

## CURT GLAD HE'S RID OF LESLIE CARTER

Manager Says He Has Found There Is No Money in Emotional Stars.

## VAUDEVILLE PLANS MADE

Northwest Theatrical Genus Pays \$10,000 to Creator of "Zaza" for Privilege of "Firing" Her and Figures He's \$50,000 Ahead.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, May 21.—(Special.)—Ten thousand dollars has just been paid by John Curt, the theatrical manager, to Mrs. Leslie Carter, creator of "Zaza" and other emotional heroines, for the loss of her job. As one of his stars the actress can enjoy the distinction of receiving a small fortune for being discharged. Yet Mr. Curt said here tonight that he estimated she was just \$50,000 ahead on the deal. Fifty thousand dollars, he said, he believed he would have lost if he had carried out his contract for two more years with her.

"The more emotional stars for me," said Mr. Curt. "They are artists, but not money-makers. I am going in for two-dollar vaudeville."

All-Star Companies Planned.

"The report that I would convert all of the theaters in the Northwest into vaudeville is not true, but I am organizing two all-star vaudeville companies for next season and will be interested in several others. The Eugene delegation will be headed by Lillian Russell and the other by Anna Held, Gaby Deslys, Harry Lauder, Eva Tangany and others will be included in the company. Tangany show will go out this summer.

"There will be no change in policy in any of the Curt houses. Tabloid musical comedy is being tried in some of my cheaper houses and has been most successful, but I have no definite plans as to its production."

Stock Chain Organized.

"Both independent and syndicate productions will play the same houses here, the benefit of the householder. It has cost too much money to fight. For our stock theaters we have organized a chain extending from Spokane and Seattle, to the north, to Devereux, taking in Portland, players and plays are being interchanged."

Aside from the all-star vaudeville companies Mr. Curt's only real show next season will be *McIntyre & Heath* in a revival of "The Ham Tree." He has severed managerial relations with all other stars.

## WALKER GIVES UP BATTLE

Macon Banker Succumbs to Poison Taken by Mistake.

MACON, Ga., May 22.—B. Sanders Walker, the Macon banker who took hisichloride of mercury by mistake here last Wednesday, died early this morning. He had not regained consciousness since early yesterday afternoon. His immediate family was at his bedside when he expired.

A characteristic utterance made just before he went into a state of partial coma late today illustrates the remarkable composure with which Walker faced death.

"If I am dying," he said, "then the sensation is not as it generally is pictured. If this is dying, then none need fear its approach."

The attending physicians, who are said to have exhausted every method of treatment known to medical science, expressed early tonight belief that Walker could not live more than a few hours. The last official bulletin gave his pulse as 120, his respiration at 30, and his temperature at 101.5. Despite assurance of certainty of death as a result of his paralyzed organs, Walker's own belief that he would recover was not shaken until the end.

Efforts to ascertain the exact treatment Walker received tonight were unavailing. The physicians declined to discuss this subject. It is understood, however, that they had been in close communication with physicians at the Johns Hopkins Hospital at Baltimore.

## LEWISTON MAN IS KILLED

Henry Hirsell Is Found Dead With Tree Across His Body.

LEWISTON, Idaho, May 21.—(Special.)—Henry Hirsell, aged 70 years, a pioneer of the Lewiston country, was found dead in the woods above Waha last night by Aaron Westling, a neighbor. Investigation showed that he had been struck by a tree which he had felled. The body was badly crushed. That Hirsell had been dead since May 4 is the opinion of officers who examined his cabin. The man had a book hanging on the wall in which he had kept a record of temperatures. The last entry in this book was made on the morning of May 8. Hirsell had lived in this district for 40 years. He had a 40-acre ranch and it is thought that he had some money. The only relative, according to papers found in his cabin, is a niece named Annie Starkie, living in Palmyra, Mo. She wired Coroner Westling to bury Hirsell here. The remains will be buried tomorrow.

## LIFE SENTENCE IS GIVEN

GAYLORD M'DANIEL TO ATONE FOR SLAYING HERMAN POCH.

Mother of Convicted Man, Who Is Wife of Prisoner's Victim Also, Collapses in Prineville Court.

PRINEVILLE, Or., May 21.—(Special.)—Gaylord M'Daniel today was sentenced to life imprisonment in the penitentiary for the murder of Herman Poch on the morning of December 31, 1912, at the latter's ranch about three miles east of Prineville.

Admission made by the mother that if Gaylord had not killed Poch she would have done so caused the grand jury to indict M'Daniel today for murder in the first degree, but the trial jury acquitted the mother and convicted M'Daniel in the second degree. When the jury returned its verdict Mrs. Poch completely collapsed and had to be carried from the courtroom. M'Daniel exhibited strong courage and received his sentence without emotion except moist eyes. He will be taken to the Penitentiary tomorrow.

The only other team in the competition was Court Protection, No. 40 of Gervais, non-arrival of uniforms causing the Lents team to drop out.

John T. Corcoran is captain of the winning team and his men will keep the cup permanently. Alfred Malo is captain of the Gervais team. The judges were L. J. Adams of Silverton; John Sauer, of Grants Pass, and D. D. Wilder, of The Dalles.

## GIRL WITH GUN TAKES AUTO

Chauffeur Forced to Aid Lass' Escape From Mother.

OMAHA, May 21.—Viola Bims, a 19-year-old girl of Plains, Kan., last night held up the chauffeur of an automobile in the downtown district and forced him to drive to a suburb in a motor car she had hidden in her mother's garage. She was arrested today by police.

Mrs. Bims came to Omaha recently to escape, she declared, from her stepfather. She was placed in the Good Shepherd Home in Omaha, where her mother could reach the city. The mother went to the home last night and the daughter started with her to the station. When they reached Thirtieth and Dodge streets the young woman ran into the street, stopped at the point of a revolver the driver of an automobile and jumped into the car. She told the chauffeur to take her to her mother's house, where she left the automobile and escaped. No trace of her has been found by the police.

## GUILT IS ADMITTED

Home Telephone Strikebreaker Escapes From Rawlins.

## AINSBERRY AGAIN DETAINED

Prisoner Attempts to Poison Himself by Swallowing Two Plugs of Tobacco and Jumping From Window of Car.

J. C. Ainsberry, alias W. W. Warren, alias Bert Lawson, alias Clarence Ambury, who was released on \$1000 bail placed by the Home Telephone Company in their belief that his parole-breaking from San Quentin prison, California might be condoned, was arrested last night at his home near Lents by Deputy Sheriff Frank Curtis and Archie Leonard, assistant chief special agent of the O-W. R. & N., and was lodged in the county jail charged with having been a jailbreaker from the Wyoming state penitentiary at Rawlins, an offense which he admitted.

Ainsberry, whose release on habeas corpus proceedings came after he had admitted that he was a parole violator from California, and been arrested for assaulting Fred Ream, a striker who made an attack on the workmen on the Home Telephone Company plant at Oswego. He was at his home with his wife, a half mile east of Lents, when the officers arrived. He asked that they talk to him outside his home, on the plea that it would frighten his wife, and was presented with identification papers several months ago in comparing criminal records, found that the Bert Lawson of the San Quentin prison, was the same man as the J. C. Ainsberry of the Wyoming penitentiary, but did not know the man was in Portland until Ainsberry told of his record in Oregon City. Although Ainsberry said that he was on the flight from Leonard wished to see his man before he proclaimed the identification, but Ainsberry, when confronted with the circular, said that he was the wanted man.

In an effort either to kill himself from the poison, or to relax the vigilance of the officers, Ainsberry chewed and swallowed two large plugs of tobacco on the street. The effect, however, was to make him very sick, leaning half out a window of the car Ainsberry made several half-hearted attempts to throw himself out, but was restrained.

On his confession, the officers have gathered that he, with three others, were in a jailbreak from the Rawlins Penitentiary August 31, 1912, and with Russell H. Harris and Terrell Pope, alias Pope Terrell, a local man, went to Huntington, Or., September 11, last year, where Chief Special Agent E. E. Wood, of the O-W. R. & N. Company, narrowly missed him. From Huntington the three went to Baker City, then to The Dalles and to Portland. Harris and Pope were located in Portland October 14 by City Detectives Coleman and Snow and Harris was captured, Terrell making his escape.

His Rawlins term was on a charge of being a burglar, for which he was sentenced from Cheyenne, Wyo., to three years. He served 45 days, when the jailbreak came which gave him liberty. This was in the interval between the time he broke his parole in California and appeared in Portland. These statements Ainsberry confirmed when faced with the Home Telephone circular.

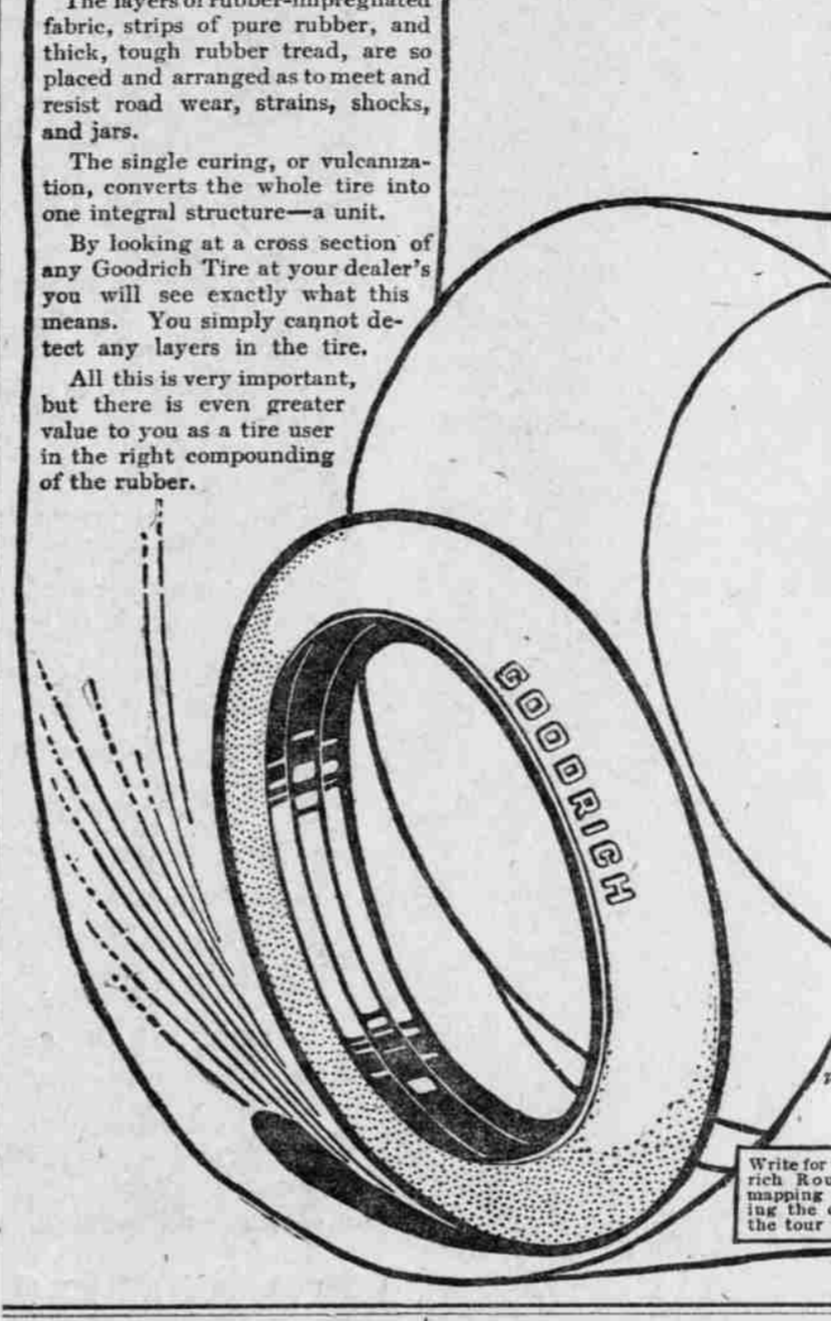
