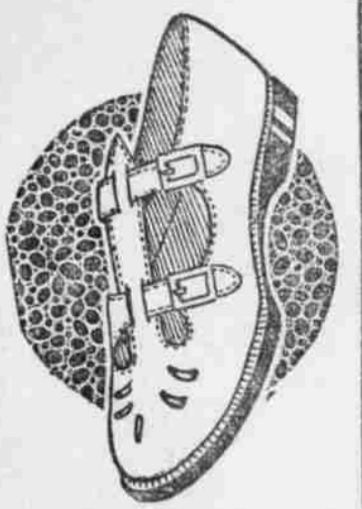

### NEW ROUTE SOUGHT

Greater Irvington Club Active on Carline.

### SELECTION ALREADY MADE

E. P. Sheldon and E. E. Versteeg Committee to Advocate Alteration Before Civic Club and Ask for Co-operation.

A strong effort will be made by the Greater Irvington Club to change the route of the proposed cross-town carline from East Twenty-eighth street to East Twenty-second and East Twenty-first street, thereby routing the cars over the new East Twenty-first street bridge across Sullivan's Gulch. However, there are doubts about the success of this plan for the reason that the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company had already selected the East Twenty-eighth-street route in order to bring the cars directly to the car barns on East Burnside street and to take advantage of trackage already laid.

On the East Twenty-eighth-street route the track is laid between East Ankeny and Halsey, leaving a connecting link to be built between the north end and the Broadway carline on East Twenty-fourth street, and between East Ankeny street and Hawthorne avenue, a distance of about half a mile. The new route would bring the cars almost directly to the Reed College grounds and at the same time would provide streetcar facilities for several districts not now provided. E. P. Sheldon and E. E. Versteeg are a committee from the Greater Irvington Club to advocate the change before the civic club and ask for their co-operation.

L. M. Lepper, chairman of the transportation committees of the Greater East Side Club and the East Side Business Men's Club, said that he was sure that the clubs he represents will not

object to the efforts the Greater Irvington Club may make in securing this change of route.

"If the cross-town carline was built on East Twentieth street," he said, "it would mean the construction of a cross-town carline on East Thirti-ninth street, where it was first asked for, all the sooner."

Mr. Sheldon in his talk before the Sunnyside Improvement Association at its last meeting, said he doubted if the construction of the cross-town carline would be able to get from East Twenty-ninth street to East Twenty-fourth street on Halsey, Wasco or any of the other cross streets.

"These are all narrow," said Mr. Sheldon, "and the property owners are determined to prevent any franchise ever being granted on these streets. I am certain that they will fight the granting of a franchise by the City Council, which will delay the construction of the cross-town carline indefinitely, while the other route would be free from all such obstructions."

The north end of the Broadway line in Alameda, which will be part of the construction of the cross-town carline, is finally selected, ends within about six blocks of the Alameda carline, and a strong effort will be made to have this short distance included in the franchise for the line, thus making a connection with the North Portland streetcar system by way of the Alberta streetcar line. This extension was not included in the promised cross-town carline, but when the franchise for the line is asked this extension will be requested.

### EAST SIDE PROSPERING

#### NEW STRUCTURE UNDER WAY

Grain Elevator at Foot of Holladay Will Total \$250,000 and Ford Auto Plant Will Be Same.

More than \$1,000,000 in new buildings are under way in Central East Portland at the present time. The principal structures are as follows: Grain elevator, foot Holladay avenue, \$250,000; Ford automobile building for its assembling plant, Division Works, four new buildings on new site, East Twenty-ninth street and Sullivan's Gulch, \$100,000; four-story apartment, East Thirtieth and East Morrison streets, \$100,000; five-story factory, East Flanders and East Eleventh streets, \$50,000; C. W. Miller, apartment near East Broadway street, \$25,000; mills by Pacific Bridge Company, East Tenth, between Belmont and East Salmon streets, \$25,000; apartment, East Tenth and East Twenty-sixth streets, \$25,000; S. B. Vincent, Sandy boulevard, concrete building, \$25,000; new bridge over Sullivan's Gulch, East Sixteenth street and Holladay avenue, \$90,000. These structures are within a radius of about half a mile from East Morrison street and Union avenue, and indicate considerable building activity in the central part of East Portland. Business men in Central East Portland report excellent business conditions, and the Wednesday bargain day has proved a great success.

#### MILWAUKIE TO BUY SPRINGS

Private Water Works Will Cost \$11,217 Say Appraisers. MILWAUKIE, Or., May 20.—(Special)—It will cost the town of Milwaukie \$11,217 to purchase the two private water works in operation here. At a special meeting of the City Council last night reports of the two sets of appraisers, fixed the value of the Minthorne Springs Water Works, J. L. Johnson, manager, at \$5717 and that of the Milwaukie Water Works, B. M. Fisch, manager, at \$5500. If these plants are purchased it will

leave available for larger mains, establishing a new pumping station and purchase of Minthorne Springs \$5783 of the \$20,000 authorized at the special election. Auditor Mathews was instructed to post these values. According to the charter the city may purchase on these terms if there is no remonstrance signed by 100 voters will stop the sale and require the Council to condemn the plants through court proceedings.

#### FOUNDER'S DAY CELEBRATED

Many Churchmen Join in Tribute to St. John Baptist La Salle. The feast of St. John Baptist La Salle, founder of the Christian Brothers, was celebrated at the Christian Brothers' Business College, Grand avenue and Clackamas street, yesterday. At the conclusion of a mass in the chapel a sermon on the "Founder of the Christian Brothers" was preached by Rev. Father Smith, superior of the Paulist Fathers in Portland. He gave an outline of the life of the founder of the religious order of teachers, and said that the order now numbered 16,000 brothers and 400,000 parish and young men, including parish schools, academies, colleges, reformatories and manual training schools all over the world. In the evening solemn benediction of the blessed sacrament was given in college chapel by Archbishop Alexander Christie, assisted by Rev. Father Joseph Gallagher, C. S. C., president of Columbia University, and Rev. Father Maddock, C. S. R. A banquet was afterwards served in the college dining-room at which the following guests were present: Most Rev. Alexander Christie, D. D., Rt. Rev. Bishop Carroll, of Montana; Very Rev. Father Kelly, O. P., Superior of Holy Rosary Monastery; Very Rev. Father Smith, C. S. P., Superior of the Paulist Community; Very Rev. Father Gallagher, C. S. C., president of Columbia University; Rev. Father Thompson, C. S. R., rector of the Madeline; Rev. Father Daly, rector of St. Mary's Church, Abing; Rev. Father Gregory, O. S. A., rector of the Church of the Sacred Heart; Rev. Father Quinn, C. S. P., of the Paulist Church; Rev. Father Maddock, C. S. R.; Rev. Father Carron, C. S. R.; Henry S. Davis, LL.B., and the entire college faculty.
