURY

Long Beach Millionaire Leaves After 12 Minutes, Not to Be Recalled. "Beauty" Parlor Proprietress Summoned as Witness.

LOS ANGELES, April 29.—A search for a 14-year-old girl, Edna Meves, wanted in connection with the county grand jury's white slavery investigation, will lead from Los Angeles to Portland, Or., according to statements made tonight by detectives.

The officers obtained a bench warrant today demanding the presence of the Meves girl before the grand jury, but on attempting to serve it they said they learned that she had fled from her home in South Pasadena, a suburb to Portland, in company with her sister, Emma, who is 21 years old.

The younger Meves girl was said to have been taken to the Jonquil, the "hotel" conducted by Mrs. Josie Rosenberg, alleged procuress, at whose establishment congregated many of the young girls who have named in affidavits George H. Bixby, Long Beach millionaire.

Bixby Not to Be Recalled. Bixby appeared before the grand jury today for 12 minutes. W. J. Ford, assistant district attorney, said later that the Long Beach capitalist would not be recalled, although it was apparent from the short period he remained before the county inquirers that he could not have imparted much information.

Ford declined to say whether Bixby had invoked the prerogative granted by section 1324 of the California penal code, by which a witness cannot be made to testify against himself unless immunity from possible prosecution is assured him.

Other witnesses called today included Dr. R. S. Larriman, ex-County Coroner; Mrs. Susan Ramey and her granddaughter, Ruth Ramey, 17 years old; Charles Wilson, husband of Grace Wilson, proprietress of a "beauty" parlor in Los Angeles; and Southern Californian was said to have received mail under the name of "King."

Lotteries Are Summoned. Hangerson in the corridor outside the grand jury chamber, suspected by county officials of being a detective employed by men believed to have been implicated in the Jonquil scandal, were surprised today when they were summoned before the grand jury to sell their purpose in lottering in the Court-house.

Several new subpoenas were issued tonight with the belief that there would be as many new witnesses called when the grand jury resumed its investigation tomorrow morning.

SNOW THREATENS FRUIT

DEPTH IS EIGHT INCHES AT ESTACADA AND GARFIELD.

Trees Damaged and Telephone and Telegraph Service Crippled. Moderation Forecast.

Snow, falling to a depth ranging from six to eight inches, made a few changes in the appearance of Estacada, Garfield and some parts of Clatskanie Monday night and caused much alarm among the fruit growers of those districts. Unless the weather moderates soon, it is feared, the effect on the fruit crop will be bad.

Telephone and telegraph service was badly crippled, some lines being put out of commission for many hours, while numbers of fruit trees were damaged by the breaking of bloom-laden limbs, being weighed down by the accumulation of heavy snow.
