Senator Cummins, of Iowa, was consuited about the prospective appoint-ment of Louis Murphy, of Dubuque, Ia., as collector of internal revenue for the Northern District of that state, while Senators La Follette and Steph-egson, of Wisconain, were asked if they had any objection to the appointment of Joseph F. Davies, of Madison, Wis., secretary of the Democratic National committee, as commissioner of corpo-ations. No objections were recorded.

# MILK BULLETIN ISSUED

BOTTOM OF BOTTLES SAID TO BE PLACE FOR INSPECTION.

City Chemist Warns Against Use of Produce in Which Flies Have "Washed Their Feet."

How to determine whether milk is clean or not and how to keep milk clean and pure, are features of the first health bulletin issued yesterday hrst health bulletin issued yesterday by the City Health Department under the new bulletin policy adopted re-cently by the Health Board. The bulle-tin will be sent to persons requesting

"Look at the bottom of the bottle for dirt, Instead of at the top for cream," urges City Milk Chemist Cal-lowsy in the bulletin. "Dirt goes to the bottom. It is far more important to ascertain whether or not milk is clean than if it has cream. Cream rises on dirty milk. Buy your milk in bottles and return the bottles to the dairyman clean. Encourage the clean dairyman by patronizing him. Discourage the careless, indifferent, dirty dairyman by refusing to buy his

Every morning when you get your bottle of milk hold it above your head and look at the bottom. There should not be one particle of dirt. Do not blame your dairyman for sour milk until you have investigated your home handling outfit. When you first pour your milk from

the bottle, throw the cap away and invert a clean teacup or glass over the top. Keep the milk cold. It is cheaper to pay for ice than for the services of a doctor. Never keep the milk in a container that is not covered. Milk absorbs odors and should be kept separate from other foods.


