Violation of Rights in International Law Charged in Argumentative Note.

CHINDA CALLS ON BRYAN

Ambassador and Secretary Discuss Situation Informally—Counselor Moore to Be Consulted in Framing Reply.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Nothing that can be construed as an ultimatum is contained in the Japanese rejoinder to Secretary Bryan's reply to the original protest against the enactment of anti-alien land holding laws...

Tone of Rejoinder Dignified. It is known, however, that the whole tone of the rejoinder today is that of a dignified and orderly presentation of Japan's view of the case...

Its general tone is to invite further discussion of the controverted points and it contains nothing tending to make up a final issue.

Ambassador Chinda went to the State Department by appointment just before 1 o'clock. Instead of merely acknowledging receipt of the note and promising to consider it Secretary Bryan requested the ambassador to wait while he read the communication...

New Bulgarian Cabinet Believed to Be Peace Disturber.

ROUMANIA OFFERS HELP

Ministries of All Balkan States Reported Preparing to Resign. Method of Arbitration Is Not Agreed On.

LONDON, June 4.—Instead of making for peace, the new Cabinet of Bulgaria may be more bellicose than the previous one, for late reports indicate that Premier Guechoff resigned because of the irritation shown in military and political circles over his concession to Greece and Serbia.

Another disturbing feature is the growing indication that Roumania is backing Bulgaria and diplomats believe that Roumania already has offered to join with Bulgaria in case of war.

GENERAL FOOTE IS DEAD

WRITER, POET AND PUBLICIST PASSES AT 87.

Service to Foreigners When Minister to Corea Had Won Thanks of Two Sovereigns.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 4.—(Special.)—Stricken by the ravages of old age, against which he had made a determined yet fruitless fight for two years, General Lucius Harwood Foote, diplomat, poet and clubman, died today at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Pope, with whom he had made his home for years. He was 87 years old.

Two years ago, almost to the day, General Foote was stricken with paralysis. Coming to California from New York in 1852, General Foote became one of San Francisco's oldest and best-known citizens. He was a charter member of the Bohemian Club and for years secretary and treasurer of the California Academy of Sciences.

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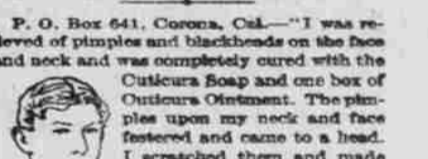
