ADMEN PROUD OF TOT Little Miss Tucker to Speak "Officially" for Club.

Little Mildred Tucker, the 5-year-old Portland girl who accompanies the Portland Admen to the Pacific Coast Convention next week, is expected to prove the popular sensation of the convention. The little girl will be the chief speaker at behalf of the Portland delegation at every affair of a social nature in which the local delegation has part.

At the banquet to be tendered all delegates Wednesday night Little Miss Tucker will be at Roseburg, where the delegates will pass one hour on Sunday.

Arrangements were yesterday completed to accept an invitation from the Advertising Association of San Francisco, all of the delegations from the Northwest arranging to leave Sacramento Thursday morning.

The delegation from Spokane will arrive in Portland at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning and will be received at the Union Station by a delegation of local men, headed by the famous maiden "Miss Spokane," the representatives of Eastern Washington will parade through the business section of the city and will then return to their headquarters at the Hotel Multnomah.

The Seattle and other Northwest delegates will arrive in Portland at 8:30 and will be escorted to their headquarters. At 6:30 a banquet will be tendered at the Hotel Portland for all delegates, while the women delegates will be entertained by wives of all men.

The special train will leave the Union Depot at 11:35 and will be in charge of "Conductor" John M. Scott, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific Company.

Only two stops will be made between Portland and Sacramento—Roseburg for a strawberry breakfast, and Medford, where all delegates and friends aboard the train will be taken through the Rogue River orchards by auto and will rejoin the train at Ashland.
